



The senator made it very plain in he was not opposed to the pending treaty in almost any form, his principal, if not only, concern in that conection is for the passage of the canal bill, and he allowed it to be very broadly understood that he had en gaged in the treaty discussion because of his conviction that there were a majority of the senators who would nsist upon action on the treaty as condition precedent to the passage of the canal bill. He intimated privately to other senators, however, that he would not consent to the fixing of the time for the vote upon the treaty until here also could be a time fixed for like

action upon the Nicaraguan canal bill.

J. BULL MUST BE APPEASED. Discussing the question of the fortication of the canal, Mr. Morgan argued strenuously against it, both as inexpedient and unnecessary. He contended that Great Britain was not the only power whose interests would be affected by the provision for fortification, and said that Nicaragua and Costa Rica had the right to be considered in that connection. He admitted, however, he had no doubt that if the United States should proceed with the construction of the canal without first taking steps to secure the eutrality of the canal, Great Britain would be grievously offended, and that he thought it not impossible the offense would be considered sufficiently grave to lead to hostilities between the two countries.

"Do you mean," asked Senator Beveridge, "that notwithstanding the presendly relations between ountries, England might declare war if we should construct the canal with ulation, and added that he had only referred to this possibility in order to emphasize his opinion that the canal should be constructed in any contin-

In discussing the points of the treaty with Senator Teller, the Alabama senator expressed the view that the Clayton-Bulwer treaty was unconstitutional, and for this reason, if for no other, said it should be disregarded.






