DATES CHANGED.
Annual County Fair Will Be Held the First Week in September.

At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the Marquette County Agricultural association it was decided to hold the annual fair for 1901 during the first week in September. Instead of in the last week, as has been the custom during the past few years. The change is made in an attempt to escape the bad weather which has been the society's lot for the past couple of years. It is believed that the first week in September will be notable for its fine weather and if this proves the case it will be the permanent date for future fairs.

Other considerations led the directors to favor the change. In the early part of September many summer visitors are still in the city and their patronage will swell the receipts largely. Toward the latter part of the month all these outsiders have departed for their homes and the fair only attracts Marquette county people.

Joe Fay and William A. Ross are the members of the committee on entertainment for the 1901 fair. Mr. Fay will look after the horse racing and track sports and Mr. Ross will have charge of the circus features. The entertainment program will be unusually elaborate next fall as the directors have allowed the committee more money than has ever before been spent. It has been authorized to contract obligations to the extent of \$1,500. This sum, which will be judiciously expended on attractive features, assures one of the best fairs in the association's history.

INCREASE POWER PLANT.

Street Railway People Have Just Received New Engine and Two New Boilers.

ADDITION WILL PRACTICALLY DOUBLE PRESENT CAPACITY.

It is Likely That New 300 Horse Power Generator Will Also Be Purchased to Put System in First Class Condition for Summer Business.

MAY EXTEND TO THE FAIR GROUNDS

The Marquette & Presque Isle Street Railway company has just received a notable addition to its power equipment in the shape of an engine and two boilers.

The engine has a nominal horse power of 231, the boilers being each of 199 horse power, duplicating the pair of boilers now in use.

The new machinery arrived this week. It is now being unloaded and will at once be moved to the power house, where its installation will proceed without delay.

While the addition of the new power in itself a great improvement, still it will hardly be effective unless the present generating capacity of the plant is largely increased.

The company's officials realize this and, accordingly, they are figuring on installing a new 300 horse power generator, a machine which would have almost double the capacity of that now in use.

It has not been definitely decided to purchase the second generator, but there is little question that it will be put in. If this proves the case the railway will be in the best condition to handle its summer traffic in its history and it will get all the nickels that is coming to it without any of the annoyances and unforeseen accidents which have characterized its operations in past seasons.

Four twenty-five horse power motors are also late additions to the company's equipment. They will be installed in pairs in two of the company's cars so that the line will have two additional motors this season.

All that is wanted to make the plant the best equipped in the upper country is the proposed new generator and its installation is regarded as almost a certainty.

A FINANCIAL PROBLEM. Other changes in connection with the system are contingent on the solution of a financial problem. For the past year the company has had a bond issue of \$75,000 on the market.

It was launched at a rather unfavorable time and it was impossible to effect a sale immediately. Now there are said to be rosier prospects of placing the bonds without much further delay.

If they are sold the money they bring will be sufficient to discharge all outstanding bonds and obligations and still leave the company some \$20,000.

If this happy consummation is reached important improvements will be undertaken, chief among which will be the proposed extension of the system to the Fair grounds.

The officials of the road are all in favor of this extension and were the

money available it would be undertaken without delay. It is realized that the Fair grounds would become a popular resort, if street car facilities furnished adequate means of reaching them. Now they are so isolated from the city that it is impossible to utilize them for any purpose of public amusement.

The street car officials think that a revival of baseball would be a consequence of the extension of their line. As, apparently, the only obstacle in the way of a renewal of interest in the game at the present time is the lack of a suitable diamond. Were the Fair grounds accessible it is probable that not a week would pass but they would be the scene of some sporting event which would be a sufficient attraction to draw hundreds of Marquette people.

A GOOD YEAR. The street railway should enjoy the banner business of its history during the next few months. It appears that Marquette is going to be very lively this season and it seems that there is going to be much doing in North Marquette.

When the Cleveland-Cliffs people get to work on their new furnace many men will be employed in this direction and railroad construction will also demand a force of labor from which the company will derive more or less revenue.

These conditions, together with the regular summer traffic to Presque Isle and the L. S. & I. docks and shops, should give the street car a big traffic.

The officers of the line feel very hopeful of the future. They see that the prospects of industrial development north of the city mean much to them. Here they must look for the business which will put their venture on a money making basis and here, in all probability, they will find it in the course of the next few years.

IN IMMEDIATE EFFECT.

A State Law Which Provides for a Tax Upon Dogs.

A new state law, just approved by the house and the senate, provides that in all townships and cities of Michigan, other than cities now having ordinances to that end, a tax or license fee shall be levied upon dogs.

The tax on every male dog over three months old is to be \$1; upon every female dog, \$2. A modification of the latter tax is made in the case of female dogs whose ovaries shall have been removed.

The traffic in this case will be but \$1. It is provided that the assessor of the cities and townships shall ascertain the number of the dogs liable to the tax, which is to be collected in the same manner as the other township and city taxes. The bill calls for tagging all dogs on which the taxes have been paid.

The measure has further provisions designed to protect farmers from the ravages of sheep killing dogs. It becomes operative at once and all township and city officials who are affected by its provisions should inform themselves fully as to its requirements. A copy of the new law may be found at County Clerk Ross' office.
