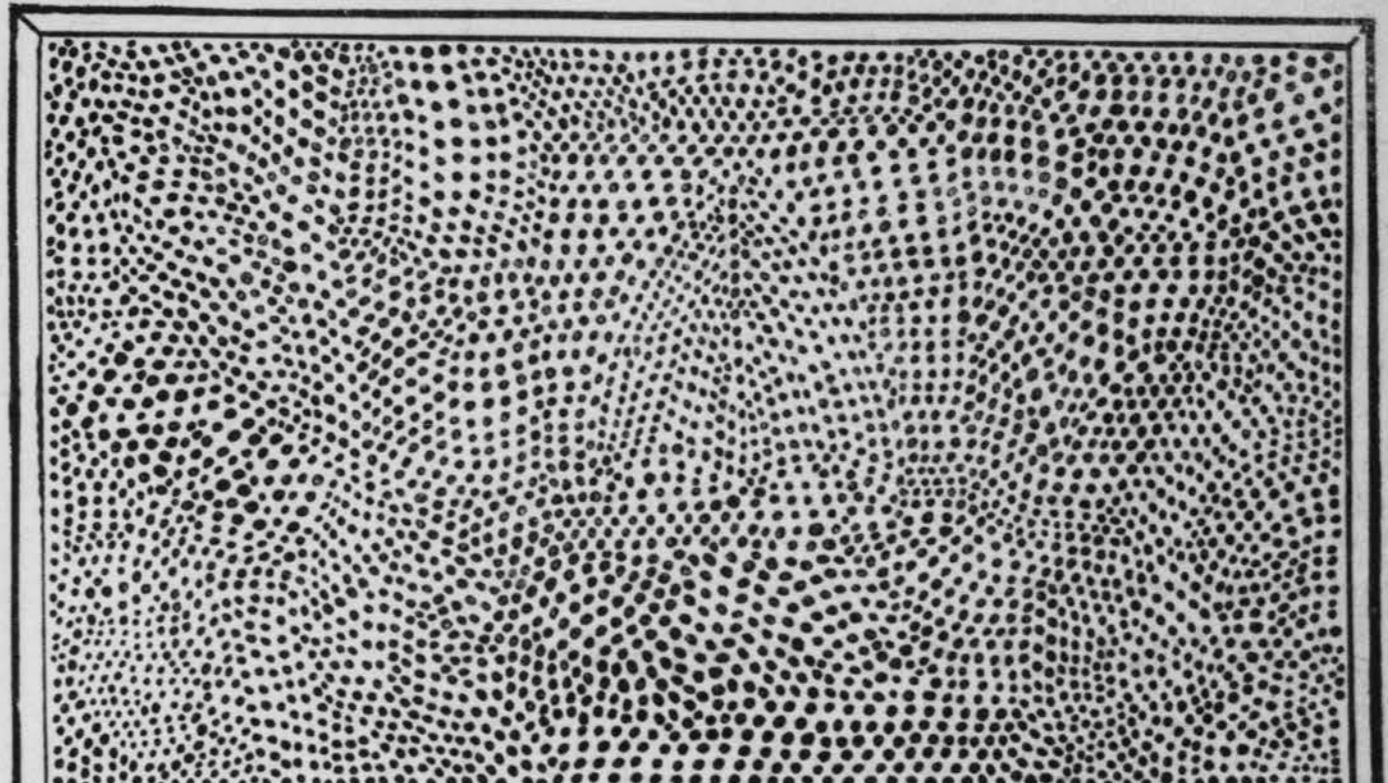

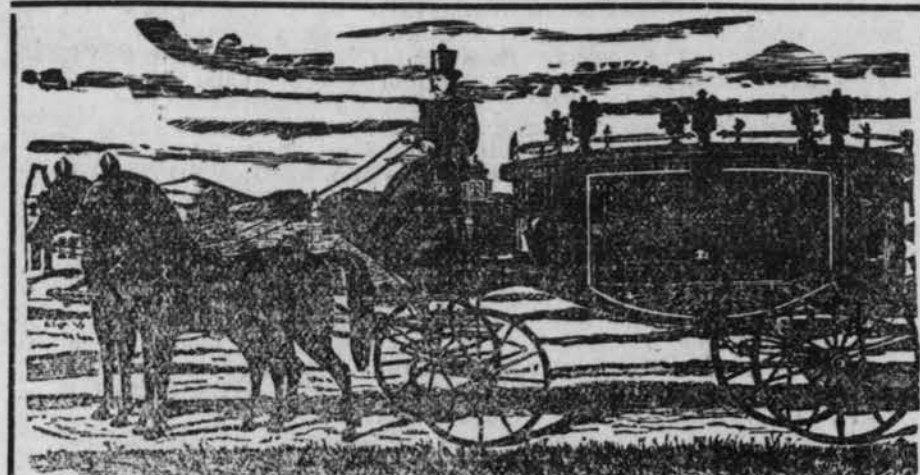

# MARKHAM WRITES

### HEALTH OFFICER PROPOSES FURTHER REFORMS.

### WOULD ABOLISH PRIVIES

### HE TAKES HIS DUTIES RATHER SERIOUSLY.

#### Addresses Interesting Letter on Matters of Sanitation to the Public—Ordinances Which May Be Read With Profit.

Health Officer Russel C. Markham is taking the duties of his office seriously. To it, no large salary is attached and it is one of those positions which are usually honorary and to the duties of which the incumbent ordinarily pays but little attention. Doctor Markham, however, seems to feel that, in justice to himself and the municipality, he should survey local conditions carefully and strive to remedy many glaring abuses. He has been busy since spring with his duties, giving no little time to the manifold problems and questions which have come under his eye. He is today the best informed man in the city where questions of Marquette's sanitary condition are concerned. He deserves the co-operation of every public spirited citizen and all of his utterances are well worthy of attention. He addresses the following letter to the public:

Marquette, Mich., Aug. 10, 1901.

To the Public—In a thickly settled part of this beautiful city your health officer recently found a small tenement house, on a small lot, in which lived twenty-seven human beings, the house being without sewer connections, although a sewer passed the property. Two dirty, filthy, filled-up, death-breeding privies were in close proximity to three houses. All the dishwater and house slops were being thrown into the yard, near the house, and, thence, ran out onto the adjacent property.

Sewer Connections Required.

Many minor nuisances have been abated, but the work has just begun. We are yet wallowing in filth, breathing it every minute, eating it every day and still wondering why we are sick so frequently.

On damp days the stenches from dirty privies is so overwhelming in certain

vicinities that some streets in this city, where there are sewer privies, are shunned by people who do not care to take the risk and subject themselves to the annoyance of traversing them.

It is the opinion of your health officer that every open water closet in this city is a public nuisance, a menace to the public health and that they should be abolished forthwith. He, therefore, will compel, if necessary, the owner of every house or business place adjacent to a sewer to at once connect with the same and remove all traces of outside privies.

However crying the need and advisability of paved streets, boulevards, public parks and summer hotels, the fact remains that no permanent prosperity can come to this city until it is made invitingly clean, in reality as well as in appearance. God has given us much. Up to the present time we, in this great natural health resort, have abused our gifts.

This department has made a start with the work. Do you desire it pushed to a finish? I wish publicly to thank the present administration for its course in cordially supporting this department in the reforms begun.

#### Charter Provisions.

Supplementing the foregoing, Doctor Markham requests that the following ordinances, partially outlining the charter's provisions relative to the disposition of sewerage, the health officer's duties and powers, be printed in full:

Page 118, Section 6—All cesspools, vaults and other receptacles for sewer drainage now constructed and those which may hereafter be constructed upon streets where no proper sewerage is provided shall be under the care and control of the health officer and shall be constructed, ventilated and emptied as he shall direct.

Page 119, Section 7—On and after the passage of this ordinance no house, sewer, drain or waste pipes from any buildings or premises shall be discharged into the cesspool, vault or other receptacle where such building or premises is provided with proper sewerage accommodation with which the same can be connected, and if at any future time such premises are provided with proper sewerage accommodations the further use of such cesspools, vaults, etc., shall be discontinued and the proper sewers and drains constructed whenever the health officer shall deem the public health demands it.

#### Power and Penalties.

Page 119, Section 8—Every person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or disobeying or neglecting to comply with any lawful direction, given under this ordinance by any officer of said city, shall upon conviction thereof before any court of competent jurisdiction be punished by a fine of not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not more than thirty days, or both such imprisonment and fine, in the discretion of said court.

Page 150, Section 2 (s)—He, the health officer, shall direct the abatement of nuisances, and shall take measures for the punishment of persons violating any law of the state or any ordinance of the city for the preservation of the public health, cleanliness or comfort, and do all the acts which he shall deem

necessary and expedient for the preservation of the health and the suppression of disease in the city, and to carry into effect and execute the powers conferred by law upon the board of health and the health officer.

Page 150, Section 2 (t)—He shall and may call to his aid and assistance in the discharge of his duties the marshal and police of the city; and it shall be the duty of the marshal upon the requisition of the health officer, to detail police officers to serve under the direction of the health officer in the enforcement of the ordinances of the city and the orders of the health officer.

Page 152, Section 10—Any failure to comply with or violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or of any of the lawful orders of the board of health, or of any of the lawful orders of the health officer incurred in the discharge of his duties by the mayor, shall be punished by fine or imprisonment, or both, in the discretion of the court, the fine not to exceed one hundred dollars, nor the imprisonment three months.

Page 153, Section 4—No owner or occupant of any grocery, cellar, tallow chandler's shop, tannery, butcher shop, slaughter house, stable, barn, privy, sewer, or other building or place shall allow any nuisance to exist or remain on his or her premises.

Page 153, Section 6—The keeper of any livery or other stable shall keep the stable and stable yard clean, and shall not permit between the first day of June and the first day of November any manure to accumulate in or near the same, in such quantities to be offensive to the public.

#### SUMMER TERM CLOSED.

Northern Normal Instructors Will Now Enjoy a Vacation.

The second annual summer school of the Northern Normal closed Friday, when a six weeks term was concluded. There will now be a suspension of activity at the institution until the work of the third year of regular sessions is taken up the coming fall. The faculty is at liberty and will proceed to enjoy the ensuing several weeks vacation. Many of its members have left the city, on pleasure or on knowledge bent. With two exceptions the summer school faculty was made up of the regular corps of instructors.

The second summer school has been considered an unqualified success. Some forty-five cities and towns have been represented by students, the average attendance being good. Many of the students are school teachers who seized the opportunity of doing a few weeks advanced work to freshen up their ideas. Most of the summer school people have been located at the Normal dormitory, which will now shortly be open for the reception of hay feverites and whoever else of the summer visitors who may desire to stay there at the usual fair rates for board and rooms.
