WHOLE TRAINLOAD OF FLOUR. LOCATING TRIMMOUNTAIN BRANCH. IT IS DUE TO ARRIVE AT HANCOCK ABOUT NOON TODAY.

Sometime ago it was stated through these columns that a trainload of flour was due to arrive in Houghton county from the Minneapolis mills. The train, which is an exclusive flour train of twenty cars, was yesterday delivered to the South Shore road at Bihon, Wis., and is due to arrive in Hancock close to the noon hour today.

The flour is the product of the Minneapolis mills of Wm. Crosby & Co. It is of the Gold Medal brand that has been extensively used throughout the copper district for a number of years. The same mills have previously made such shipments to the larger points of distribution.

When an attempt is made to estimate the number of loaves of bread that could be made from such a consignment of flour, it is probable it will be more fully realized what five thousand barrels really mean.

HOW THE GAME WAS WON.

ORCHARD LAKE'S HEAVY TEAM PLAYED DIRTY BALL BUT ISHPEMING WON BY CLEVER WORK

An account in detail received by The Mining Journal from Ann Arbor yesterday tells how the boys from this city won the football contest at that place. The special to The Journal says:

"The game was called at 10:30 o'clock a. m. Ishpeming won the toss and the game started in earnest. Orchard Lake kicked off and a Hematite player captured the ball and carried it for a number of yards. The two eleven lined up with the ball in Ishpeming's possession. Steady gains were made and the boys from the north were fast approaching their opponents' goal when the pigskin was lost on a fumble. The military academy took the ball and made but a limited number of yards when Ishpeming held it for downs. Ishpeming had advanced the ball but a short distance when it was held by their heavier opponents. Orchard Lake, securing the pigskin again, introduced some of the dirty work for which the team is known. By a run around Ishpeming's left end and an interference that consisted of holding and slugging, the military academy scored the first touchdown. Goal was not kicked and the score was 5 to 0 in favor of Orchard Lake. On re-suming play Orchard Lake was held for downs and after short but continued gains Wright of Ishpeming scored a touchdown. Goal was kicked and the first half ended 6 to 5 in favor of the Hematite lads.

ROPES SHUTS DOWN.

CYANIDE PROCESS OF TREATING TAILINGS AT THE GOLD MINE DISCONTINUED ON ACCOUNT OF COLD WEATHER.

The Ropes gold mine has stopped operations for the winter. The weather is too cold to continue the treatment of the "tailings" by the cyanide process. The solution freezes, rendering it useless, and no means were arranged to supply artificial heat.

Captain S. C. Bennetts, superintendent of the Corrigan-McKinney mines on the Menominee range, was in the city Tuesday and said the mine would reopen in the spring and that better results are looked for. Things are now in shape for profitable operations. The company has made but fairly good progress during the summer, but next season the process will be worked with less expense. The cost of getting the "tailings" out of the swamp where they were dumped and hoisting them to the tanks has been done at 20 cents a ton. This is just twice the amount it should be.

NOT A FEASIBLE PLAN.

PROPOSED SCHEME FOR AN UPPER PENINSULA FOOTBALL TEAM IS NOT CONSIDERED PRACTICABLE HERE.

A scheme for the organization of an upper peninsula football team was spoken of in the copper country department of The Mining Journal yesterday. The gist of the proposition was that the eleven be composed of the star players of the iron and copper districts. The write-up states that there are a number of old college players in each district who would make a strong aggregation and one that could hold its own against the best lower peninsula eleven. The suggestion of the all-star team was made since the close of the season and it is said to come from the iron country.

In theory the project seems feasible enough but it is a question whether or not a plan such as that mentioned would prove successful if tried. A football team in order to be a good one must practice frequently and systematically. This could not be done if the proposed team were organized. There would be many difficulties in the way. All members could not leave their work at the same time to travel to one central point for practice. The distances between the towns that would have players in the team are too great. The expense of travel, etc., would be too much, and who would furnish the money? If conditions were favorable for an all-star aggregation it might be formed. There are many old-time football players here and in the copper country who have won fame on the gridiron in the past and their reappearance on the field would elicit much interest in athletic circles. The scheme, however, is impracticable.

ARRIVE HOME TODAY.

The heroes of the gridiron will reach home this afternoon on the 4 o'clock train. Local enthusiasts desire to have the boys receive a hearty welcome and request all who can to be at the depot. Students of the high school and pupils of the grade departments will be there in force. One of the city bands may be on hand to serenade the team.

A letter written Wednesday at Ann Arbor by one of the local high school football players was received by The Mining Journal yesterday. It was full of enthusiasm and brimming with confidence in the result of the game. The missive stated that the team arrived at the university town Tuesday morning and was met at the depot by the students, who gave the college yell. Although the Ishpeming boys were very tired from their trip they consented to line up against the Ann Arbor High school eleven in the evening. The players on that team average about 150 pounds to the man. Ishpeming made a most creditable showing and greatly surprised its opponents by the accuracy and quickness of its play. Ann Arbor was unsuccessful in trying to hold the boys from rushing through its line and going around the ends for good gains. In order to show what it could do on the defensive Ishpeming gave the ball to the opposing team, who tried time and again for good plunges without success.

On Tuesday morning the local football party was in Detroit and visited places of interest. On Wednesday the members went through the university buildings and the museum. In closing the writer says "Regents' field is very slippery. All Ann Arbor is for us and the boys are greeted everywhere."

In and About Negaunee.

"TOM" COUCH AROUND AGAIN. AN ODD AND INTERESTING PERSONAGE. FORMER SLAVE AND VETERAN OF THE CIVIL WAR. HEIRED ON A BUSINESS MISSION.

A familiar and well-known character in Negaunee is here on his annual fall business trip. He is "Tom" Couch, one of the most unique and interesting persons who ever set foot in Negaunee. Mr. Couch is a regular visitor to the city. Once each spring and fall he comes to call on his friends, all of whom are pleased to see him. In the spring he brings quantities of different varieties of cabbage, tomato and celery plants to supply those who need them. The stock is always fresh and healthy and is shipped direct here from Green Bay. At present he is in Negaunee for the purpose of procuring a stock of Christmas trees for holiday decorations. He will lay in a good supply and cartloads of trees from here to Green Bay and from there distributed to various points. He will have no trouble in obtaining the quantity he requires, as there are persons here who will gladly supply them for the price offered. In speaking of the business Mr. Couch said that Christmas trees are very much in demand in lower Wisconsin cities and that he has a large trade in them.

"Tom's" home is at Green Bay, where he has long resided. He has been in charge of the transfer line from the bellows to the Benzoni process for many years. Supplemental to his regular work he keeps up the business mentioned, from which he adds no inconsiderable amount to his income. Mr. Couch is a negro and was a slave in the south before the war of the rebellion. He is now sixty-one years of age. The story of the last fifty years of his life would make a deeply interesting narrative. He has been a prominent figure in many occurrences and has had many interesting experiences since his boyhood. He can recount many incidents of his younger days that are full of interest, and he and the vicissitudes through which he has passed have been the subject of many a newspaper article.

"Tom" was born in "ole Kaintuck" in 1839, a slave on a plantation in that state. When old enough to be of service he was sold by his master. He was ten years of age at the time, and the price paid for him was \$400. For ten years he worked for his new master and in 1859 was again sold, and was taken to Pontotoc, Miss. Like many others of his race, he was pressed into the service of the Confederate government at the outbreak of the civil war. His sympathies, naturally, were with the North and his hope was to escape and get to the Union army. By waiting and watching for a chance to break away and get to a Union camp he was finally successful. It was in 1862 that he accomplished this. The Eighth Wisconsin Regiment was then encamped at the place and one day a young and sturdy negro was ushered into the presence of the officers of Company C. They consented to enlist him and with a joyful heart "Tom" became a soldier of the Union. Company C was the one that carried "Ole Abe," the famous war eagle about which so much has been written. "Tom" was assigned to the care of the bird and the two soon became fast friends. All through the campaign the eagle was tenderly cared for, as he was the pride of the regiment and a living symbol of American liberty. "Tom" was at the siege of Vicksburg under General Grant and later under General Banks on the campaign up the Red River in Arkansas. At the end of the war he went west but finally drifted back to Wisconsin, the state he loves so well.
