



HAS HOPEFUL VIEW OF CROPS. Secretary Wilson Thinks the Loss, While Great, Much Exaggerated.

Washington, July 26.—Secretary of griculture Wilson does not take so oomy a view of the agricultural prosects between the Allegheny and the locky mountains as do some of the so alled experts who are not connected with the government service. Mr. Wilson, however, does not attempt to minmize the injury already done and adnits that it will increase unless there is great precipitation of moisture during he next few days in the country be ween the mountain ranges. While he cknowledges that the hard wheat belt of the Northwest has been considerably damaged, he does not yet despair of an average yield of corn in the corn belt, which he defines as extending east from he Missouri river to the Alleghenies embracing Iowa, Wisconsin, the northern part of Missouri and all of Illinois,

Indiana and Ohio, The secretary says that wheat and oats in the semiarid region of western Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas have suffered greatly, and that there will be a reduced yield in those districts. But e stoutly maintains that the shortage vill not be nearly so heavy as specula ors predict. As to the corn yield, the eretary is not at all pessimistic. He eceives daily reports by mail and wire rom trained agents of the agricultural epartment, who are traversing every gricultural state and closely studying inditions. None of these reports, ac ording to the secretary, justify the redictions of wholesale crop failure in the West. In the monthly report of the agricultural department for July, Secreary Wilson believes he will be able to show that the situation is not so bad as

it is being pictured at present.
"If something could be done to induce the farmers in the corn belt to extend "YOUR MONEY IS their period of cultivation about two weeks beyond the usual limit," says Mr. Wilson, "I should look for a big crop and will be refunded to you if after using this year. But the usual season of cultivation is rapidly drawing to a close and I fear that with comparatively few exceptions the farmers will 'lay by heir corn at the regular time, regardess of the drought. To utilize the conerved moisture to the best advantage in served moisture to the best advantage in the absence of rain, the soil in the corn fields should be continually stirred until the crop is matured. Therefore, if the farmers in the corn belt were to exend the cultivation season about two weeks, we could look for a good yield




