The steamer Bon Ami is still navigating the north shore and Captain Singer, manager of the White Line Transportation company, wonders what is the matter with the light house keepers of Duluth and Two Harbors. 



Then again, when all other questions were settled and by deaths and resignations not even a quorum of Hamilton men were left on the university board, he took the responsibility, pecuniary and otherwise, of "negotiation and adjustment," at an hour when all that had been conosing the university charter and board and thus the university was saved by passing through the narrowest strain possible, there being but a bare quorum to act in the adjustment.

"The controversy ended, around Drs Eaton and Spear rallied the old enthusiasm and patronage and in three years brought back more than the old porsperity. 
