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

Much Rock Ready.

When the new plant is ready for operation there need be no delay in turnng out material for street work beause of a scarcity of quarried rock of suitable size to be fed into the jaws of he crusher. A considerable force of uarrymen has been employed blasting ut and breaking up trap rock for the past several weeks and now it is estinated that the huge piles in the neighorhood of the crusher house contain 800 or 900 cords, which will crush up approximately 3,600 cords. This latter igure is but a couple of hundred cords ess than the total product of the crushng plant last year and it will suffice to repair block after block of Marquette streets, to say nothing of completing auch new work.

An old gyratory crusher, which looks ike a toy machine beside the crusher recently purchased from the Austin people, is to be operated as a part of the plant. As is generally known the rock from the main crushing plant is elevated o a screen which automatically separates it into several different grades, suitable for the different dressings for new street work.

Of course there is a considerable per entage of the rock which is too coarse to be screened at all. This continues or brough the perforated cylinder and uns out the far end. 

LEFT IN THE WAKE OF SATUR-DAY'S FIERCE WIND STORM.

Wind, storm and tragedy furnished a fitting end to Saturday, another of those piping hot days to which the Lake Superior country is becoming quite accustomed this summer

At the Froebel.

The greatest damage done to any one building by the storm was wrought at the Froebel school and it will require a tidy sum of money to put the structure in good condition.

Wind, not lightning, as is believed by some, is responsible for the havoc worked at this structure. The front portion of the roof is badly wrecked. many rafters and a number of heavy timbers being caved in. This damage was occasioned by the collapse of a false brick front built up on either slant of the pent roof. This false front was composed of a single layer of brick and was of no real utility, being designed to add beauty to the structure. The wind blew squarely against it and had it been much more strongly built than was the case it would, nevertheless, have had

The damage at the school seems out of proportion to the cause, but not only was the roof called upon to withstand the weight of the brick, but they were hurled back on it with great force by the high wind. A heavy ornament, which decorated the front of the roof, was picked up by an extra severe gust and hurled far back into the school yard.

Rain, which filtered through the shattered front, did some little damage in the interior of the structure, wetting down some of the ceilings and walls. Fortunately the showers, after the roof was opened, were light and of short duration. Had they been heavy or continuous for a couple of hours it would cost a large amount of money to repair the rain's work.


