ROSE FOR THE RANKS.

REPORTED A DULUTH CONCERN IS TO ESTABLISH ONE AT HOUGHTON—SITE SELECTED.

It is rumored in Houghton that the village will soon have another branch meat house—similar to those of Nelson Morris & Co. and Swift & Co. of Chicago—in a short time. The concern mentioned in this connection is Knutson & Ferguson, wholesale meat dealers of Duluth and well-known at Portage Lake. The site, it is said, has already been selected for a suitable and up-to-date refrigerator building. It is near Euelle & Dube's, near the Houghton yard of the South Shore. The location is excellent, being central and at the same time convenient to the railroad.

The report comes from reliable authority, and although it could not be verified yesterday it may be taken for granted that it is true. The agent—Mr. VanPopple—of the company in this district has been busy making preparatory arrangements, it is said. The Duluth firm is the one that conducted the boarding camps for the men while the Copper Range road was in the course of construction and is doing so now for C. J. Johnson, who is building the line to Redridge. Houghton is evidently considered a good center for the meat trade.

OLD COMPANY SELLS OUT.

A deal was recently made in Houghton whereby the Houghton County Street Railway Advertising Company transfers all of its business to a similar concern of Duluth. The former company is now defunct and from now on the latter will control all advertising done in cars on the local lines. E. L. Coleman, who is at the head of the Duluth company, came to Houghton for the purpose of closing the transaction. He is still in the city and is at present making yearly contracts with Portage Lake merchants for space in the cars. For a certain stated sum each one secures a limited space in every car on the road and all additional ones to be put in commission. It is Mr. Coleman's intention to give the local business men the first chance before any foreign advertising is placed in the cars. He has enough of the latter to supply the cars full several times over. The Duluth firm operates on a big scale and has extensive control of the advertising in street cars throughout the country, being the main competitor of the similar firm of George Kissam & Co., of Chicago.

COL. BATES, WHO BECOMES A LIEUTENANT IN REGULARS, HAS GOOD MILITARY RECORD.

Robert J. Bates of Ironwood, whose appointment to a lieutenantancy in the regular army of the United States was mentioned in these columns yesterday, has a long and honorable military record. He enlisted as a private, Nov. 10, 1890, in Company H, Fifth Infantry, Michigan National Guard, later passing through the grades of corporal, sergeant and first sergeant. He was elected second lieutenant in April, 1894, and served through the mining strike at Ironwood, being on duty for thirty days, together with his and four other companies. Then he was elected first lieutenant of his company, July 30, 1894, and was on duty with his command at the Ishpeming and Negaunee mining troubles for twenty-eight days, in 1895. On Sept. 28, 1896, he was elected captain and was mustered into the volunteer army as captain of Company H, Thirty-fourth regiment, Michigan Volunteer Infantry, April 28, 1898, serving through the campaign before Santiago as commander of the Second battalion of his regiment. Upon the mustering out of the Thirty-fourth Michigan he reorganized his National Guard company, which then became, as now, Company I, Third Infantry, and then followed his election at Saginaw as a colonel for a term of three years.

The demand for horses in Hancock is generally good at this time of the year and Mr. Coughlin will have no difficulty in finding buyers for the carload. TO OPERATE ON A BIG SCALE.

LETTING OF CONTRACT FOR 52 HOUSES SHOWS THE CONFIDENCE IN THE CHAMPION.

The fact that Parker & Hammill, Hancock contractors and builders, have secured a contract from the Champion Mining Company calling for the building of fifty-two houses—forty at the mine and the remainder at the mill—is evidence enough of the progressive policy of the company for the coming summer. It shows the confidence of the directors in the property. It means a good-sized sum of money spent on surface improvements, but also much more—that of mining operations on a large scale. Families will be brought in to occupy the new houses and the force of men at the mine greatly increased. It has been the intention of the company for some time, as has been previously spoken of, to open the mine extensively and to that end to build up a good sized settlement at the property in order to accommodate the increased number of men who are to be employed. Hence the contract for the houses. The structures will be nothing elaborate, but comfortable frame dwellings, each having seven rooms.

Day after day is seen evidence of the activity on the South range and of the even greater amount of work that will be done during the coming summer, when hundreds of additional men will likely be employed. Steel, machinery and other materials for construction work on the new mills at Redridge are being received at the lively little place whose future prosperity looms up well at present.

ISLE ROYALE INSTALLS BIG SKIP.

The new six-ton capacity skip, the first ever operated on the south side of Portage Lake, went into commission at the Isle Royale No. 1 shaft yesterday. This shaft is now ready for regular production. No. 2 shaft is similarly equipped within ten days, while the big compressor is also ready. It is expected that one head at the mill will start on May 1, the second head on May 15 and a third head soon after. The new shafts will receive no attention until the mine is on the producing list.

MINE PRODUCTS.

Copper at London yesterday was 78.6d lower, to 68s. 12s. 6d for spot and \$9.28, 6d for futures. At New York the market was featureless and largely nominal on the basis of 17 cents for Lake Superior and 16½ for casting and electrolytic.
