Ore buying has gone on to such an exent that some ores are now pretty well aken up. With all the uncertainties the United States Steel Corporation has rought into the situation, tending to nake ore buyers cautious, there has een a fair amount of business done, and is estimated that upwards of 5,000, tons has been sold, including Mesaba res of the combine handled through wo Cleveland offices. In addition to the Fayal output, the United States Steel orporation has reserved for itself the Jenoa ore, but it has put on the market through Cleveland agents a limited mount of Mesaba Bessemer, principally from the Lake Superior group at Hibing. Non-Bessemer Mesaba ores from ome extent. With possibly one or two exceptions Mesaba Bessemer ores have een sold below \$3. From the Eveleth listrict Elba, Corsica, Sparta and Malta ores have sold at \$2.85. The Stevenson, with a guarantee of 65 per cent in iron and o per cent moisture, has had a con siderable sale at \$2.75. Roberts has sold at \$3 and Hale and Kanawha at 82.75. The Sauntry was mistakenly quoted last week at 82.75; the figure should have been \$2.50. Among Bessemer association ores, in addition to the prices quoted last week, the following nay be noted, figured from the new \$4.25 base: Chandler, \$4.62; Iron Belt \$3.99; Montreal, \$4.63; Brotherton and Sunday Lake, \$4.39; Cary Empire. \$3.75 Granada, \$4.03; Lawrence, \$3.83; Prince-

ton, \$3.71; Hennepin, \$4.19. There is no prospect of an early opening of navigation, but there is plenty of ore on docks and furnacemen are not urgent. 





For a number of arduous days the commissioners labored, a big quota of prominent Marquette county people pects that the returns from the general full this year. Different This Year.

The general tax statement this spring is different in form from that sent out out a year ago. It is about as long. the length of a full yard stick, and contains approximately the same number of queries. These differ somewha in their nature and, if it may be stated that way, they are inclined to be of a more prying sort. They are a unique testimonial to the commission's consum ing desire to know all about Michigan's taxable property.

Many people don't like these questions but this was also true last spring. It is objected that they are more searching than the first batch. In some parts of the state there has been manifested a disposition to evade answering them. inis was also the case a year ago, but the fearsome "reviews" rarely failed to the information it sought

Provisions of a Measure on Which the House is Agreed.

The house of representatives has agreed to a game law which prohibits the killing of moose, elk or caribou for ten years; prohibits deer kaling on Bois Blane island or in the counties of Lapeer, Huron, Monroe, Sanilac, Tuscola Macomb, Allegan, Ottawa and St. Clair 1906; prohibits the killing that may be killed by any one person to bits from Nov. 10 to Nov. 30; prohibits pigeons; prohibits killing of pinnated grouse and Mongolian or English pheasants and wild pigeons until 1010; makes hand of a Catholic, a divine book, from an open season for partridge and quail, spruce hens and woodcocks from Nov

The open season for wild ducks, gees and wild fowl is from Oct. 1 to Nov. 30. from one-half hour before sunrise to an hour after sunset of each day. The law prohibits hunting wild fewl by floating devices propelled with steam or other similar motive power or anchoring decovs or simbar devices for attracting wild fowl further than fifty yards from any shore, point or natural island where reeds or rushes afford hiding places for hunters (not applying to Lake Erie). It prohibits killing song birds, but black-birds, bluejays, English sparrows and crows may be shot.
