SKETCH OF THE PRESIDENT'S CAREER.

William McKinley was born at Niles, Trumbull county, Ohio, Jan. 29, 1843; was educated in the public schools, Poland academy and Allegheny college; before attaining his majority he taught in the public schools; enlisted as a private in the Twenty-third Ohio Volunteer infantry June 11, 1861; promoted to commissary sergeant April 15, 1862, to cond lieutenant Sept. 23, 1862, to first lieutenant Feb. 7, 1863, to captain July 25, 1864; served successively on the staffs of Generals R. B. Hayes, George Crook and Winfield S. Hancock, and was brevetted major in the United States volunteers by President Lincoln for gallantry in battle March 13, 1865; detailed as acting assistant adjutant general of the First Division, First Army Corps, on the staff of General S. S. Carroll; mustered out of the service July 26, 1865; returning to civil life, he studied law in Mahoning county; took a course at the Albany (N. Y.) Law School, and in 1867 was admitted to the bar and settled at Canton, Ohio, which has since been his home; in 1869 he was elected prosecuting attorney of Stark county, and served a term in that office; in 1876 was elected a member of the national house of representatives, and for fourteen years represented the congressional district of which his county was a part; as chairman of the ways and means committee he reported the tariff law of 1890, but in November following was defeated for congress in a gerrymandered district, although reducing the usual adverse majority from 3,000 to 300; in 1891 was elected governor of Ohio by 6681 up pur 'He'le of Supernid a was reelected by a plurality of 80,995; in 1884 was a delegate at large to the Republican national convention and supported James G. Blaine for president; was a member of the committee on resolutions and read the platform to the convention; in 1888 was also a delegate at large from Ohio, supporting John Sherman, and as chairman of the committee on resolutions again reported the platform; in 1892 was again a delegate at large from Ohio, and supported the renomination of Benjamin Harrison, and served as chairman of the convention. At that convention 182 yotes were cast for him for president, although he had persistently refused to have his name considered. On June 18, 1896, he was nominated for president at St. Louis, receiving 661 out of a total of 905 votes. He was elected president at the ensuing November election by a popular plurality of 600,000 votes. and received 271 electoral votes as against 176 for William J. Bryan of Nebraska. Last year Mr. McKinley was reelected by a heavily increased majority, receiving 292 electoral votes to 155 for Bryan. His popular vote over Bryan was 849,455.

OUTCROPPING OF HAYMARKET RIOTS?

Washington, Saturday, Sept. 7.—It is the opinion of secret service officials here that the shooting of the president is an outcropping in an obscure way of the Haymarket riots and that it will be found eventually that Nieman has some connection with the group of persons associated in the Chicago anarchists' riot. The secret service officials are of this opinion because of the name of the man and the fact he is probably from the same general section of the country as some of the Haymarket participants. The secret service bureau has the Paterson (N. J.) group of anarchists thoroughl- under surveillance and the officials are confident Nieman has no association with them. Three secret service operatives were in Buffalo about the president at the time of the shooting and another was on the way to Cleveland.

Buffalo, Sept. 6 .- 8 p. m .- The would-be assassin is a Pole named Fred Neiman, twenty-eight years old and well dressed, stands five feet nine inches high, weighs 160 pounds and has dark brown hair, blue eyes, a smooth face and regular features, with a prominent nose. He speaks very good English and has claimed to come from Cleveland, Chicago and Detroit, but he has told so many stories that his home is still a matter of conjecture. It is not yet known whether he was born in this country or The district attorney is no x closeted with him. All police reserves have been called into the central office to guard against any possible trouble and the police headquarters are roped off for a block distant in every direction.

At the home of John Nowaks, 810 Brodway, it was stated tonight that Nieman came here last Satur lay. He said he was from Toledo and came to Buffalo to see the exposition. He was alone and had no visitors, His vause contained an empty revolver case and a few clothes.

Detroit, Sept. 6.-Late tonight a newspaper reporter discovered that a man named Alfred Nieman had boarded at 178 Russell street up to two weeks ago, when he left for Buffalo. A description of Fred Nieman was read to Alfred Nieman's landlady, and she declared it fitted him excepting that Alfred's hair was not dark, but medium brown, wavy and thick. He wore it brushed off his foreheaethd. He also had very white and even teeth. This Alfred Nieman was a wagon-maker.
