



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

SALOONKEEPERS BARRED.

St. Paul's Court of Catholic Foresters in Favor of the Measure.

The ruling of the Catholic Order of Foresters barring saloonkeepers from membership will have little effect in this city, or in any of the towns and cities of the upper peninsula. Most of the members of that organization in this section are in favor of the change. The only delegates who opposed the resolution were from the large cities, and even

Saloon men who are now members of he order will not be deprived of their embership, but persons engaged in the mor traffic will be barred from enterig the order hereafter. The Catholic Knights and the Knights of Columbus, both strong fraternal orders, have a rule against admitting saloon men to embership, similar to that just adopted by the Foresters.

Since the adoption of the new rule ome complaints have been heard in the ities about the action of the society. While the members who are now enraged in the saloon business are not afected they are strenuously opposed to the discrimination, as it bars this class of business men from the only Catholic fraternal insurance society that has heretofore been open to them. On the other hand, the members of

he organization who were instrumental in having the rule adopted claim that t will strengthen the society and reduce the death rate considerably. It is an admitted fact that the death rate among persons engaged in the liquor business is much greater than among persons in any other way of life. To cut down he mortuary rate the Foresters were obliged to take the stand they did at

heir last general meeting. A Negaunee member, in speaking of the action of the Foresters in barring saloonkeepers, said: "It was the only ogical course to pursue. The courts from the smaller towns have long advocated such action, but the delegates that it would seriously affect the membership of the organization. A close percentage of the new members received years are engaged in the saloon busi-We can eliminate this class without hurtfully affecting our society. The city courts are talking of having the question reconsidered. If it ever comes up again it will be carried with a greater majority than it was at the re-

"St. Paul's court of Foresters, which s the Negaunee branch of the society has no member who is engaged in the saloon business, either directly or inlirectly, and if a canvass of the towns of the upper peninsula is made it will different, but on close inspection it will be found that outside of a few city Warren's famous resort. courts only a small percentage of the members of the society are engaged in the liquor traffic. By barring saloo men the society will increase its membership from other sources and will strengthen itself financially."
