





OPPOSITION HEARD FROM.

Wellington, Pettigrew and Teller Take Turn About in Criticising the Conduct of the Government.

LITTLE PROGRESS ON BILL

Washington, Jan. 4 .- For five hours today the senate discussed the army reorganization bill. 




