BERRYMAN BATTED HARD. Portage Lake Defeats Baraga, Eighteen to Three.

The Baraga and Portage Lake teams played ball at the Hancock Driving Park before a large and enthusiastic gathering of "fans" yesterday afternoon.

Results of Other Games. At Houghton yesterday afternoon, the home team won an aggregation from Lake Linden to the tune of 35 to 4. It was a one-sided slugging match.

PORTAGE LAKE APPROPRIATIONS. \$60,000 Recommended for Harbor of Refuge and \$10,000 for the Canal.

The appropriation of \$30,000-\$33,000 of which will complete existing projects—has been recommended for the harbor of refuge at Portage Lake by Captain Charles Keeler, in charge of the Grand Rapids district, under whose jurisdiction the harbor of refuge is.

Improvement, operation and care of the waterway from Keweenaw bay to Lake Superior—Since the United States purchased and assumed charge of this work, which is otherwise known as the Portage Lake ship canal, \$1,285,000 has been appropriated and expended thereon.

The canal has since been free to all vessels. "The canal consists of the waterway across Keweenaw point, in the state of Michigan, from Keweenaw Bay to Lake Superior, there being about 25 1/2 miles of water route, consisting of 5 1/2 miles of Portage river with its four cuts, 17 miles of Portage lake and 2 1/2 miles in the upper canal from the head of Portage lake to Lake Superior.

The directors of Boston & Montana have declared a dividend of \$12 per share—\$7 regular and \$5 extra. The purchase by the Amalgamated people of 98 or 99 per cent. of the Boston & Montana stock will not afford in the slightest the usual course of the stock.

Captain Gallard gives many interesting statistics regarding the commerce of the canal, showing that during the season of 1900, 32,875 passengers and 1,734,135 tons of freight were carried through it; a large increase of freight over the previous year.

\$8,000 Asked for Ontonagon. The captain recommended the appropriation of \$8,000 for the Ontonagon harbor. He says: "Improvement of harbor at Ontonagon—This project, which has been accomplished, was to maintain a navigable depth of twelve feet between the two piers 2315 and 2575 feet in length, respectively, and up to the bridge inside the entrance. On this project a total of \$344,061 has been expended. For maintenance for next year \$8,000 is asked."

Holdups Up Prices Firmly Despite the Great Decrease in Exports. The publication of the June copper statistics of production and exports suggests some thoughts in connection with the copper situation, always of great interest, says the Boston Transcript.

There has been a heavy decline in exports of copper and the half year's total is the smallest in five years. Every month this far in 1901 has shown sharp decrease and the total for the half year of 50,927 tons compares with 90,277 in 1900, 56,409 in 1899, 68,284 in 1898 and 64,870 in 1897.

In brief, the United States has had to absorb 87,500,000 pounds more copper in the first half of 1901 than in the same period of 1900; it has done it and kept the price unchanged at 17 cents per pound. This increase in home supply was 88 per cent. and that that much more copper could be cared for at home without variation in price compares oddly with the foreign situation.

Of course the copper market, either at home or abroad, long since passed from control of such old-time influence as statistical position, or supply and demand; the market is in the firmest of grips and production or consumption of the metal hardly is considered. The Amalgamated, or Standard Oil, people have been determined in holding the American copper market as firm as a rock, while apparently they have been quite willing to let the London market drift helplessly.

Time will not long ago when the value of London quotations as determining American copper values was supreme, almost. It is absolutely nothing at this point; the copper control is here. Such a position as that shown above with our exports decreased 90,000,000 pounds in six months or 44 2/3 per cent, would have meant lively times in the American copper market and a price lower by two or three cents a pound at least than that now prevailing.

city officers have had constructed in the engine house a second concrete foundation intended for the reception of an electric motor of ample size to drive the full crushing plant.

There is practically no question that the crusher plant will ultimately be driven by electricity.

Of course there is a considerable percentage of the rock which is too coarse to be screened at all.

The Austin crusher will be placed in operation some time this week.
