STRIKE IS NEAR END. STEEL TRUST AND WORKERS CLOSE TO AGREEMENT. CONFERENCE HELD IN NEW YORK.

Pittsburg, July 28.—The strike of the steel workers of the Amalgamated association against the United States Steel corporation probably will be settled this week.

Reno, O. T., July 28.—All is expectancy tonight among the thousands of home-seekers here over the grand lottery which begins tomorrow morning. There are thirteen thousand claims to be distributed, so each of the 65,865 persons registered has about one chance in thirteen of winning.

SAYS STARTLING FACTS WILL DEVELOP IN INQUIRY. ADMIRAL HOLDS STRONG CARDS.

Will Prove Sensational if Induced to Play Them. Young Captain of Infantry Declares Reputation of Other Officers Will Likely Suffer and Hints at Suppressed Dispatches.

Salt Lake, Monday, July 29.—The Herald this morning says: Captain Thomas F. Schley, oldest son of Admiral Schley, who is stationed at Fort Douglass, yesterday outlined some points that will be brought out at the court of inquiry as to his father's conduct at the battle of Santiago.

He declared some startling facts would be brought to light if the whole trouble became known, and that the reputations of persons other than his father were likely to suffer.

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DROUTH IS BROKEN. GREAT CORN BELT RECEIVES A GOOD BLENCHING.

HOPE FOR THE CROP REVIVES. RAIN HEAVY IN KANSAS, MISSOURI AND NEBRASKA.

Washington, July 28.—Today's weather bureau advices from the great corn belt are the most encouraging that have come to hand for the last forty days, showing, in the opinion of the forecasters, that the great drought, which has been broken by a general visitation of showers in many portions of that section, with the prospect of a continuation tomorrow.

Deluge in the Southwest. Topoka, July 28.—Kansas has been fully redeemed from the ravages of the drought. The rain which started in numerous portions of the state Friday night continued throughout the day Saturday and at many points today.

Storm Have in North Dakota. Fargo, N. D., July 28.—A heavy rain and wind storm prevailed this afternoon over a considerable part of the state.

Heavy Fall in Nebraska. Lincoln, Neb., July 28.—Reports from over the state show that the rains which visited Nebraska yesterday, last night and this morning left the corn in many locations in better condition than first thought.

Deaths in Other Sections. Cincinnati, July 28.—There were nine deaths and thirteen prostrations today on account of the heat. The temperature was 97 and the humidity unusually high.

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 28.—Mrs. Antonio Van Oosten, an aged Holland woman, fell dead from the heat this afternoon on her way home from church. She was supposed to be very poor, but a pouch was found about her body containing \$1,045.

LAYS IT TO MINE FIRE.

President Agassiz Tells of Calumet's Reduction in Output. President Agassiz, of the Calumet & Hecla, in his annual report for the fiscal year ended April 30, a synopsis of which was published in these columns Saturday, says:

MASS MILL IN OPERATION.

Stamps Start Pounding, Though Formal Opening Occurs Tomorrow. Tomorrow the Mass mill, which is expected to go into commission for regular operation, as by that time a plentiful supply of rock will be on hand. The regular shipment of rock will likely begin today. The mill is in operation Saturday and is expected to be in operation several hours today.

ALL Seeking the Baltic Lode.

Owing to a better showing recently secured, No. 2 shaft of the Winona was sunk for another level or two. The diamond drills of the Wyandott and Elm River properties, in the Winona district, of copper found at the point where the lode was first cut. The Rhode Island company is opening on what is supposed to be an extension of the Quincy's "west lode" and is getting a fair amount of copper therefrom.

Says It Has Passed Its Zenith.

The Boston Financial News comments as follows on the Calumet & Hecla report. "The report makes comparisons that are hardly of a favorable character. During the year the production of mineral was equivalent to 37,932 tons of refined copper, as compared with 44,584 tons of the preceding year, or a decrease of 8.5 per cent. The production of refined copper during the year amounted to 26,226 tons, as compared with 49,312, a decrease of 7.3 per cent. The average selling price of copper during the last fiscal year was lower than during 1899, the range being 16 1/2 @ 17 cents as compared with 16 @ 18 1/2 cents."

Mystery in Store of Copper.

The Tamarack-Osceloa wharves at Dollar Bay are still piled up with copper, about six thousand tons being on hand there at present. So far as is known this is the largest accumulation of copper to be found anywhere at the present time and is viewed with deep suspicion and some alarm by people who are interested in the maintenance of the present high price of the metal.

Copper Gossip.

Reports from the Lake state that the second vein of Mohawk, recently discovered in the Mohawk mine, is about ten inches wide and very rich. The Isle Royale mill is now stamping about 1,400 tons of rock daily and securing about one per cent. copper therefrom. The amount of heavy copper raised from the mine for the past few weeks has been surprisingly large.

THE SONS' CELEBRATION.

With Good Weather It Would Have Been a Hummer.

The rain Saturday marred to a great extent the celebration conducted by the Sons of St. George societies in this city. It was necessary to call the sports off and the parade was forced to disband by a severe shower that came on while the societies were marching through Main street. All the indoor exercises were held and the wrestling was started and will be finished today.

The rain, however, did not spoil the decorations and the continuance of the storm made Saturday's celebration somewhat of a failure, although under the circumstances the committees in charge did nobly. The attendance was even larger than expected and all came prepared for a good time. The South Shore brought in over 1,500 excursionists. Of these about 600 came from the copper country.

It is estimated by the railroad and street car people that at least five thousand strangers, including the attendance from Negaunee and Winthrop, were in the city Saturday. Many of these spent yesterday here, returning to their homes last night. Six brass bands from out of town attended. Included in this number was the famous C. & H. band, which participated in the prize at the Milwaukee carnival. All were anxious to hear the band play. Late in the afternoon a couple of selections were rendered at the Nelson House. The Hayes band of Ironwood also attracted special attention. The members of this band appeared in the parade in white uniforms. They got soaked, as did all the other musicians, but were soon out again in blue uniforms. The turnout was excellent and thousands lined the streets and sidewalks to view the procession. The marchers were not the only ones who got caught in the downpour.

The tent and grounds surrounding it were so wet that the exercises scheduled to take place there were pulled off in the opera house instead. This included the band contest and the concert. The miners' drilling contest was also abandoned. The ladies and others working at the tent had a difficult task keeping the eatables dry and in this they were not entirely successful. All the athletic contests, also the sports at Lake Bancroft, were declared off.

The Band Contest.

The band contest at 5 o'clock attracted a large crowd to the opera house. Three bands entered for the contest, these being the Ishpeeming City band, the Quincy band of Hancock and the Negaunee City band. The Calumet & Hecla band refused to enter the contest, the members of that organization considering that it would not be right for them to participate in a singing or contest to a Mining Journal representative, Instructor Vandercook of the band said his men did not wish to be considered hoggish, and in case they entered the contest he was afraid some would look on it in that light. The Ishpeeming City band was awarded first prize and the Quincy got second.

TOOK A FATAL STEP.

An Old Resident of Ishpeeming Killed by Falling Into a Ditch.

Stephen Lessor, an aged man living at Rock's Kilns, four miles west of Ishpeeming, was drowned Saturday night by falling into a ditch on West Division street near the Finnish boarding house. The man was walking to his home and, when passing the ditch, lost his balance and fell head foremost into the water. The opening is about ten feet deep and in falling Lessor struck his head against a sharp rock, receiving a severe injury. It is thought that he was rendered unconscious by the fall and that was unable to help himself when he landed in the water. William Treloar, who lives in that locality, was passing the trench and saw something that resembled a man's foot sticking out of the water. He thought nothing of it until Mrs. Lake informed him that she was sure she saw a man fall into the ditch. He at once investigated and found Lessor in the water face downward. With the aid of his cousin William Renice of Calumet, Treloar pulled the man out of the ditch. He was still alive and Dr. W. C. Conley of the Ishpeeming hospital was at once summoned. When he arrived Lessor was very low. The physician had him removed to the hospital at once. Shortly after his arrival there the man expired.

Judge William Peters summoned a jury and after viewing the remains an adjournment was taken until this morning at 10 o'clock.

The place where Lessor met his death is extremely dangerous, especially in the night. The city has the street torn up laying a new water main and even when the are lights are burning it is dark at that particular spot. Saturday night, owing to a break-down at the power plant, the lights were out. It is surprising that Lessor took a misstep lost his balance, and fell into the ditch.

The deceased had lived in this city and vicinity for the past thirty years. He was formerly employed by Andrew Rock, but for the last five years has lived with George Rock, a son of Andrew. Although Lessor was seventy-two years of age he had the appearance of being not more than sixty, and was hale and sprightly. He walked from Rock's Kilns to the city Saturday and at 4 o'clock that afternoon was in Rock's saloon on Main street. He left about that time, saying that he was going home. At 8 o'clock Saturday night he was still in the city, and was seen by several during the evening. People who talked to him say he was not intoxicated.

The funeral will be held this morning at 8 o'clock from St. Joseph's church, Father Poulin officiating.

MARRIED WINDOWS.

Plate Glass Valued at \$3,000 Is Malignantly Disfigured.

Perhaps the most willful act of malicious destruction of property that ever occurred in this city was perpetrated here Friday night, when plate glass windows, valued at \$3,000, were scratched by some unknown person. It is not known whether or not the scratch is deep enough to cause the windows to break, but this makes little, if any, difference as the windows are woefully disfigured.

Whoever performed the dastardly act was either supplied with a diamond or a piece of hard quartz. From the looks of the scratch it appears that the vandal used the latter.

Minor damage to other windows, the first cost of which is placed at \$250, Anderson & Co., five windows; \$1,500, original cost.

L. A. L'roulx, two windows; \$400, original cost.

William Leininger, one window; \$150, original cost.

J. N. Fohlman, two windows; \$300, original cost.

A. W. Meyers, one window; \$200, original cost.

Child's Art Gallery, one window; \$200, original cost.

Minor damage to other windows, the first cost of which is placed at \$250. A reward of \$200 will probably be offered to anyone who furnishes information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who did the deed. The merchants whose windows were damaged will make every effort to run down the culprit.

WILL FLY TODAY.

Joe Gaboring's homing pigeons will make another trip from Republic to this city this afternoon, leaving the Pasteur House at 1 o'clock p. m. George Vorey will wave at Nelson House, assisting Landlord Outwaite during the Sons of St. George society's reunion, took the pigeons home with him last evening. At 1 o'clock sharp he will release them. Many here will doubtless watch for their home coming. They covered the distance from Republic to Ishpeeming last Thursday in one hour and twenty minutes, so they will likely arrive today soon after 2 o'clock. These are the first homing pigeons ever seen here. Mr. Gaboring recently bought them at Green Bay, Wis., where they are quite plentiful. Owners of fast birds in the Wisconsin towns frequently send them hundreds of miles from home. Heavy wagers are often put up, the owner of the first bird arriving taking the money.

When released the birds have a peculiar way of starting on their homeward journey. They begin to whirl in the air and often going up one hundred feet or more they start for home. On Thursday they whirled about eight minutes before they headed toward the Hematite city.
