Such was the verdict rendered here by a coroner's jury impaneled to inquire into the facts surrounding the death of John Connelly, whose body was discovered yesterday morning in a cabin at Wright's Sta-

Connelly had rigged up a guillotine and cut off his own head. He swung a broad ax by a rope in such a position that when he cut a cord the ax fell across his neck, which was stretched on a block of wood conveniently located. The plan worked effectively,

as death probably was instantaneous The coroner's jury fixed the date of the suicide at about March 27, as the body was much decomposed, and it was about that time that Connelly was last seen alive. He was fifty-seven years old and unmarried.
