Joseph Hooper of this city, who was appointed a member of the board of examining barbers by Governor Bliss, will not retain his position on that board, if the supreme court upholds the decision of Judge Coolidge, who presides over the circuit court of Berrien county.

"The bill was passed and signed by the governor under a title entirely different from that under which it was passed by the senate of the session of April 24, 1901, was a new bill and was not introduced till more than fifty days after the legislative session began, and it was therefore void under section 4, article 8, of the state constitution.
