THIRTY GOLFERS

APPROXIMATELY THAT NUMBER WILL BE HERE SATURDAY.

TO COMPETE IN U. P. TOURNAMENT.

REPRESENTATIVES OF FIVE CITIES WILL BE PRESENT.

Championship of This Section at Stake—Suitable Trophies Will Be Offered—Entertainment for the Visitors.

The first championship tournament for upper peninsula golfers, to be held in Marquette under the auspices of the Seymour club, promises to be an unequalled success. There are golf clubs in this section at the Soo, Menominee, Houghton, Calumet, Ishpeming and Marquette. Each of these organizations will be represented by players, except Calumet, and as they will all send their best men it is not too much to say that the result of the tournament will determine the best golfer connected with any club regularly organized north of the straits.

According to word received from the Soo and Menominee, these cities will be represented by half a dozen players each. Houghton expects to send down a trio. The Seymour club will be represented by ten players and it is expected that the Ishpeming and Negaunee organization will enter an equal number. This will give a total of thirty or more participants and, as they will comprise the best players in this section, some good sport should be forthcoming.

Play will commence tomorrow afternoon, as soon after 1:30 o'clock as possible. The preliminaries will consume considerable time, so it is desired to make an expeditious start. Owing to the expected large number of entries, it is probable that most of Saturday afternoon will be taken up with the preliminaries, although it is just possible that some of the rounds of the semifinals will be played. The tournament will be resumed Monday afternoon, when it will doubtless be concluded.

Members of the Seymour club intend to see that their guests have a pleasant time while they are in Marquette. Saturday afternoon will be occupied with play, but that evening the visitors will be received at the Marquette club, where there will be informal entertainment and luncheon.

Sunday afternoon carriages will be driven to points of interest in the city and vicinity under the escort of their

Marquette friends. Other private entertainment will be provided for many of the visitors who have particular friends in the city.

The Seymour club will provide appropriate trophies for the tournament, including one for the upper peninsula champion. These are now being prepared. Its members are prepared to do everything in their power to make the first tournament of what they hope will be a successful series entirely pleasant and satisfactory to all concerned.

The public is cordially invited to witness the play. Those who know golf will need no urging and those who have yet to form an acquaintance with the game can find no more favorable time. Shelters will be provided for the ladies.

There is certain to be some good golf and the contest for the championship is likely to be close. Among the outsiders will be a number of excellent players and the Seymour club is not without a couple of promising candidates for honors.

Fear for Their Links.

The members of the Seymour club fear for the permanency of their links, on which the championship tournament will be held. They were laid out some five years ago and have been used ever since. The club has expended a couple of thousand dollars on them, but, owing to the nature of the ground, has not been able to do much with them, although they are fairly serviceable.

The land on which the nine hole course is laid out is embodied in the tract owned by the new Northern Land company, which expects to exploit a summer hotel near Picnic Rocks. Many of the golfers do not expect to get more than a year's additional use out of the present links and some of them are wondering what can be done to replace them, hating to consider the idea of abandoning the game.

The links were crossed by the line of the Marquette & Southeastern railroad a few weeks ago, but this intrusion did not in the least detract from their availability, if anything improving them, as the roadbed provides a hazard which makes one hole, formerly a little too easy, somewhat harder.

It is possible that the land necessary for the links will not be needed for a couple of years, in which event the golf club will probably be secure in its possession. If this does not prove the case and it has to give up the present links some time next year, it is likely that an effort will be made for pursuing the sport at another location.

FOUR CURB ATTRACTIONS.

Marquette Having a Street Fair Without Paying for It.

Down town was considerably livelier last evening than on any of the previous evenings of the week, this owing to the fact that Brother Paul, of the Quaker aggregation, with a trio of cheap vaudeville performers, reinforced Messrs. Smooth and Lightning Calculator and Tom Bawden of Detroit. If there was any one in the city who is not convinced of the fact that the American people like street curb entertainments, in which the sucker all too frequently plays an important part, he might have had his doubts dispelled last evening.

The audiences addressed by Brother Paul, Mr. Smooth, Mr. Lightning Calculator and Tom Bawden, with apologies to the latter, would have filled the Marquette Opera House to overflowing and at least a couple of hundred dollars of hard earned money was shovelled out to the first named trio.

Mr. Lightning Calculator entertained the smallest crowd, probably because, all things considered, he had the most meritorious offering. He sold his mathematical books and his approved calendars and seemed to be doing pretty well.

Mr. Smooth did his usual land office business, disposing of a whole back full of volumes in a little over an hour. One thing is commendable in this lively and ingenious trader. He deals only in standard works of the acknowledged novelists and occasionally ventures into even more pretentious realms of literature.

But Mr. Smooth would have his auditors believe that he is a philanthropist. If there was as much money in philanthropy as he is making nightly, the country would be swarmed with men of the purest philanthropic motives.

Mr. Smooth, like all other gentry who use the street curb to sell their offerings, is after bigger and quicker profits than he could obtain doing business in the usual manner and it may be put down that he is getting them, his big philanthropic heart to the contrary.

Still the tendency is to find but little genuine fault with a man who vendes good literature, even if it is dished up on inferior paper, and that at a good price. If Mr. Smooth was not in the book business he might be exploiting a corn cure.

Brother Paul, with his trio of indifferent artists, was the strongest card in Marquette's impromptu street fair and, in his line, he is as effective and "winning" in his methods as Mr. Smooth. His vaudeville served to attract an assemblage that must have contained upwards of four or five hundred people, it being equal in size to those entertained at the other three street corners. When the crowd was gathered about the drag, which served as a stage, on Superior street, opposite the depot, Brother Paul was merciful and called off the show, taking the center of the boards himself.

Brother Paul effects the Quaker garb. He looks something like the cartoon with which most people are familiar through its presence on packages of a well known breakfast food. He talks loudly, vehemently and plausibly and gesticulates like a windmill.

He uses the vernacular and is long on "brothers and sisters." He claims Quaker descent and is not at all modest in his outspoken recommendations of himself, his family and his companion brethren, who, last evening, were entertaining the good people of Negaunee. His honesty, integrity, industry, humanity and philanthropy are ever on his lips. He referred feelingly to the Quaker doctors' recent experience at Houghton.

Of course Brother Paul, in due time, produced his remedies and he drove a lively trade. It is understood that he and his artists are here for an indefinite stay.

Tom Bawden addressed another crowd last evening, although his audience would have been swallowed up in either of the three assembled at the other points. The trouble with Tom is that he believes what he says. That removes all the attractiveness from a street curb harangue.

PHARMACISTS EXAMINED.

State Board in Session Here Wednesday and Yesterday.

The state board of examiners for pharmacists was in session here Wednesday and yesterday. Thirteen candidates were before it and, it is said, they all passed, except five. A number of outside cities were represented in the class. One of the successful pharmacists is W. C. Gates of Rockland, who now has his full papers. He was greatly pleased yesterday at his success in getting the required percentage. The ordeal that the examiners for pharmacists put the candidates through is severe. They know that when they approve a man he is thoroughly qualified to handle and compound drugs. The percentage of failures in these examinations is great, usually running fifty per cent, or over.

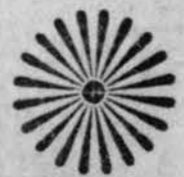
