**WAITING FOR A TURN.**  
That Is the Business of the Copper Sharks These Days.  
There are no new developments in coppers. The market is dull but very strong and it is generally believed that the turn cannot be far off. Hayden, Stone & Co., wired the Laidley Commission Co., Saturday:  
"There is nothing in the copper situation. It is still very strong and there is a growing confidence in well informed circles that the period of inactivity in nearing an end. Boston will soon see a lively market and now is the time to buy, while things are dull. When they start they will go fast and high. We are big bulls on the better class of stocks and believe that now is the time to buy."  
A. R. Jones had the following on wheat:  
"Today pushed the price of wheat an even cent over last night's figure and the advance was nearly all retained. There seems to be no specially new development in the situation. Outsiders are taking an interesting part in the advance and the market responds easily to their influence. The falling off of the northwest receipts and the relative strength of the February wheat, indicating export business, are considered good backing for investment purchases. The scared shorts are doing the rest."

**ENVOIOUS GRAND RAPIDS.**  
Its Library Is on Second Floor of the City Hall.  
The following editorial published under the caption "Marquette's Library" in the Grand Rapids Herald will be read with interest here:  
"Marquette has a population of 11,000 and proposes to erect the finest library building in any of Michigan's minor municipalities. Local benefactors have gone down into their pockets for nearly \$20,000 and in addition a very desirable lot in the heart of the little city has been donated for public use. The present building, donated by Peter White, may be sold to complete the fund, and actual building operations will likely be commenced early in the season. The prospect is that Marquette county's metropolis will inside of a year be graced with a magnificent structure, a credit to the generosity of her citizens, a lasting monument to their beneficence, and an additional attraction to the appearance of their city. So much for Marquette."  
"Grand Rapids, on the other hand, lays claim to a population of 100,000 and boastfully stands as second best among the galaxy of Michigan municipalities. She might even disdain to be classed with little Marquette. Never-

theless while the citizens of one will draw their library books from a handsome stone front, the readers of the other will continue to attend upon the quarters on the second floor of the city hall. Marquette's example is worthy of emulation. If Grand Rapids cannot be favored with a Charles Hackett or an Andrew Carnegie or a John D. Rockefeller or a Peter White, at least it should contain within its corporate limits enough public-spirited citizens, who take pride in the city which has made them what they are, to create a general fund with which to erect a public library worthy of the second city."

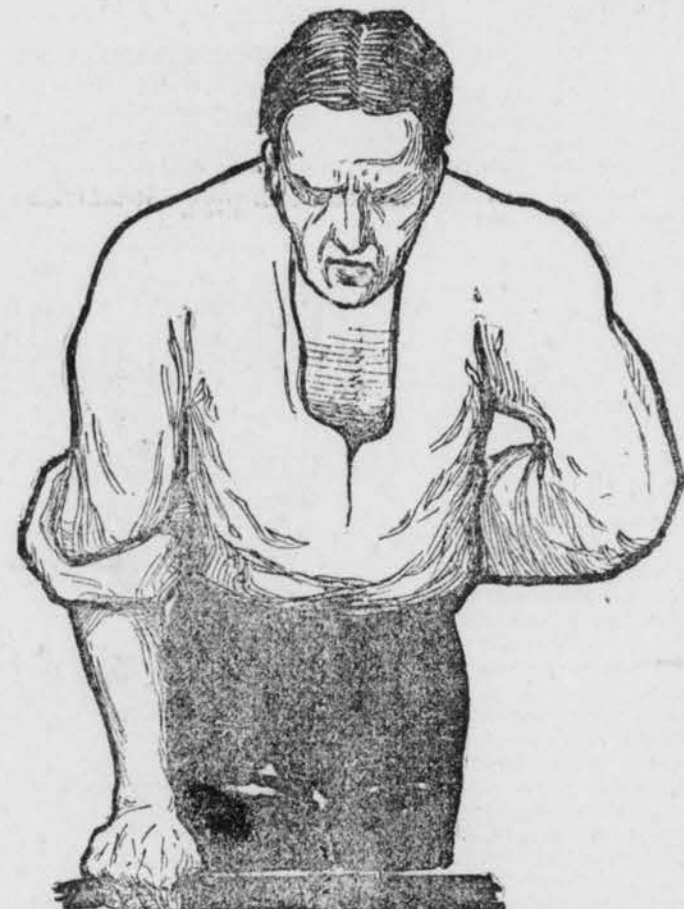
