





It has always been under grade and with the completion of this stretch of 300 feet the whole street, from Division to the end of the street car line, will have been macadamized. INCREASED A MILLION.

Assessor Thoren Shoved Valuations Up This Spring.

The recent sessions of the board of review brought to light numerous interesting facts concerning City Assessor Theodore A. Thoren's tax roll for 1901.
