REMARKABLE CASE CADILLAC (MICH.)

Chicago, Wednesday, Dec. 26 .- The hronicle this morning says: "Proof that a man may live with a ullet in his heart was afforded yesterday by the use of the X-ray upon Chas. B. Nelson of Cadillac, Mich., formerly a Chicagoan, who was, in 1896, the central figure in a sensational shooting case here that nearly resulted in his death. Under the floroscope the ball in Nelson's heart could be plainly seen rising and falling with each pulsation of the organ. The bullet has

been there since July, 1896. "The mysterious circumstances surounding the shooting of Nelson made it one of the sensational episodes in the history of Chicago. Nelson while in company with Margaret Staples in Washington Park was shot by a negro, who afterward escaped, and the mystery surrounding the affair was never eleared up.


