WOLVERINE BUILDING AT BUFFALO IS DEDICATED.

GOV. BLISS THE CENTRAL FIGURE

ACCEPTS THE KEYS AND FORMALY OPENS THE DOOR.

Structure a Magnificent One, Erected from Material from the Peninsular State and by Labor Imported from the Commonwealth.

Buffalo, June 10.—Michigan today kept her promise to the Pan-American exposition in being the first state to dedicate its building. The ceremonies were interesting and brief. President George H. Barbour, of the commission, presided and spoke briefly of the work of the commission, introducing G. J. Vinton of Detroit, the contractor of the building, who after a few remarks delivered the keys of the building to Mr. Barbour. He, in turn, delivered them to Governor Bliss, who said, in part: "In accepting this key to the building erected under your auspices for the accommodation of the citizens of our great state, I beg to thank you in their behalf in a manner in which you have executed your trust, and to express the hope that under this auspicious roof even the humblest citizen of the Peninsular state may experience a welcome that is only surpassed when he crosses the threshold of his own home. The beauty of this building will lie not so much in architectural lines or interior appointments as in the fact that it will furnish to the enthusiastic as well as weary Wolverine a shelter and home to which he can turn at any time for comfort, welcome and good cheer.

Splendid Michigan Exhibits.

"In addition to the arduous duties imposed upon you in connection with the erection of this structure, you were charged with the duty of gathering within a remarkably brief space of time an exhibit of the manifold resources of Michigan that would impress visitors from other states and countries with the grandeur and wealth of our possessions. It is a matter of congratulation for the people of Michigan that each time their beloved state is called upon to enter the lists, it is able to make a better showing not only in the way of population but in the extent and perfectness of its products, whether dug from the earth or manufactured in its workshops. Although the time was short and the appliances meagre compared with those of time and money devoted to the preparation of previous Michigan exhibits, the result here shows what Michigan men can do when the demands of the case call for prompt action and what the state can produce on short notice.

"And now, having accepted this key at your hands and formally, for the state, unlocked these doors so that all who will may enter, I deem it proper, in view of the fact that the future of the structure is entrusted to you, to return the key in the hope and confidence that you will see to it that the doors are open wide and that no one, whether a citizen of the grand commonwealth of Michigan or a visitor from the farthestmost ends of the world, may ever cross these portals without feeling that he is welcome in the most genuine and hospitable sense and that he may be free to rest and refresh himself."

Congressman Gardner Speaks.

Congressman Gardner was the next speaker and spoke eloquently of the relation of Michigan to New York and the Pan-American. "Michigan," he said, "was the first to be invited to participate in the exposition, and why not? Isn't it customary always to recognize our children first? In Michigan we recognize that New York state is our neighbor. Michigan is the daughter of an empire state and an empire republic. Many years ago a sturdy band of folk set out from Buffalo and went to Michigan. They made the state, it is your people who have cleared our forests, made our farms, planted our orchards, built our schools, our colleges, our churches. You didn't do it all, but you were the pioneers, and Michigan will never forget it. So why shouldn't we be first? We are here with all our hearts and we shall stay till the curtain is rung down.

"We are the first to finish our building—Michigan enterprise must be thanked for that. We have erected a structure as can be found in Michigan genius is to be credited for that. We are indebted to the great Empire state for many things, and chiefly for the man who now holds the highest honor it is in the power of a state to bestow—Governor Bliss. He is a New York man by birth, but a Michigan man by adoption. He settled among us and became our highest official.

"In concluding," said the speaker, "I will say that the Pan-American exposition will receive hearty support from the people of the neighboring commonwealth, which is made up of over 2,000,000 intelligent, progressive, loyal and patriotic Americans, and Pan-Americans."

Director General Buchanan then responded briefly for the exposition authorities, congratulating the commission on their enterprise and success.

Upper Peninsula Visitors There.

The ceremony was held in the lower hall of the building and was witnessed by several hundred guests. Among the prominent persons present were Mayor Diehl; ex-Governor Francis of Missouri, president of the St. Louis exposition; Colonel J. H. Wehler; Directors Hamilton, Moore and Urban of the exposition; the

commissioners of many states, and Messrs. Barbour, president; Wallace, vice president; Foote, treasurer; Smith, secretary, and Cole, of the Michigan commission.

Other Michigan people present were Otho Bondeman, Kalamazoo; Grant Dallas Hudson; F. H. Potter, Saginaw; Fred Macey, Grand Rapids; Mr. and Mrs. Chase S. Osborn, Sault Ste. Marie; Mr. and Mrs. James Russell, Marquette; Jas. A. Brown, Ypsilanti; Cyrus E. Perkins, Grand Rapids; C. P. Collins, Detroit, and the members of the Lake Superior Press association. A light luncheon was served at the close of the ceremonies.

Is a Credit to the State.

The Michigan building is fitted in exquisite style by the Grand Rapids furniture manufacturers and the walls are hung with a fine collection of pictures by Michigan artists. It is pronounced by all to be the finest state building, and it commands an excellent view. It is built of Michigan lumber, by Michigan labor, and contains nothing that is not native to Michigan.

MRS. M'KINLEY SETS UP.

Doctors Much Encouraged by the Improvement in Her Condition.

Washington, June 10.—When Dr. Rixey left the White House at 10:15 o'clock tonight he said: "Everything is encouraging. Mrs. McKinley is doing very nicely and is gaining steadily. She sat up in a rolling chair several times today, aggregating probably an hour. We are very much encouraged by the steady improvement."

DR. UNGER AND F. W. BROWN CONVICTED AT CHICAGO.

TRIED TO WORK INSURANCE SWINDLE

SENTENCED TO JOLIET UNDER THE INDETERMINATE ACT.

Girl in the Plot Dies in Reality Under Mysterious Circumstances and Murderer Is Suspected but Not Positively Proved.

Chicago, June 10.—Dr. August M. Unger and F. W. Brown, on trial for conspiracy to defraud insurance companies through the death of Marie Deffenbach, were this evening found guilty and sentenced to the penitentiary under the indeterminate act. Frank H. Smiley, indicted with Unger and Brown, pleaded guilty and turned state's evidence. It is likely he will escape with a light sentence.

The evidence in the case showed that Unger, Brown, Smiley and Miss Deffenbach entered into a conspiracy by which Smiley was to appear as the affianced husband of the woman. She was then to be ill and apparently die, leaving the insurance, which included a policy in a stock company and two in fraternal organizations, the total aggregating \$25,000. The woman in her will said she desired her remains cremated, and it is supposed the intention was to hurry her away after her supposed death and cremate another body procured from a hospital.

Woman Failed to Rally.

The woman became ill according to program, but did not rally and died. The body was at once cremated. An inquest was held by Assistant Coroner Weckler without a jury and Weckler returned to the coroner's office a verdict that the woman died from natural causes. The death of the woman is shrouded in mystery, and the physicians on the stand differed widely as to the cause of death. The state, however, declared the woman was murdered, although it could not be positively proved.

It was shown that all the insurance carried by the woman was assigned before her death, and that her will was drawn up after these assignments had been made. The will has no effect save in the clause touching cremation, and it was claimed by the state that the disposition of the body after death.

SHARP REBUKE TO REFORMERS.

Denver Judge Threatens to Hold Ministers in Contempt of Court.

Denver, June 10.—Judge Peter L. Palmer today administered a severe judicial rebuke to more than one hundred "reformers" who appeared in his court, as they had previously announced through the newspapers they would do, to protest against the granting of injunctions against the city fire and police boards in the cases of a restaurant claiming the right to serve drinks on Sunday with meals and a saloonkeeper who held that under that law he was entitled to sell liquor to women at the bar.

The judge closed his remarks by declaring his intention to make a judicial inquiry into the question of whether or not certain clergymen of Denver who denounced him publicly yesterday were in contempt of court. If he satisfied himself they were, he would immediately take the cases up and give them the full punishment under the laws.

FRANCHISES HELD TAXABLE.

New Jersey Car Lines Hard Hit by Supreme Court Decision.

Trenton, N. J., June 10.—The supreme court today decided that street railway franchises in New Jersey are taxable as real estate, thus adding to the state revenues several millions of dollars annually.

A MINE THEIR TOMB.

Over Thirty Men in a Pennsylvania Colliery Wrecked by Explosion.

Port Royal, Pa., June 10.—Over thirty miners are entombed in Shaft No. 2 of the Pittsburgh Coal & Coke company, where an explosion occurred this evening, and it is feared all will perish.

About 6 o'clock smoke was seen issuing from the shaft and when the rescue party arrived two men were nearly overcome by the after damp brought to the surface. They could give no information as to what caused the fire and told the rescuers that four other men were entombed.

About 7 o'clock Superintendent McCune, Pitt Boss Wertley and several other bosses, with about twenty men, went down Shaft No. 1, which is on the opposite side of the river, and they have not been heard from since. About three hours after the rescue party went down, two explosions were heard.

At 11 o'clock four men volunteered to go down Shaft No. 2 and No. 3 and one man down No. 1, but it is not known whether they succeeded in making any rescue.

Gas and smoke are issuing from the mines at midnight and a large crowd of men, women and children are waiting for some news of relatives.

Port Royal, Tuesday, June 11.—At 3 o'clock this morning heavy volumes of smoke were still issuing from the mine and hope of saving any of the entombed was fast disappearing.

TO END BOER WAR.

THE HAGUE ARBITRATION COURT REPORTED AT WORK.

SANCTIONED BY THE POWERS.

KAISER'S CONSENT WON BY QUEEN WILHELMINA.

That Said to Have Been the Object of Her Recent Visit and the News of Her Alleged Success Creates a Furore at Berlin.

Berlin, June 10.—The Kleinen Journal today prints a dispatch from The Hague saying that Queen Wilhelmina's recent visit here meant to obtain Emperor William's consent to end the South African war, both the zweibund and dreibund being willing to do so, through The Hague arbitration court, and that the emperor consented and the court began work thereon.

The dispatch has created a sensation here, and in this connection the following dispatch from The Hague is thought significant: "Ex-President Kruger and Dr. Leyds arrived here today. They are staying at the residence of Mr. Wolmarans, one of the peace envoys."

Boer Losses Heavy in May.

London, June 10.—Lord Kitchener in a dispatch from Pretoria says the number of Boers killed, imprisoned or surrendered during last month totalled 2,640.

PHONE STOCKHOLDERS SHOCKED.

New President of Chicago Company Issues a Call for \$5,000,000.

Chicago, June 10.—Central Union Telephone stockholders received a shock today in the form of a special circular from John I. Sabin, the new president of the company, requesting them to consider the best way of securing \$3,000,000 during the coming year to finance the company.

For three weeks President Sabin has been devoting his time to study the condition of the company and the possibilities of the field in which it operates, and his conclusions are embraced in the terse language of his circular. He says: "After two months' investigation, I find it to be imperatively necessary that at least \$3,000,000 be provided without delay—that is, one-half immediately and one-half before the close of the present year—with a call for another million dollars during the first half of 1902 and one more for the same amount in the last half of 1902. This is additional to the net income during the period."

The Central Union Telephone company was organized twelve years ago and operates exchanges in the smaller cities of Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

POINT FOR CHINESE REFORMER.

Collector of the Port at Fisco Decides He Has the Right to Lead.

San Francisco, June 10.—Collector of the Port Stratton recommended to the treasury department today that Su Shih Chin, the Chinese reformer and scholar, be allowed to land under Section of the exclusion act, as a trader. The Chinese authorities in this country are very anxious to keep Su Shih Chin out of the country for political reasons. He is the leader of the reform party which is seeking to place Emperor Kwang Hsu on the throne instead of the dowager empress.

Pending the decision of the treasury department, Su Shih Chin is held in the detention shed at the Pacific mail dock. Collector Stratton says there is a reward of \$50,000 on his head and he has taken means to protect him from assault by any sympathizers of the dowager empress. Should the treasury department set aside the recommendation of the collector, attorneys will apply for a writ of habeas corpus on the ground that the Constitution guarantees an asylum to political offenders.

CABINET IS CALLED.

MYSTERIOUS MEETING AT WHITE HOUSE LAST EVENING.

FOLLOWS A HURRIED SUMMONS.

DETAILS NOT GIVEN OUT AND WASHINGTON IS PUZZLED.

Consultation of an Hour's Duration and Arranged by the President at the Conclusion of a Conference With Secretary Hay.

Washington, June 10.—In response to a message from the president sent late this afternoon after half an hour's talk with the secretary of state, all the members of the cabinet now in the city assembled at the White House at 8 o'clock this evening.

The president and Secretary Long had been out driving together during the afternoon. When the president returned at four Secretary Hay was awaiting him. The two spent half an hour together, the secretary leaving on the night train for Buffalo. It was immediately after this that the cabinet was asked to assemble.

The cabinet members arrived about eight, attired in evening dress. Secretaries Long, Gage, Hitchcock and Wilson, Attorney General Knox and Postmaster General Smith were those present. The cabinet immediately repaired to the cabinet room, where they remained less than an hour.

At the conclusion of the meeting none of those present would discuss its object, each member saying it was a personal matter and some giving out the negative information that the meeting had no relation to any important public question. Personal injunction to each member to say nothing about the matter prevented any information on the subject being had. Several cabinet officers said their call had to do with Mrs. McKinley's continued improvement.

NOTICE TO THE POWERS.

America Will Not Join in Guaranteeing the Chinese Indemnity.

Washington, June 10.—The government today formally communicated to the foreign powers notice of its impossibility of joining in a joint guarantee for the payment of the Chinese indemnity. The difficulties in the way of such arrangement are set forth in the communication, particularly those relating to the constitutional restrictions on the president in making a joint guarantee of this character.

Mikado to Receive the Count.

Yokohama, June 10.—Count von Waldseeck arrived today at Tokio and will be received in audience tomorrow by Emperor Mutsuhito.

BOTH SHOT IN THE TEMPLE.

Man and Wife Dead at Chicago Hotel—Murder and Suicide.

Chicago, June 10.—Side by side, each with a bullet wound in the temple, the dead bodies of L. Hartman and wife were found in their bed at the Great Northern Hotel this evening. The room showed no evidences of a struggle. Both lifeless forms were composed and the covering of the bed well tucked about them, but a revolver clutched in the right hand of the husband told the story of the double tragedy. Of the pair that courted death so successfully, nothing is known by the managers of the hotel beyond a report that the man had wealthy connections in New York and that the woman apparently was once an actress under the stage name of Rose Violet.

From information given by a woman who inquired for them this morning, it is supposed the case was one of a runaway marriage, with death the result of despondency over the obduracy of the unforgiving father. Hartman and his wife registered at the hotel on June 6, giving their address as New York. Both were stylishly dressed and appeared to be persons of means. They spent most of the time in their rooms, and it was surmised they were on their wedding trip. Early Sunday night they retired to their apartments and nothing was seen of them until this evening, when they were found dead in bed.

Later—At midnight it was learned the dead woman was Rose Le Sebree, a variety actress. The father of the dead man is said to be a wealthy tobacco dealer of New York city.

Scandal in Michigan Death.

St. Louis, Mich., June 10.—Mrs. Charles Yates, wife of a well-known farmer living near here, was arrested this afternoon, charged with the murder of Jasper Wright, a neighbor, whose dead body was found Sunday in a thicket near their home. Today while the coroner's jury was investigating the cause of death, Mrs. Yates testified that she had been accustomed to meeting Wright and that when she went into the thicket Sunday she saw Wright kneeling on the ground. He complained of being sick and then rolled over and died. Great excitement prevails here over the affair.

ENGLAND PUTS TAX ON SUGAR.

Escanaba has been badly gamblers since their headquarters, and the news that the evil is to be suppressed has been most welcome to the law and order element.

Hugh F. Eillard and G. A. Anderson of Norway, were in Ironwood last week and they made an examination of the Ashland mine for the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company. Mr. Eillard has been appointed superintendent of the Ashland mine, and Mr. Anderson will take the position of mining captain at the property. They will assume their new duties this week. Mr. Eillard has been superintendent of the Arizona mine of the Menominee range for several years. Mr. Anderson occupying the position of head mining captain at the same property for some time. The Arizona was purchased by the United States Steel company a few months ago.

The board of Rock River township, Alger county, Messrs. Gatties, Geisler, Brown and Magnusson, were in Marquette last week discharging a lot of the county's long standing indebtedness. The Wilkinson estate held an old township bond of \$1,500, upon which about \$800 interest had accrued, and about \$1,000 in old highway orders. These latter were outlawed and there was some question of the legality of the bond, but the board desired to do the fair thing by all concerned so it accepted the estate's proposition to turn over all the

claims for a payment of \$1,000. Rock River township is rapidly being put in solvent condition, thanks to the work of its present board.

Sixteen pupils will graduate from the Escanaba high school this year, making one of the largest classes in the history of the public schools of that city. A peculiar feature of this class is that there are more young men than young ladies among its members, there being nine of the former and seven of the latter. The commencement exercises will be held at Peterson's Opera House on Wednesday evening, June 26, commencing at 8:30 and, contrary to precedent, no charge will be made for admission. The principal speaker of the evening will be Professor Dwight B. Waldo, of the Marquette Normal school. The customary Class Day exercises will be held in the High school auditorium on Tuesday evening, June 25, just preceding the commencement exercises. This entertainment will be in complete charge of the graduating class.

The Munising Republican is authority for the statement that a plan to organize a stock company for the purpose of purchasing and conducting the Munising News, Bob Wright's weekly, has about been consummated and that the transfer will be effected shortly. The negotiations are with W. F. Cox of Wetmore, who holds a material mortgage on the property for all its worth. W. W. Case, Dr. G. A. Trueman and A. F. Howard are the prime movers in the plan to secure the News. It is said that the paper, under the new regime, will be Republican in policy and that Bob Wright will continue to edit it. It is said that the change in ownership is contemplated with the purpose of driving Baldwin's Munising Republican out of the field. If this be so there are stormy times ahead in a newspaper field which has never been of the quietest.

Burglary, forgery and a three days' drunk was Angus' record last week. He is a woodsman who for a few days previous to the time he broke out on his rampage, worked for J. J. Connors at Shingleton. He started his career of crime at Wetmore, where he entered J. J. Connors' saloon, committing a number of minor depredations and, among other things, possessing himself of a number of Mr. Connors' blank checks. With these in his jeans he left for Munising where he tried forgery as a side line, writing Connors' name to the blanks proceeding to fleece a number of the business men. He passed three checks for amounts between \$25 and \$50 before he came to grief in attempting to work off the fourth. Inquiry showed that all the checks were bogus and Brandt was promptly arrested. The prisoner received time before so he is likely to serve a stiff sentence for his latest offense.

Manager A. V. Freeman, of Raber & Watson, Menominee, has detected and nipped in the bud a scheme to rob his firm of several thousand dollars, and as a result of the discovery two of the company's inspectors at Iron Mountain, who were engaged in the plot, and the parts unknown. The inspectors issued vouchers to the office at Menominee for all cedar products turned over to them at points along the line. These vouchers were sent to Menominee and the payments made. The conspiracy was cleverly devised. These inspectors issued vouchers for cedar which had never been delivered and in that way hoped to divide the remittances with the parties named on the vouchers. One instance cited is at Iron Mountain, where it is claimed that 1,000 poles were delivered when in fact there were none. Similar instances are reported from Wausaukee, Porterfield and several other points. Mr. Freeman mistrusted from the vouchers that something was wrong, held back the remittances and investigated the matter. As a result the defrauders were foiled, as no money was sent them.

Ishpeming and its Environs.

IS A GREAT DISAPPOINTMENT. GROCERS DO THE CLOTHIERS. Failure to Complete Extension to Winthrop a Disappointment.

Now that it is definitely decided that the street railway will not be extended to the Winthrop this year, there is much weeping and gnashing of teeth by the residents of that location.

There are many reasons why the company did not see fit to extend its line, chief among which is the recent ruling of Railroad Commissioner Osborn. Mr. Osborn inspected the location for the proposed grade crossing. He had an assistant with him at the time and they went over the matter very thoroughly. After a delay of a week the commissioner reported that he could not allow the street railway people to cross the tracks of the steam lines at grade and he said that if the extension was to be made the only method which could be employed which would meet with his approval would be the building of a trestle.

The cost of the trestle, \$3,000, is prohibitive. The extension would cost in the neighborhood of \$13,000 and to tack an additional \$5,000 on this is said to be out of the question.

There are five tracks at the point where the crossing would be made, none of which are used in the passenger service. Without doubt this is the best crossing in the city, but only through the daytime when the shovels are working and the making up of ore trains is in progress. It is rarely that this crossing is used extensively at night and this is also true of holidays. Sundays it is never in use and these are the days upon which traffic over the extension would be heaviest. To be sure many times through the season cars and engines get off the rails and it is sometimes the work of many hours to again get them back, but in this even an extra car could be placed on the other side of the crossing and the passengers easily transferred from one to the other and the travel would not be interrupted to any appreciable extent.

When all these conditions are taken into consideration the ruling of the commissioner seems a little more stringent than is necessary and The Mining Journal is of the opinion that the people of the Winthrop will place no blame on the street railway people for their failure to build the extension.

MOVES TO LAKE LINDEN.

Sam Blumenthal Will Start a Store in the Copper Country.

Sam Blumenthal returned from a trip to the copper country Saturday evening and yesterday he announced that he had rented a store in Lake Linden, in which he hopes to be established by the first of August. Mr. Blumenthal feels that the copper country is a good field for the dry goods and clothing business and he anticipates an immediate success there.

In order to get away soon he will at once commence the sale of his present stock and from now until the first of July all kinds of gentlemen's furnishing will go "dirt cheap." He will leave for the east on the Fourth of July, stopping in Detroit to attend a meeting of the state executive committee, which occurs on the 8th. 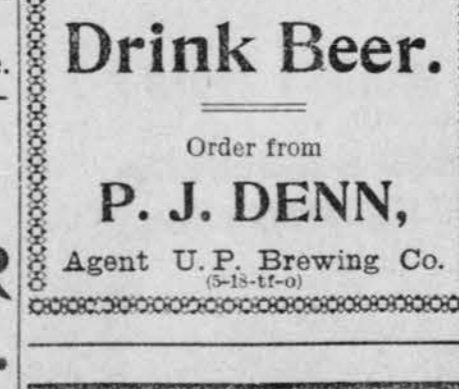

REPAIRS ASSURED.

At the June meeting of the board of supervisors a resolution was introduced by Supervisor O'Donoghue of this city recommending the repairing of the new road to Goose lake. Estabrook and Warren, two men employed at the Cambria, met with an accident Saturday morning, but both are now doing well and will soon be out again. A large chunk of rock broke off in a fall, struck Estabrook in the back, knocking him down a chute. Another piece hit Warren in the head and he too was precipitated through the chute. He fell a distance of twenty-five feet. Aside from a few bruises both men are all right.

Lower Michigan.

Robert L. Broughton, of Battle Creek, won the third district competitive examination for West Point last week. Irving J. Palmer of Kalamazoo is alternate.

William P. Nesbitt, for over twenty years editor and publisher of the Big Rapids Evening Bulletin and Weekly Herald, has sold his newspaper and printing property to John J. Bale of Lakeview.

In the Saranac locality, peach growers are not so confident as they were a week ago that there will be a large crop. There are many orchards in which the buds have not fruited and which will consequently be of little account.

Hugh Lyons & Company, of Lansing, have purchased the furniture factory until recently operated by the Potter Manufacturing Company and they will use the plant for the manufacture of their line of goods, which is store fixtures and wood frames for show cases.

Frank Taylor of Oxford has been paying marked attentions to a maiden, who recently married another man. Friday Taylor, who was helping to butcher in Sars's slaughter house, was found stark naked in a tank filled with blood. He was hauled out, dressed and sent home. It is thought he attempted to take his own life while temporarily insane.

Will Comstock, Harry Sooton, and two companions, rowed to the center of Whitmore lake near Owosso for a swim. Soon after they had undressed the boat capsized, and all their belongings, including three gold watches, went to the bottom. After hanging on the upturned boat for nearly two hours they reached shore and proceeded to their boarding houses, clothed in barrels.

The state military board at a meeting held at Lansing Saturday decided to hold the state military camp at Manistee, commencing Saturday, August 12. This arrangement of the dates will give the soldiers two Sundays in camp, a fact not at all disagreeable to the railroads which will run excursions to Manistee. There will be no moon, which the troops consider quite a disadvantage, but the dates are believed to be the best, everything considered, that could have been selected.

In the Michigan monthly bulletin of vital statistics, about to be issued by the state department, the report of the secretary of the board of health, based on the sickness statistics, will show that in the month of May, 1901, compared with the average in the ten years preceding, scarlet fever, smallpox and typhoid fever were more than usually prevalent and consumption, remittent fever, inflammation of bowels, measles and cerebro-spinal meningitis were less than usually prevalent.

Mrs. Caroline Brown, aged 77, of Jamestown, charges A. H. Ayers and James C. Doyle, Grand Rapids real estate men, with defrauding her out of \$2,500. She says they induced her to give them the money on the claim that they could invest it in a manner that would bring her large returns. In return she says they gave her a mortgage on pine stump land in Newaygo county which has reverted to the state for taxes. The old lady is without a dollar of her own now.

Reports from Essexville, received at Bay City, are to the effect that the congregation of St. John's church is greatly worked up over the action of Bishop Richter in removing Rev. Edward Kinney and placing in charge of the church two monks from Wisconsin. The church was surrounded by a crowd until midnight Friday night, but no disturbance occurred. The congregation of the church is composed largely of Hollanders of Hampton township, who want Father Kinney retained.

Bert Blood, who is awaiting trial in the superior court, Grand Rapids, charged with stealing a bicycle, made a desperate attempt to escape from the county jail last week. He had stripped off his clothes, and managed to get out as far as his head when he stuck. After trying hard to get it through the bars, he decided to return to his cell, but found it impossible to get his body back. When the jail officials found him they were equally unsuccessful, and had to send for mechanics to break the bars.

A. J. Sawyer & Son of Ann Arbor, have been retained by Jabez Bacon, a councilman of Chelsea, and a \$10,000 damage suit will be started against President Frank P. Glazier, principal defendant, and Wm. R. Lehman, Charles Stimpson, J. M. Woods and Jacob Mast, co-defendants. It seemed at a meeting of the Chelsea council on June 5 there was a hot discussion over paying, and Bacon alleges that he was thrown out of the hall by direction of Mr. Glazier because he objected to the proceedings.

The blacksmiths employed in the Pere Marquette railroad shops at Saginaw have struck because the company declined to meet the demands made some time ago for a nine-hour day and 12 1/2 per cent increase in wages. The men in the boiler shops have also gone out and the strike is extending through the entire shops. It is reported that the Saginaw offices of the company that the road will be in no way crippled and is in condition to continue many months as if nothing had happened. About 75 men are now included in the strike.

William Laullilove, employed by Charles Heliker at Farmington, was badly gored by an enraged bull late last week. The two men had undertaken to drive the animal into the barn, when the beast became ugly and made a dash for the owner. Heliker, who is considerable of an athlete, grabbed the bull by the horns, Urstis fashion, and managed to wring its neck, but the bull broke away and made a lunge for Laullilove. Heliker saved his hired man's life by attracting the enraged animal's attention to a dog. The bull has been deborned.

Governor Bliss left Saginaw Saturday on a trip to the east, during which he will assist in dedicating the Michigan building at Buffalo. The governor says he has done everything possible towards securing the balance due the state from the government on account of the Spanish war. Shortly after taking office, he called in the former secretary to Governor Pingree, Ralph Stone, as an expert in the matter, and he, with the governor and attorney general, had been conducting negotiations with the government. At the proper time he will go to Washington in the interest of the claim.

Because they fleeed Barton Husted, an Indiana farmer, out of \$100 at a card game, Friday evening, Chief of Police Morton of St. Joseph Saturday afternoon ordered William Marsh, Joseph Logan and William Sanford to leave the city in an hour's time. The men are said to be members of national reputation who have been sumnering at St. Joseph. Concerning the case, Chief Morton says "During three months of the resort season, this city is full of crooks and gamblers. Besides being a summer resort for thousands of good, honest people, it is the watering place of criminals from all over the country. This season I shall add a number of officers in citizen's clothing to the police force, and make an effort to land an even dozen criminals, who are known in Europe as well as in America.

A love affair between an old man named Townsend, who claims to hail from Thomaston, and a 15-year-old girl of Sparta, has stirred up the community during the last few days. Townsend is about 60 years old and he asserts that when the girl is old enough he will marry her. He represents a Philadelphia fry goods house, and it was while on a business trip to Sparta that he became acquainted with the girl. Teachers in the public schools investigated the matter and laid it before the authorities, who ordered Townsend out of town. He has spent considerable money on the girl and keeps talking of her. He appears perfectly sane and has the appearance of a man well to do. The girl's parents seem to look upon the affair with favor, but it will be stopped. Townsend has written letters to deputy Sheriff Smith begging permission to return to Sparta that he may be near the girl he loves.

WILL SPEND \$40,000

ON IMPROVEMENTS IN MUNISING AND ON RAILWAY.

CLEVELAND-CLIFFS CO.'S PLANS.

GROWTH OF VILLAGE WILL BE CAREFULLY FOSTERED.

Corporation Officials Visit the Townspeople and Assure Them That They Have Not Been Forgotten.

Marquette is not the only place which is going to benefit as a result of the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company's purchase of the Munising railway and the Munising company and its plans for connecting the L. S. & I. and Munising roads with a new line, the whole making the Marquette & Southeastern railway.

For a long time the good people of Munising were possessed with the idea that their city would be chosen as the location of the new Cleveland-Cliffs charcoal stack, which is to go up in North Marquette. They have been effectually disillusioned during the past few weeks, but they have rested easy in confidence that they would in time be remembered by the interests which have gained such important holdings in Alger county.

"During the summer and fall the Cleveland-Cliffs company will spend from \$40,000 to \$50,000 in improvements in Munising and on the line of the Munising railway." This was the statement made by President W. G. Mather Thursday morning to a representative of the Republic.

"We shall erect a large brick passenger and freight depot with office rooms just as soon as the preliminaries can be arranged. The depot will be a substantial structure and will be designed with the thought in mind that in all probability it will be required in due time to meet the needs of a city much larger than Munising is at present."

"The company will also build a new and much larger roundhouse than the one it now has. This building will also be constructed of brick, and its location will be north of the burts railway trestle."

"The purpose in moving the roundhouse from its present location is to make a park reserve of all the bay frontage lying between Elm avenue and the burts trestle and north of the railway, a tract containing approximately fifteen acres. We have already let the contract for stumping and clearing this tract and the work will commence at once and will be vigorously pushed."

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"We have had for some weeks, in fact ever since my last visit here, an experienced man engaged in interesting manufacturers in Munising. No definite results have yet been reached, but this is work that cannot be done in a week or a month; it requires time and persistent work, and this is what will be given. We have backed our faith as to the future of Munising and Alger county by the investment of hundreds of thousands of dollars, and we are bringing into play all of our experience gained in conducting vast business enterprises for the purpose of making our investment profitable."

"It is not my purpose to attempt to mislead the people of Munising in any way. Our company is building no air castles. Munising has been filled with industrial bubbles in the past. I can assure the people of Munising the work we shall do will be more substantial. It requires time and patience to accomplish results that will be lasting. We wish to have solid foundations."

Mr. Mather was asked his opinion with regard to the new county buildings to be constructed here, and he said: "I think it would be a pity to erect inferior buildings. I am sure that the formal resolution ordering the levying of the local taxes was put by Alderman Gorman."

A supplementary report of the finance and taxation committee, recommending that, in the event of a general celebration of the Fourth of July being arranged for Marquette, \$300 be appropriated for the use of the committee, was also approved and adopted.

The committee on parks and cemeteries recommended the purchase of the land required for the proposed Soldiers' Home on Front street, or Lakeside park and, on motion of Alderman Donovan, the controller was authorized to negotiate the purchase, subject to the approval of the council, at such price as the committee on parks and the mayor shall approve.

A "low water alarm" was ordered placed on the boiler of the crusher engine. On motion of Alderman Jones the resolution was ordered to destroy all the tax statements made prior to this year.

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ANNUAL APPORTIONMENT. It Was Made by the Aldermen Last Evening. The aldermen assembled last evening to ascertain how much money is required to conduct the city government for the ensuing year and to hear the report of the committee on finance and taxation regarding the apportionment for the several funds.

Something over \$1,000 less than was required last year is demanded for the twelve months of 1901-1902, the aggregate of the last appropriations being \$88,773, compared with a total of \$87,500 last evening.

This sum was divided as follows: For schools, the amount ordered to be raised by the trustees, \$36,000; for schools, the one mill tax fixed by law, \$10,000; for the Peter White Public Library, the one mill tax fixed by law, estimated, \$6,000; for highway funds, \$13,000; for parks and cemeteries, \$5,500; for general purposes, \$1,500.

This report of the committee was adopted and later in the evening the formal resolution ordering the levying of the local taxes was put by Alderman Gorman.
