

Washington, Jan. 14.-Just at the close of a day of dreary discussion of the technical details of the army reorganization bill, Senator Teller of Colorado, speaking to an amendment he had offered, delivered a sensational denunciation of General Eagan, former commissary general of the United States army. His statement included also the administration because General Eagan had been retired, according to the Colorado senator's charge, as "a decoration and reward" for his attack

"He cannot be gotten rid of in any other way," said Senator Teller, "and he ought not to be gotten rid of in any circumstances.'

Senator Teller adverted to the case of General Eagan at some length. Of the beef furnished the army, he said it was "boiled, canned and of very ancient lineage, some of which had made a trip to Europe and back, being fed to our soldiers after it had been condemned by European governments.

Senator Teller denounced General Eagan in sensational language. "As an officer of the United States army, said the senator, "he made an exhibition of himself and showed himself to be a miserable blackguard." Referring to General Eagan's denial of the Miles charges as to "embalmed beef," Senator Teller declared that "his language was brutal and low, so bad it could not be overlooked, although there is a very evident desire to overlook it."

The Colorado senator then made a stinging attack upon the president for having retired General Eagan, asserting that "the retirement, in the circumstances, was a decoration, not a punishment, and many of the American people believe it was a decoration and reward for his attack upon the general commanding the army." Then at considerable length Senator Teller discussed the case of Major Wham. At the conclusion of Senator Teller's

SALT RESTORED HIS LIFE.

OHIO MAN BROUGHT BACK FROM APPARENT DEATH TO STATE OF CONSCIOUSNESS.

Hamilton, O., Jan. 14.-After having been dead for some minutes so far as medical skill could determine, Marcus Sauer, sixty-two years old, of No. 516 South Second street was restored to life by the injection of chloride of sodium common salt) this afternoon, in accordance with the elixir of life theory of Professors Jaques Loeb and C D. Lingle of the University of Chicago. The physician who made the remarkable experiment has been treating Mr auer for acute dropsy and at 12:15. 'clock this afternoon he was hurriedly ummoned on information that his paound that Mr. Sauer had evidently just assed the point of dissolution.

Every symptom immediately followng death was present. The extremities were cold as lead, the lungs were not moving, exygenation of the blood in the lungs was suspended and there was no perceptible action of the heart, as wrist tests gave no indication of any pulse whatever. Dr. Kumler called the several sons of Mr. Sauer, who were present, to feel the wrists for the pulse action, and they could dis-

over no signs of it. nto Mr. Sauer's left arm a solution of nloride of sodium, or salt. In twenty nds there was a slight response to the action of the salt, as the heart bean to flutter and move. 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

the great lake fleet. Today there are nore ships under way : n ever, and launchings will continue till spring at the rate of two and three weekly. The tonnage to be built during the present year will exceed that of 1900 and will add nearly 5,000,000 tons to the capacity of the fleet for the year. There are forty large freight ships under way on the lakes, or planned for early construction, and new contracts may be taken any day that will add to the list. It is notable that among this large new tonnage there is not a single ship for the great iron ore mining and transportation companies that have been the most active in shipbuilding for a few years back. The policy of these great companies is not changed, they are but waiting till there is another period of high freights, when they will build new ships or buy some Hours of misery at leisure or at now building. 



IT WAS A HOT ONE.

The fire was a hot one. The store, basement and the main floor, and the adjoining ware house, were packed to their capacity with groceries, flour, hav, grain and feed. Mr. Shaw was stocked right up to the limit. He had never carried more goods, the fire catching him at the most disadvantageous time possible. Three car loads of supplies unloaded the veek previous to the blaze. Between 8 and 9 o'clock the interior of the store was Hterally a raging furnace which emmitted a tremendous heat. Water seemed to have no effect on the flames. turning into huge clouds of steam without appearing to diminish their fury. The fire was at its height about 9 o'clock. After that hour it began to lose ground and along towards noon it was practically out, although men were kept at work drenching the ruins all through the afternoon and they are vet smoldering today.
