Chicago, Aug. 19.-The Washington correspondent of The Tribune says: It is more than thirty-six years since the war of the rebellion closed and a new generation of men has come upon the scene since Grant received the surrender of Lee, and yet the pension roll is larger today than ever before. im of its own generosity. vill stagger even the best friends of the old soldier. The figures are in flat deiance of all tables of life insurance sta tistics. The pensioners now on the rolls amount to the startling total of 997,735. In round numbers this is about one penioner for every seventy-five men, women, and children in the United States. During the last year the net gain to the cension rolls amounted to 4,206, of these ,849 were Spanish war pensioners, but eliminating them there is still an actual increase in the pensions thirty-six years after the great war of the rebelion closed.

### Over \$250,000 a Day Paid Out.

The expenditure last year for pensions was \$138,531,483, or over a quarter of a million dollars a day for the entire year. The figures are so stupendous and the increase of the pension list so persistent as to discourage even the best friends of the old soldiers.

From July 1, 1865, at the close of the civil war, until July 1, 1901, the close of the last fiscal year, this country has paid out the appalling sum of \$2,666,the greenbacks, treasury notes, and bonds of the United States and leave leave. hough to redeem the silver certificates n gold and dump the silver dollars in he Potomac.

An examination of the figures just urnished by the commissioner shows hat the number of pensioners on June 30, 1900, was 993,529. During the year 38,153 died, but at the same time 44,-25 new names were added to the rolls. There is yet no loss from the veterans of the rebellion, but a net gain on the rolls for one year of 1,944. Thus the new pensioners on account of a war which nded thirty-six years ago actually outumber the deaths.

### No Reduction for Many Years.

A further examination of the rolls does not tend to show that the pension list is liable to be reduced soon. The roll grew, first, because, after the law of 1890 sand people. The same proportion holds good as to the widows, 145,111 being granted pensions because of the death of their usbands from diseases other than those contracted in the service, while only 83,802 claim rewards because they are he widows of soldiers who died directly from bullets or diseases of actual war.

Thus it appears that the new widows are likely to make up for the deaths while from year to year old soldiers who have been healthy gradually acquire new disabilities and become pensionable.


