

The only way now left open to the compan would be to erect an iron trestle and h said that this would require such a large expenditure of the company' funds that it is entirely out of the question. To erect a trestle would cost in the neighborhood of \$8,000 and by the time the road was equipped with rolling stock the expenditure would be so great that it would take many years to get that end of the system on profit paying basis

The railroad companies whose tracks it would be necessary to cross are will-ing that the line be built and have granted permission to pass over the But the railroad commissioner stepped in an prohibited the company from doing so. The question is now up to Mr. Osborn, and if he can be induced to withdraw his objections the extension will doubtless be built at no distant date, as the improvement is favored by a majority of the stockhold

THOROUGH RENOVATION PLANNED.

PERFECT CONDITION.

Considerable Expense-Grounds Are Now Receiving At-

When the projected work about and in the school buildings of the Marquette system is completed they, for the first time in the city's history, will be in all but perfect condition and, what is a great deal better, there is every indication that it will be the policy of the trustees to maintain them at a high standard of appearance and efficiency. Some days ago The Mining Journal outlined a long schedule of the repairs needed at the several structures, urging contractors to call on the school officers to submit bids. At that time it was said that the trustees, owing to the question of expense, were undecided whether to proceed and make all the listed improvements. They have since determined to put each building in good

This means the expenditure of a couple of thousand dollars, but it is impossible to see how the money could be used to better advantage. It is not too much to say that the condition of a couple of the buildings during the past two or three years has been disgraceful, whereas, with the projected work finished, they will all not only be entirely habitable, but even inviting.

The improvements include kalsominof cement floors and the jacketing of steam pipes in the basements, painting and carpentering work wherever it is necessary above stairs, renovation and, in some instances, change of location of water clasets, repairs of blackboards provision of picture molding, new floors and many minor things.

The largest single improvement will be the installation of a steam heating plant at the Hampton street building.

There is a sentiment on the board now that, when once the schools are put in first class condition, they should not be allowed to deteriorate and a policy of keeping them in spick and span order by making even the slightest repairs as soon as they appear necessary will likely be inaugurated. If . this proves the case, the buildings will always be in good order and there will never be a necessity for such general and widespread work as is to be finished in the next few weeks.

It must not be forgotten that in addition to the renovation, inside and out. of the several structures their grounds are also being, again for the first time in the city's history, put in attractive and artistic trim, this task progressing under the direction and supervision of Mrs. A. E. McCrea of Chicago.

Mrs. McCrea asked and obtained from the board an appropriation of \$1,000, which, she says, is sufficient to put all the premises in good order. This sun will defray the expense of grading, pre paring the soil for sod and seed and partially sodding parts of the premise and seeding the remainder, to say nothing of providing an ample supply vine stuffs and shrubbery which will b employed in obtaining desirable land scape effects on the different grounds.
