DEATH OF TWO PIONEERS. CHAS. SKELTON OF ONTONAGON AND JUSTICE SOWDEN OF CALUMET SUCCEEDED, EACH AGED ABOUT SEVENTY YEARS.

Charles Skelton, an old-timer of copperdom and aged about seventy years, died at Ontonagon yesterday.

EX-Justice of the Peace Sowden of Calumet, a pioneer of copperdom, died last night. He was about seventy years of age.

WILL TURN OUT MONUMENTS. NEW INDUSTRY FOR THE COPPER COUNTRY ABOUT TO BE ESTABLISHED AT HOUGHTON.

Portage Lake is to have a monument works in the very near future. The works are to be located on one of the vacant lots with a frontage on Sheldon street at West Houghton.

The business will be conducted on a big scale. The upper peninsula will be thoroughly worked and most of the business to be had in that line will be secured if possible.

At present it is thought there will be six classes, three for the boys and three for the girls. The exercises will take place two times a week after school hours and every Saturday morning.

HONOR MARSHALL'S MEMORY. HOUGHTON COUNTY LAWYERS OBSERVE THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF HIS INSTALLATION AS THE NATION'S CHIEF JUSTICE.

At 9 o'clock yesterday morning Judge A. T. Streeter, of the circuit court, called to order those present in the court room and announced that the object of assembling at that time was to observe the day on which one hundred years ago John Marshall, the "Interpreter of the Constitution of the United States," took his seat as chief justice, which post he held for thirty-four years.

After a few remarks by the judge, Representative A. W. Kerr of Calumet read a set of resolutions commemorating the memory of John Marshall.

These were ordered spread upon the court journal of the day's proceedings. Mr. Kerr was followed by Allan F. Rees, the Houghton attorney, in an address upon the great jurist. The speaker compared the circumstances existing at the beginning of the present century with those at the commencement of the Nineteenth century.

The latter petition set forth that the South Shore road has the right to occupy and use the east twenty-six feet of that thoroughfare and that, according to the maps on file at the county register of deeds' office, the Marquette & Southeastern people will want fifteen feet more...

It was stated that fifteen feet was entirely too narrow a space for the roadway and that endless collisions and disasters would be the result of trying to get along with such inadequate facilities.

The petition of the physicians heartily endorsed everything set forth in the major portion and Street Commissioner French said that he should be most hearty in favor of widening Lake street if two roads are to occupy it.

FIFTY YEARS AN EDUCATOR.

Life of Rev. P. B. Spear, Father of J. W. and F. B. Spear, Citizens of Marquette.

HE WAS ONE OF THE SUPPORTING FILARS OF COLGATE UNIVERSITY.

His Services to This Institution Extended Over the Prime of His Life and Were of Immense Value to the College in Its Struggling Days.

HE DIED AT A RIPE OLD AGE.

The morning of January 25, a useful life was ended at Hamilton, N. Y., when Rev. P. B. Spear, father of J. W. and J. W. Spear of Marquette, passed on to his reward at the ripe old age of eighty-nine years.

He became an assistant teacher in 1825 and graduated from the institution in 1836, and from Madison Theological Seminary in 1838.

Prof. Spear received the degree of D. D. from Colby University. In all his teachings Prof. Spear was practical, methodical and thorough.

He insisted that it meant death to the Hamilton enterprise if this charter must stay or all go.

As student and professor Dr. Spear kept pace a century having personally known every member of the faculty and being familiar with the different phases of university history.

At Palmyra, August 23, 1878, Dr. Spear married Esther Jackson, who died January 19, 1878. In 1881 he married Mary Dielle of Plattsburgh, N. Y., who died last spring.
