ARMED FOR THE ARGUMENT.
Settlers in the Iron River District Organizing
to Defend Their Claims Against Con-
testing Cash-Entrusted.

Florence Mining News: The settlers in the
Iron River district have organized and armed
themselves to protect their interests and
drive off lumbermen, who are cutting pine on
lands they purchased years ago, but which
have come into dispute owing to a technical
error on the part of the government and the
dishonesty of certain piratical shysters at
Washington and elsewhere. Contractor
Fraser, who is jobbing for Culbertson and
Jennings & Gilbey, and the Monomine River
Lumber Co., expect to have trouble. Mr. F.
Morrison, agent for G. G. Peters, started to
a Mining News representative that he would
stand no nonsense. "I have been instructed
by Mr. Peters to pursue a legal course," he
said. "We do not hire men to fight, and we
do not expect a party of men, armed with
nothing but shot, to oppose those armed with
repeating rifles. So, if we are compelled to
we shall stop, but will see that the proper
authorities protect us, and deal as they should
with those who threaten us and place our
lives in danger." It was stated a week ago
that 115 of the settlers had signed articles of
agreement to stand by each other and protect
their interests at all hazards. Fifty or sixty
of these are armed with rifles and they make
a very formidable body. Nightly meetings
are held, and it is stated that they will get
into serious trouble if they persist in pur-
suing the course of outwary which has been
inaugurated. If they have rights which are
being trespassed upon, they can certainly take
legal measures to protect themselves and not
destroy sympathy they might otherwise have
by patrolling the woods in armed mobs, threat-
ening and menacing those who can quote an
hundred reasons for believing they are perfectly
right.

OUR POSTAL SERVICE.

Summary of the Report Submitted to the President, for Transmission to Congress, by Postmaster-General Vilas.

A Large Deficiency for the Year, Arising From Diminished Revenues and Increased Expenditures—The Ocean Mail Service Matter—Recommendations to Congress.
