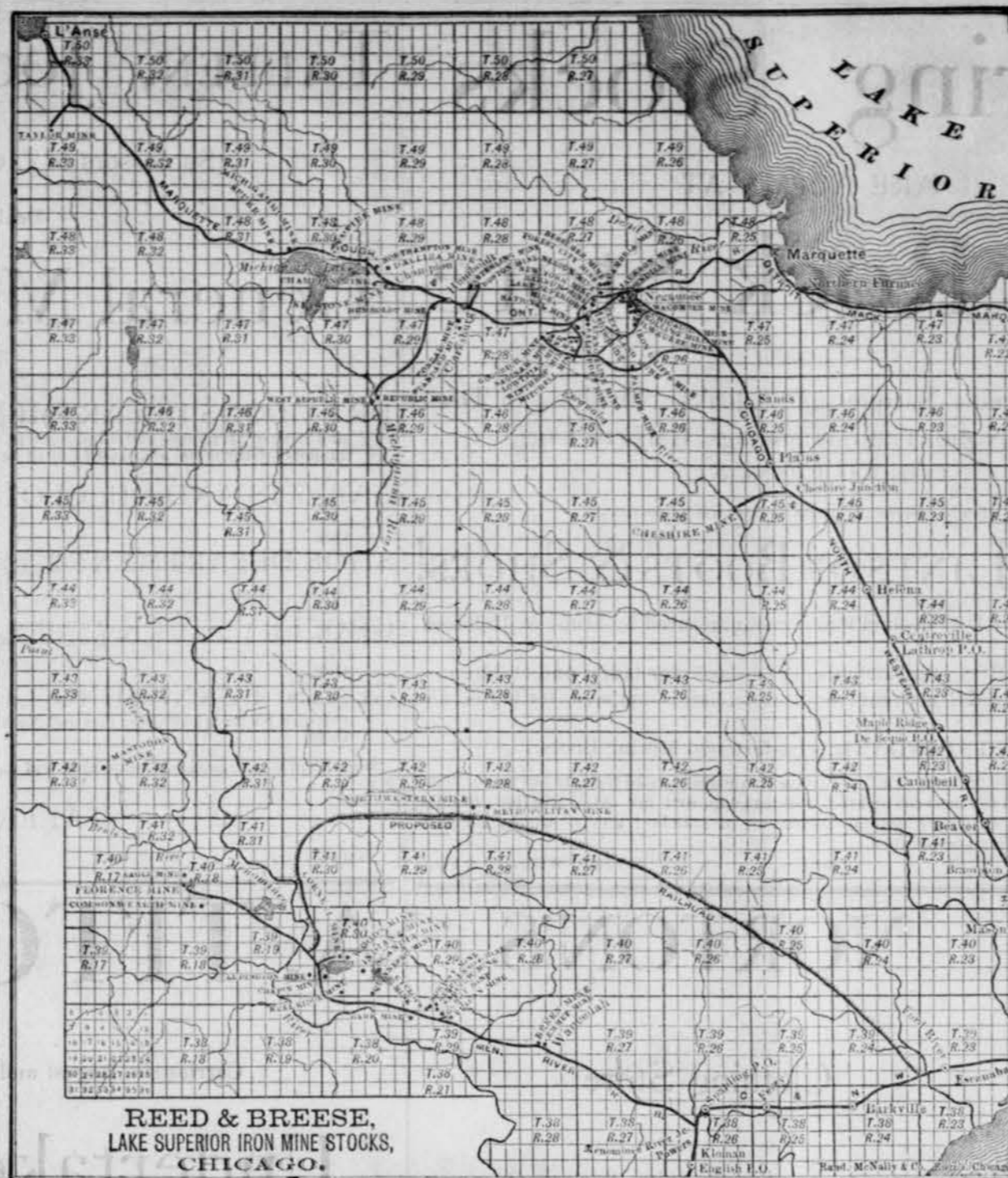

BLAST FURNACES.

At one time in its history the manufacture of charcoal pig iron was one of the most important industries in the upper peninsula; but owing to the exhaustion of the fuel supply in the near vicinity some of the furnaces have been abandoned, and the product has fallen off from 90,494 tons in 1874 to 48,523 tons in 1880.

NEGAUNEE.

The firemen were out for practice on Thursday evening. Physicians report the general health of the city good. Hon. W. H. Barnum is expected to arrive in the city next week. Hon. John Mulvey has returned from Lansing, and once more enters upon the life of a humble citizen. MAIN street, (Packer avenue) holds the premium as being the handsomest thoroughfare in the county. Dr. Desjardins has been appointed physician and surgeon to the Cheshire mine, beginning with June 1st. New shirts are to be procured for the fire company, and, according to chief-engineer Anthony, some of the boys need 'em. THE pea-nut vendors and dealers in soda water and cigars are compelled to keep their places closed on Sunday forenoon the same as the saloons. Rev. Mr. Ashley failed to come to time on his Sunday morning appointment, and the Calvinists worshipped with the Armenians. There will be no service in Winter's hall to-morrow. ON account of a failure to procure music for the 24th inst, the firemen will be compelled to postpone their intended hop to some other date. It will not be postponed for more than a week, however. WEI STEIN'S museum of minerals is now in readiness for the inspection of tourists and persons in quest of choice specimens. Iron, copper, silver, agates and precious stones in every variety, and all plainly marked. THE Baker family arrived in the city on Thursday, and have commenced the organization of local talent for the purpose of presenting the oratorio of "The Court of Babylon," in about two weeks from now. COUNTERFEITERS follow the Beckett circus, but thanks to the press—the Escanaba Post in particular—the people of this city were warned in time, and went through the sounding process with every coin received from a stranger on Wednesday. THE last man in the city to be beaten by the women folk was Prof. V. B. Cochran, and he didn't get any more than he deserved, either. The school marms clubbed together and aimed him last Monday evening. It was a gold-headed affair, and bore the inscription, "To Hon. V. B. Cochran, in acknowledgment of his kindness to the teachers of Negaunee."

THE base ball club may seem to be sleeping, but it is not. Interest in the club is not being lessened by the apparent quietness. The boys are only keeping quiet until their captain returns from the bush, when activities will be renewed and not allowed to let up till every club in the upper peninsula shall be compelled to acknowledge them the champions of the u. p. diamond field.

A DRUNKEN row occurred in a saloon on Jackson street late last Sunday night, and had not the marshal interfered some blood might have been spilled, as revolvers had been resorted to. Two of the brawlers were arrested and jailed. One of the men did damage to the cell furniture to the amount of a seventeen dollar fine and costs, which he paid. The other man was fined nine dollars and costs, and the proprietor of the saloon was also brought to time and fined for keeping a disorderly house.

THE city presented quite a holiday appearance on Wednesday, the occasion being the visit of Beckett's circus. This company gave two performances during the day and were greeted each time with a large audience. Their ring performances gave universal satisfaction, although the prevalent opinion concerning the clown, that Mr. Beckett would do well to trade him off for a cheap dog, and then give the animal away. The tumbling was fully as good as anything of the kind ever seen in the city.

AN ordinance was adopted at the Monday evening meeting of the common council which will hereafter compel all persons convicted for violation of any city ordinance, or who shall be confined in the city lock-up for the non-payment of any fine, forfeiture or costs, to make their calling and election profitable by joining the chain gang and doing work on the boulevard or other public works, with compensation fixed at fifty cents per day with board. The enforcement of this ordinance will, in our opinion, have a tendency to diminish drunkenness and disorderly conduct in no small degree.

WHAT promises to be one of the largest and most valuable of any of the recently discovered iron ore deposits in this region has recently been brought to light on the west fractional half of the north-west quarter of section 30, town 47 north, range 26 west, less than a mile west of the Pittsburgh and Lake Superior mine. The explorations so far made have been most flattering, and as the work of testing and stripping progresses the prospects of rich developments increase. In the first test pit, after passing through six feet of mixed sand and hematite, a body of soft red hematite was encountered, eight feet

under which a body of hard red specular ore was struck, into which the pit was sunk four feet to the solid ledge. At the bottom, and in one corner of this pit, soap rock was found, and thus the dip of the ore determined. Ten feet further west another pit was sunk ten feet in soft ore. The ore, both soft and hard, appears to be of a superior quality. Should the developments yet to be made reach the expectations of the lessees, they will have a mine which, for convenience in working and facilities for shipping, could not be better situated, as it is on the side of a hill, and but half a mile from the C. & N. W. R. Y. The lessees are Geo. O. and T. J. Houston, Ira A. Clark, M. A. Gibbs, Geo. R. Persons, and Capt. James Mitchell, the last mentioned having charge of the explorations. The above gentlemen have a lease of the land for 20 years.

THIS month being the twelfth anniversary of the building of the M. E. church, that society proposes holding anniversary exercises fitting to the occasion, beginning with to-day and continuing through to-morrow and Monday. The services for to-day will consist of a lecture at 8 o'clock this evening, by the pastor, on the "History of the Negaunee M. E. church, and incidentally of the city and the other churches." This lecture has been carefully prepared, and has cost Mr. Parrish much valuable time in the gathering of facts and statistics, and cannot but be interesting to all who have watched the religious growth of the city. On Sunday morning, at the usual hour, Rev. D. W. Misener will preach, a children's service will be held at 2:30 p. m., and at 7:30 p. m. Rev. W. E. Bigelow, of Ishpeming, will preach. On Monday evening, at 7:30, a platform meeting will be held, on which occasion singing, short addresses and refreshments will be the order. It is quite likely that Rev. C. C. McCabe will deliver an address on Monday afternoon, but at this time it is uncertain.

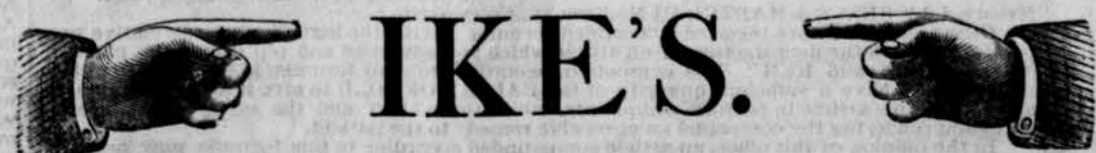
