ESTIMATES OF THE LOSS OF LIFE AT GREAT VARIANCE.

Because of the Wild Panic on the Sinking Craft-Tugs Save Many Persons.

New York, June 14.—The wooden sidewheeler Northfield, which had been in the service of the Staten Island Ferry company for the past thirty-eight years, was rammed tonight by the steel-hulled propellor Mauch Chunk, used as a fer-

Whitehall street and in less than twenty, minutes afterwards the Northfield, which was crowded with passengers, sank at the outer end of the Spanish line pier in East river. The Mauch Chunk, which was badly damaged, landed the two dozen passengers who were aboard

Over 200 passengers of the sunken Northfield were dragged out of the water by persons along the shore and the crews of the fleet of river tugs which promptly responded to the ferry boats' call for help. A few of the Northfield's passengers were hurt in the accident and the police believe some lives were lost.
