

MORE ALASKAN TROUBLE.

RICH GOLD DEPOSITS FOUND IN DEBATED TERRITORY NOW BY THE BRITISH.

New York, Feb. 21.-Reports have reached this city that rich gold deposits have been found in that section of Alaska formerly regarded as United States territory, but which, under the modus vivendi, has been transferred to British Columbia. These discoveries and the filing of


