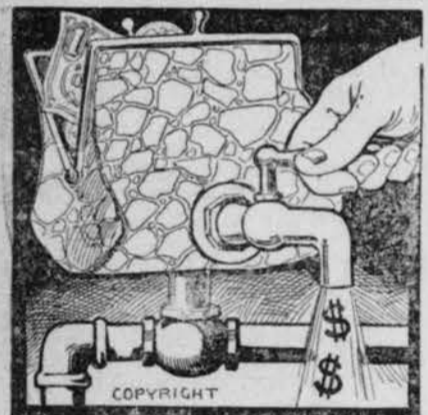

WANT NO RESERVE FUND.
WOODMEN SOCIETY TURNS DOWN THE PROPOSITION TO PROVIDE AN EMERGENCY FUND BY A VOTE OF TWO TO ONE.

A vote was taken in all the local camps of the Modern Woodman society at the first meeting in December, to determine whether or not the society would establish a reserve fund in connection with its insurance. The proposition was defeated by a vote of two to one. Only fifty per cent. of all the members voted, the total number of votes cast being 280,000. A report from all the camps has been forwarded to Head Clerk Maj. C. W. Hawes at Rock Island, Ill. He has made the following announcement relative to the vote:

"The emergency, or reserve, fund proposition has been defeated. We have not yet completed the count but I should judge that the proposition is lost by a vote of two to one. Not more than half the members of the society voted. The total vote will not be over 280,000. The defeat of this measure will prevent any action on the part of the society at its coming national convention to provide for the organization's future. Personally I never favored a reserve fund. What has been known as a legal reserve has always been out of the question in my opinion. But I do favor an emergency fund. I think that some sort of a fund is a necessity and the members of the society will come to realize this soon. However, as the members are the ones directly concerned, and as this vote was in the nature of a referendum, there will be no attempt made to make any provision for the society's future until the members delegate their authority to the head camp. All things considered, it is probably just as well that the proposition was defeated at this time. It will not hurt the society to delay the matter for another two years."

The result of the vote came as a great surprise to the members of the organization in the upper peninsula. Here the vote was almost unanimously in favor of the proposed fund. Every member was of the opinion that a fund of this kind would add strength to the organization. Although the proposition is defeated, prominent members of the society in this section will begin at once to again agitate for the institution of some such fund, as they consider it essential to the society's continued strength and advancement.

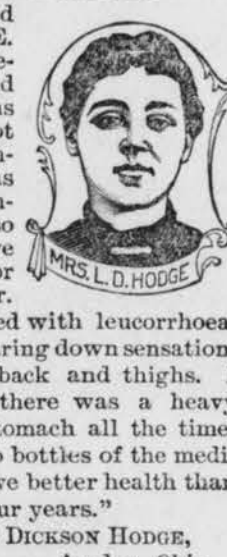
