

Among these exigencies are disease, accident and the bullet of the assassin such as we have heard of in the past forty hours. The occurance at Buffalo indicates that no man is safe from the shaft of death. It is very difficult to get away from it, and while I have been loyal to the law and have ever contended for its strict enforcement, I must say the affair of Friday has almost converted me into an advocate of lynch law." The above extract from the sermon of Dr. H. R. Naylor, presiding el-

der of the Washington Methodist district, was the only direct reference made in the regular sermon preached today at the Metropolitan Methodist Episcopal, the church the president attends when in Washington. When the regular service was concluded the congregation transformed itself into a mass meeting and adopted a message of sympathy.



Chicago, Sept. 8.—Under the direction of City Prosecutor Taylor, warrants have been sworn out and nine anarchists-Abraham Isaak and othersplaced under arrest, charged with conspiracy to assassinate and kill President McKinley. Chicago was the place in which Leon

Czolgosz, the assailant of President Mc Kinley, is now supposed to have planned the assassination of the nation's execu tive. While in Chicago, it is said he gave the name of Fred Czlosz, a simplified form of Czolgosz. He was in Chicago from July 4 to 12 and constantly followed Emma Goldman, who was lecturing here at that time. He said he wanted to join the secret circle of anarchists and kill a ruler or some person in authority.



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
