

natters has pointed all along to Jan uary as the month that would develop the situation. But Cleveland sentiment, it would appear, is slow to crystallize. Iron ore men here seem least of all disposed to have "views" on the question of prices for 1901; the disposition is rather to let the conditions in the general iron market point the way. It is argued that though that the price for 1900 turned out to be too high, it was not out of line when made, and who have little or no ore supplies of their own. It is felt that old range Bessemers, with nothing but supply and demand governing, will bring a good price, and in some quarters there is not the same anxiety about an agree ment as in some other years. One producer of Bessemer and non-Besseme ores was on the outside last year, and though its production of Bessemer ores was not large and its price was probably but a few cents below the agreed basis, any concession would be sufficient under such circumstances to enable the one outside interest to dispose of its entire product, while others in a year like 1900 would have ore to carry over. But whatever the outcome as to old range ores it is perfectly well understood that the Mesaba situation will be a free-for-all, with the prospect of even greater disparity in price between old range and new range ores than heretofore. While the Mesaba produced about 42 per cent, of the total last year, it is in position to put out much nearer one-half the Lake Superior production in the year just ahead, and it goes without saying that there will be something of a scramble to place it all. Thus far no interest is taken in the ore question by consumers; at least none of them are making inquiries about prices. The vessel situation, likewise, will not be hurried. Some feelers have been put out this week, but there is no real interest. It seems foregone that 50 cents will come off the Duluth contract rate of last year; how much more, is the question that will be threshed out in the next

Battleships, armored cruisers, fleet torpedo boats and other types of warships had been constructed under his direction, and no serious

fault or flaw discovered in any of then could be attributed to poor design. Probably no naval architect was more widely known than Sir John White, the British chief constructor, an official with high rank and large pay, but in the latter part of his career troubles came upon him in the simple design of a royal yacht. Several months ago the million-dollar yacht built for the queen capsized at her dock because of want of proper distribution of weights, and careful calculations made showed that gross carelessness had been displayed in her design, which resulted in her being top-heavy and altogether unsafe. British officials were shocked that such an accident could occur to a vessel built for royal persons, and all the blame was at once placed on the chief constructor. 


