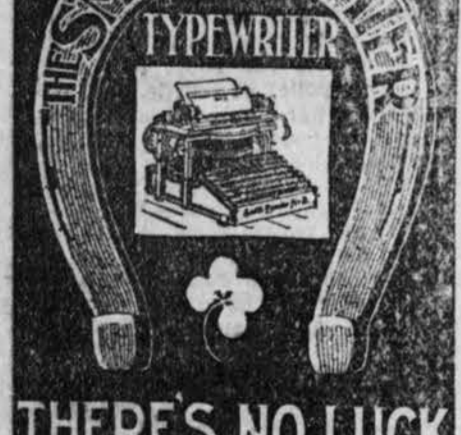

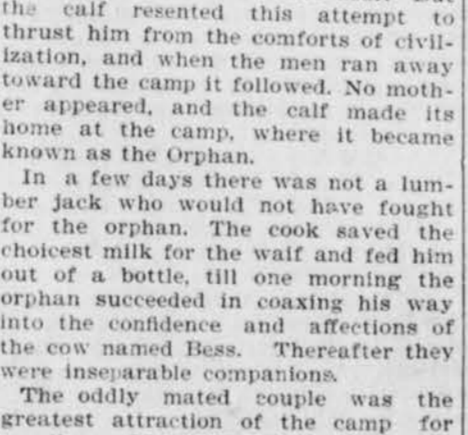

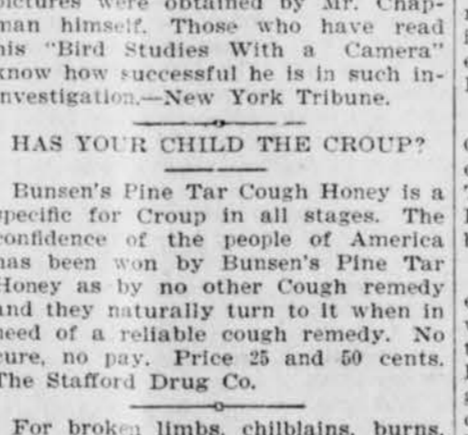

WILL FIND IT COSTLY.

County Supervisors Will Be Called on to Audit Many Small-Pox "Scare" Bills.

BATCH O. K'D BY COUNCIL FOOTED UP OVER \$1700.

People Who Are Called on to Handle Patients Charge Goodly Rates for Their Services and With Other Items the Total Will Reach Generous Proportions.

AND THE END IS NOWHERE IN SIGHT.

The board of supervisors will find the present small pox "scare" a very expensive luxury when the bills which will be referred to it are audited at its next session. At the council meeting Monday evening the Marquette aldermen listened to the reading of a long batch of bills contracted by the health officer here during the past few weeks on account of the numerous patients who have suffered from the disease. They footed up over \$1,700 and this is only a part of the debt which will be incurred before the city is free of small pox. They were submitted on various accounts, from that of Health Officer Brown's fees for professional services to the charges made by the men who assumed charge of the burial of James Murphy's body.

When it is recollected that small pox has existed to a greater or less degree at Negaunee, Ishpeming and the towns in the western end of the county the magnitude of the appropriation which the supervisors will have to make to settle all the accounts incurred because of the disease can be appreciated. The county stands to pay out between \$5,000 and \$10,000. The total of the disbursement can hardly be less than the former sum while it may mount close to the latter, possibly, depending on the length of time during which the small pox is prevalent, over it.

All bills incurred on account of the disease will ultimately find their way to the supervisors. Though incurred by the cities the county must pay them. The batch which was brought before the council Monday evening was audited by that body but further than this the aldermen did not go. The accounts will all be forwarded to the county clerk.

FEES ARE ALL HIGH.

No one approaches small pox, to say nothing of handling cases, for the amusement of the thing. The care of patients is quite arduous, particularly where it devolves upon the health officer who has all the responsibility as well as the physical exertion contingent on traveling all over his territory making professional calls. Ordinary wages or fees are no inducement to people who are requested to help handle such a visitation as this city is now receiving. The only assistance which can be obtained at the usual rates is the services of the guards who patrol quarantined premises.

It is customary among physicians to charge \$20 a day for service in behalf of small pox patients. Persons who

have charge of pest houses earn \$5 per day as long as there is work for them. Thus it goes all through the list. Any assistant whose duties require contact with sufferers from the dread disease, irrespective of the fact that he or she may be immune from contracting it, demand in all probability justly, good, big wages for his or her time and services. Probably the biggest money which has been earned by any individual in Marquette for some years will be received, if their claims are allowed without modification, by the men who had charge of the funeral of the late James Murphy. They worked but a few hours and turned in statements for \$20 each.

In addition to the fees demanded by those who attend the patients is the cost of maintaining the pest houses, the charges for fuel, meats, groceries, etc. These items foot up a handsome total. Then there are the bills submitted by the clothiers. A patient discharged from quarantine is not allowed to wear away the garments in which he was clad when he was first affected by small pox. They are destroyed. If he is peculiarly able, he is expected to purchase new clothes himself, otherwise the health authorities fit him out at the county's expense. A number of such bills were audited by the council Monday evening.

POWER OF TRIMMING.

The council's O. K. of the various accounts is not necessarily final. It simply shows that the several bills were contracted in good faith and that the aldermen think they should be allowed. The supervisors have the power of determining what sums will be paid out on the several accounts and, of course, the power of paring down the bills within reasonable limits. It is said that in the past, in some instances, this discretion has been exercised. It is not known what the board's attitude in the matter will be, but it would not be surprising if, here and there, they cut down the bills which they will be called on to pay on the small pox account. It is likely that its action will depend largely on the sum total of all the statements turned in from the different parts of the county. If it very large it would not be strange if a disposition to trim and prune were manifested while, on the other hand, if it is reasonably small it is quite possible that the bills will be approved as submitted.

THIRD SNOW PLOW.

With it in Use all the Streets Can be Cleaned in a Day.

The third snow plow, which is about to be purchased for use during the present winter, will enable the street committee to handle the work of clearing the sidewalks after severe storms very satisfactorily. Heretofore it has been impossible to traverse them all in one day. It has been necessary to use one plow a part of the second day. In addition to causing inconvenience to

many householders whose streets were left untouched for twenty-four hours this has made it difficult to do the work economically.

With the new plow in service it will be possible to divide the city into three districts and to finish handling the snow on all the walks in one day while the streets will thus be made passable for all the people much earlier than has been the rule in past winters. The change will be generally appreciated.

PEOPLE VS. ALBERT PEARCE.

Case Was Opened Yesterday and Will Be On All Today.

Circuit court was opened yesterday. The criminal docket was reviewed and all but one case were continued until the next term. The exception was the case of the People vs. Albert Pearce, charged with assault with intent to do great bodily harm, the plaintiff being one Jacob Harila, a Finnish resident of Ishpeming.

The task of completing the jury was taken up after the dinner hour. There were a number of challenges by the prosecutor, W. T. Potter, and by the defendant's attorney, H. O. Young. Finally twelve men were selected who were satisfactory to both attorneys and his honor, Judge Stone and the taking of testimony was commenced. There is a considerable grist to be submitted and only a fair start was made yesterday. The case will be on all today. It should, and likely will, go to the jury some time this afternoon.

Harila was shot by young Pearce at Ishpeming some months ago. Considerable mystery involves the affair. It will be cleared up by the present hearing. The defendant is well known in Ishpeming where the trial is attracting considerable attention. He is rather a young man and previous to the time that he became involved in his present trouble bore a cloudless reputation.
