TAX BILL DOOMED.

Senate Shows Itself Hostile to the Proposed Pin-gree Legislation.

VOTES TO ADJOURN TODAY

House by Large Majority, However, Declines to Concur, and Will Take Up the Measure This Morning.

UPPER BRANCH TO KILL IT

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 13.—The reception that the taxation bills which Governor Pingree called the special session to consider will receive in the upper house of the legislature was evinced this afternoon, when the senate adopted a concurrent resolution to adjourn tomorrow and leave the consideration of all taxation measures to the incoming legislature.

OVER 200 CHINESE DROWN.

RUSH TO SIDE OF BOAT TO SEE MAN WHO FELL OVERBOARD COLLAPSES THE CRAFT.

Canton, Dec. 13.—The falling overboard of a man from a passenger boat on West river, near Ho Kau, today led to a rush by the some 400 passengers to the side of the vessel, which caused her to sink, over two hundred persons being drowned.

BRUTAL ASSAULT BY THIEVES.

TWO CHICAGO WOMEN ARE BEATEN AND ROBBED OF VALUABLES WORTH FOUR THOUSAND.

Chicago, Dec. 13.—Diamonds, watches and gold coin to the value of \$4,000 comprised the loot of two men, gained tonight by a brutal assault on Mrs. H. H. Alpin and Mrs. Nada Hart in the home of the former, 417 Washington boulevard. One of the women was beaten into insensibility and the other, already helpless from illness, was cruelly maltreated in the mad search for hidden wealth. The robbers escaped.

JURY HOPELESSLY DIVIDED.

NO VERDICT IN MORRISON CASE IN SIGHT, BUT DELIBERATIONS ARE ORDERED CONTINUED.

Eldorado, Kas., Dec. 13.—Judge Shinn sent the Morrison jurors to their hotel at 9:30 tonight and instructed them to resume their deliberations at 8:30 o'clock tomorrow morning. The twelve men have informed the court that they are hopelessly of different minds as regards Miss Morrison's guilt and have stopped balloting in the jury room. Judge Shinn will give out no intimation as to the length of time he will permit the jury to deliberate. It is considered likely he will let them stay out the remainder of the week.

BOX OFFICE HELD UP.

OPERA HOUSE TREASURER AT SIOUX CITY BADLY WOUNDED BY WOULD-BE THIEVES WHILE PERFORMANCE IS GOING ON.

Sioux City, Ia., Dec. 13.—While a performance was going on at the Grand Opera House tonight two masked robbers entered the box office and held up a revolver in the face of Treasurer Harley Rounds. He reached for his revolver, when one of the robbers fired, the bullet passing through Rounds' clothing under the arm. The robbers then pounded Rounds over the head, fracturing his skull. Becoming frightened, they made their escape without securing any booty.

MAIL CAR PLUNDERED.

REGISTERED POUCH RIFLED AND CLERK BADLY WOUNDED—OCCURS IN SOUTHWEST.

Texarkana, Ark., Dec. 13.—Robbers gained an entrance to the mail car on the northbound Cotton Belt passenger train between Bassett, Tex., and this city between 6 and 7 o'clock this morning and secured the contents of several registered mail pouches. It is not known how much money they carried off, but among the pouches ripped open was the mail pouch of a passenger, which contained several valuable packages, and it is believed the men made a rich haul. John M. Dennis, the mail clerk, was found insensible from a blow on the head when the train reached this city. He is in a critical condition. When notified by the passenger manager that two men were in the vestibule of the mail car beat him into unconsciousness with a stove shovel. Posses have been sent in various directions, and two suspects were arrested at Naples, Ark. No trace of the missing registered packages, however, was found on them.

GANS EASY FOR TERRY.

Negro Makes Miserable Showing and Loses in Short Order.

SECOND ROUND SETTLES IT

McGov. rn Puts Up Fast Fight and Well Merits the Title He Gains of Lightweight Champion.

CHARGES OF FAKE MADE.

Chicago, Dec. 13.—Terry McGovern is now the undisputed lightweight champion of the world. He knocked out Joe Gans of Baltimore after two minutes and five seconds of fighting in the second round. Gans put up a very poor exhibition and was never "in it" at any stage of the game. McGovern started running him at the sound of the gong and never let up until Gans was counted out.

ACTED AS THOUGH AFRAID.

McGovern put up a clean, fast fight from start to finish, and is entitled to all the credit of the victory. He fought hard and fast, his blows went home straight to the mark and if the fight is to be cried down at all it is on account of the miserable showing made by Gans. During the first round the Negro failed to mix it. He made no effort to use his left counter, for which he was so famous, and did nothing but back away with a frightened look on his face.

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BURGLARIES IN ILLINOIS.

Mattoon, Ill., Dec. 13.—A gang of burglars has been operating extensively in Coles and Edgar counties the past forty-eight hours. At Ashmore, Herrmann's safe was rifled of \$250 and at Metcalf the postoffice and four business houses were ransacked and much valuable booty taken. Officers are in pursuit.

GREAT BOER VICTORY REPORTED.

CAMP OF CLEMENTS SAID TO HAVE BEEN CAPTURED, WITH SEVERAL COMPANIES OF BRITISH TROOPS.

London, Friday, Dec. 14.—The Daily Express publishes a rumor of a serious disaster to British arms. According to this report, Boers attacked the camp of General Clements, in the Barberton district of the Transvaal, capturing the camp, killing a number of British officers and making prisoners of all the British troops, including four companies of Northumberland fusiliers. The story is not confirmed in any quarter and not generally believed.

BUSHMEN WANTED BACK.

Cape Town, Dec. 13.—Lord Kitchener has cabled the authorities of South Australia asking that the convalescent bushmen be returned to South Africa. Sir Alfred Milner has been gazetted administrator of Orange River colony and the Transvaal.

"KID" BROAD LOSES ONE.

Baltimore, Dec. 13.—Billy Whistler of Baltimore was given the decision over "Kid" Broad of Cleveland at the end of a twenty-round bout at the Germania tonight.

JOE WOLCOTT THE WINNER.

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 13.—Bill Hanabara of New York was knocked out in the twelfth round tonight by Joe Walcott, the colored pugilist.

BOY HAS HORRIBLE FATE.

DRAWN BY HORSE AND BATTERED BEYOND RECOGNITION.

Columbus, Ind., Dec. 13.—Dragging at the heels of a frightened horse, a boy named Hall was battered to death at Mt. Liberty today. Two other companions, named Pittman and Cooper, in a spirit of boyish recklessness, tied young Hall to the horse's back, telling him they would teach him to become a circus rider. The rider clung to the frightened animal's back for some distance, but in his terror lost his hold and fell under the horse's hoofs. The fleeing animal was captured nearly a mile away, but not until the rider had been kicked and battered beyond recognition.

WHOLESALE REBEL SURRENDERS.

FILIPINOS IN PANAY SAID TO BE SWEARING ALLEGIANCE AT RATE OF 1,000 A DAY.

Manila, Dec. 13.—General Kobbe, with the Twenty-eighth Volunteer regiment, Colonel Birks commanding, landed at Kagayan, on the northern coast of Mindanao, on Monday, and reinforced the six companies of the Fourth Volunteer regiment stationed in the town. An aggressive movement has been planned. From Iloilo it is unofficially reported that the insurgents in that part of the island of Panay are swearing allegiance at the rate of a thousand per day. The arrests of many prominent insurgents started the movement, which seems to be becoming universal at Iloilo, Moro, Mandurrao, Arevalo and Iloilo. Considerable sums of money and large quantities of supplies have been captured by the Americans.

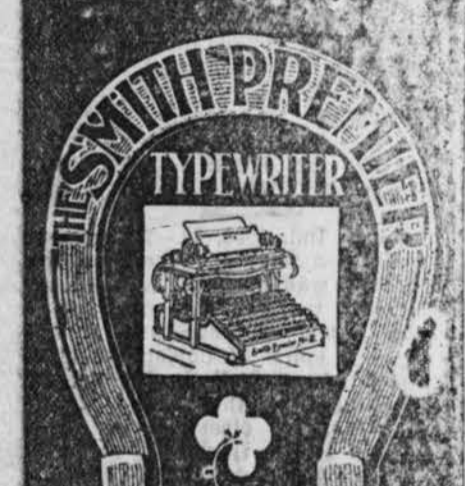

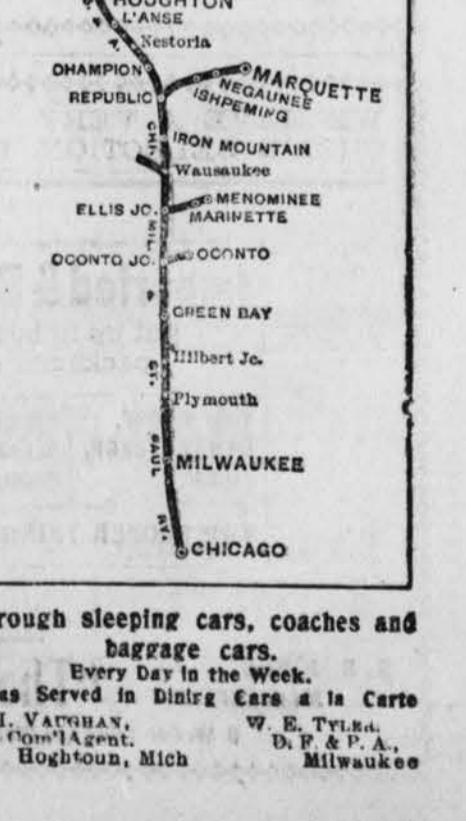

TO DEFEND THE CANAL.

Senate by Big Majority Amends the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty.

KILLS NEUTRALITY CLAUSE.

Sentiment Proves Much in Favor of Uncle Sam Absolutely Controlling the Nicaraguan Waterway.

ADMINISTRATION DEFEAT.

Washington, Dec. 13.—In accordance with a previous agreement, the senate in executive session took a vote at 3 o'clock today on the amendment to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty authorizing the United States to defend its interests of the canal.

The negative votes were as follows: Baird, Beveridge, Frye, Foster, Hancock, Lindsay, Mason, McCumber, McHenry, McBride, Morgan, Moore, Stewart, Tillman, Wellington, Wolcott and Gallinger.

After the amendment offered by the committee was passed upon, various other amendments received the attention of the senate for a brief time, but none of them were acted upon.

ELKINS SPEAKS FOR DEFENSE.

Previous to taking the vote on the committee amendment, Senator Elkins occupied the greater portion of the senate's time with a speech advocating the radical alteration of the treaty.

FORTIFICATIONS NOT PROPOSED.

As the treaty arranged with Great Britain by the administration stood before the adoption of the amendment today, the United States guaranteed the neutrality of the canal at all times.

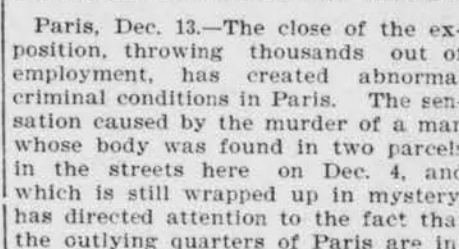
