Upper Peninsula. VISIT OPENED HIS EYES.

Banker Hayden Impressed With the Developments at the Lake. Charles Hayden, of Hayden, Stone & Co., bankers and brokers of Boston, who has just returned to the Hub from his visit to the copper country, says:

"I was particularly impressed with the tremendous developments which have taken place at the Lake since my last visit and was much pleased with the growth of the business of the Copper Range company.

"So far as the new developments are concerned, I saw nothing that pleased me so much as that of the South Kearsarge vein of the Osceola and also at the Mohawk mines. I cannot see why with little less than 100,000 shares, and all its original mine intact, and with a stamp mill of six heads and, in addition to that, the fine showing on both the North and South Kearsarge, equipped with the fact that the Osceola has also now in operation three new heads of stamps, with the prospects of having four more heads working in a few months, why this mine should not yield a much larger production and a proportionately larger profit than any of the new mines.

"I think that the average speculator today is apt to lose sight of the number of shares of a mining company and be governed only by the number of dollars per share that the stock is selling for in the market.

"People at the Lake all speak very highly of the development of the Adventure and of the manner in which the management of the property has opened up the four veins which traverse it, particularly the Knowlton lode, which carries more stamp rock and less mass copper than its other veins.

"The Boston and New York stock exchanges closed yesterday until next Monday. The foreign visible supply of copper July 1 was 27,462 tons, a decrease of 646 tons since June 15, 1901.

"Eight levels in the Tamarack's new No. 5 shaft will be ready for regular production about Oct. 1. From that date the mill will treat at least 3,000 tons of rock daily, and the amount will be gradually increased.

"It is stated that the product of the Franklin was 225 tons mineral last month. The openings on the conglomerate are being pushed; upwards of 200 tons are daily going to the mill from that lode, which amount is steadily being increased.

"Although some rock is being sent to the Osceola mill from the company's openings on the Kearsarge lode, regular production from this part of the mine will not begin until about Dec. 1, from which time on the Osceola output will be greatly increased.

"The Boston Advertiser says: "It is thought that the South range consolidation will be completed within ten days, or at the longest, two weeks, and that the new stock will be on the market very soon. This, it is predicted, will start at not less than 65, and will sell at 75 or 80."

"Private advices from Arizona state that the Old Dominion is making arrangements for the erection of converters in that section in connection with the expert advices as to the property. When completed they will materially increase the output of the company. The matter on the dumps can quickly be converted into cash upon the completion of the converters.

"Drittler Bros. saloon at Hancock has undergone such a transformation that visitors to the popular resort are surprised at the extent of the improvements made. New bar fixtures have been installed that will merit the claim of being the handsomest in the copper country. The new equipment is all of early birch, mahogany furnished. The bar is thirty-four feet long and is very handsome design and with marble base. The back piece is a beauty. At each end is a column of onyx, eleven feet in height and eighteen inches in diameter at the base, slowly tapering to a twelve-inch diameter at the top, which is surmounted with handsomely carved iron heads. The walls opposite the bar are wainscoted to a height of four feet, and for three feet above this are plate glass mirrors the length of the room.
