SAVES LIFE IN THE GRAVE.

DEVICE INVENTED TO PRE-CASE DEATH IN PREMATURE BURIAL.

New York, Feb. 13.-Emile Camis, once buried and willing to be again in order to show the efficacy of a device to save life in case of premature burial, arrived here yesterday. As a part of his luggage M. Camis brought with him the apparatus which he has himself tested in such a novel way.

1018 The device consists of a tube three and a half inches in diameter, fitted over an aperture in the coffin. At the top of this tube is a hermetically sealed box. On the breast of the supposed dead body is placed a ball, which is attached to a rod. The least move ment of the chest or of the body will be ground. LAURIER SEES LITTLE HOPE.

SETTLEMENT OF THE ALASKA BOUNDARY REGARDED AS A POSSIBILITY BY "The Doctor's sausages and strictly fresh eggs. CANADIAN PREMIER.

Ottawa, Feb. 13.-In reply to a question from the opposition respecting the present condition of negotiations with the United States concerning the Alaskan boundary, Sir Wilfred high commission was in just the same position today as it was at the close of last session. It had not been dissolved and would at the earliest possible mo-

ment resume negotiations. When parliament was last prorogued conditions for resuming negotiations were no favorable. There was a presidential election in progress in the United States and an election also in Canada, and it was impossible to do anything at that time. When the present session had closed

and the American congress had adjourned he had no doubt that they would be able to resume the negotiations, and he hoped they would be brought to a satisfactory conclusion. As to the Alaskan boundry he was sorry to say he had no more hope of a settlement than he had when it last came up in the house. The Americans nad taken a certain stand and so also had Canada, and it seemed almost impossible to reconcile their views. Without presuming to criticise the stand taken by the American commissioners he hoped that if the two countries could not effect an honorable settlement between themselves they would be able to reach an honorable compromise. Between two such countries there was no question that could not be settled by honorable compromise or arbitration. If they could not agree themselves certainly they could agree to follow a third party, a friendly power, and submit to arbitration.




