The doctor announced that the president had passed the danger point and now only the possibility of complications remained. He also announced that unless the bullet imbedded in the muscles of the back caused trouble, there would be no necessity to extract it. In his opinion it would not even be located with the X-ray. The only use of the X-ray, he said, would be to satisfy says one, "in fighting criminals who incuriosity.

All the other physicians were equally confident after the morning consultation that the recovery of the president is assured.

Buffalo, Sept. 10.-The following bulletin was issued by the president's physicians at 7 o'clock this morning: "The president passed the most comfortable night since the attempt on his life. Pulse, 118, temperature, 110.4; respiration, 28.,'

tation of physicians this morning.

At 9 o'clock this bulletin was issued: "The president's condition this morning is eminently satisfactory to the physicians. If no complications arise, rapid convalescence may be expected. Pulse, 104; temperature, 99.8; fespiration, 26.

A report issued at 3:20 p. m. read: "There has been no change since this morning's favorable bulletins. Pulse, 110; temperature, 100; respiration, 28."

10 o'clock p. m.—The house is very quiet tonight and there are but few callers. The president is said to be resting comfortably.

A bulletin issued by the physicians at 10:30.0'clock tonight showed that the condition of the president was unchanged in all important particulars. His temperature was 100.6; pulse, 114; respiration, 28.

Within the sick room many evidences of improvement were apparent today. The president himself began to show confidence in his ability to care for himself, and from time to time would carefully turn himself to get a more restful position.

# SLIGHT SCARE COMES LATE AT NIGHT.

Buffalo, Sept. 10.-Late tonight there was a slight scare over the condition of the president, caused by a protracted visit of the consulting physicians, who remained for almost two hours; and this was increased by the announcement in official bulletins that a slight irritation of the exterior wound, discovered only tonight, necessitated the opening of a few stitches

The doctors seek to allay all apprehension by the positive statement that the incident cannot give rise to other complications, and their frankness in giving the news to the public leaves no reason to question the

The further fact communicated in the bulletin that the president is now well enough to begin taking nourishment in the mouth was gratifying; but to laymen the mere mention of complication, however slight, naturally created alarm. But most positive assurances were given that the only effect might be to delay slightly the healing of the wound. It was not in any way the result even of a suggestion of blood poisoning. physicians declared over their own signatures that it could not result in

The opening of the wound was in no sense an operation. Several stitches were simply taken out, and after a thorough antiseptic washing the wound was sewed up. No anaesthetics were necessary. The considerable delay was caused by the fact that a certain dressing desired was not in the house and it was necessary to send into the city for it. The first time the messenger returned he did not have what was wanted, and had to make another trip.

After the bulletin was issued Secretary Cortelyou and Mr. Milburn came to the press tent to dispel any alarm that might have arisen, with positive assurances of the unimportance of the incident. Mr. Cortelyou announced there would not be another consultation until morning. After this all was quiet at the Milburn house. Dr. Rixey and Dr. Wasdin will remain on duty, as usual, throughout the night.

"I feel the man is one of those unforunates who have been driven to depair and misery to commit like deeds. I feel very deeply with him as an individ-ual, as I would feel with anybody who suffers. If I had the money I would help him as much as I could; I would see that he had counsel and that justice was done him.'

Anarchist Since Haymarket Riets.

Of herself, Miss Goldman said: "I as born in St. Petersburg thirty-two ars ago and came to this country with sister, now in Rochester, sixteen ears ago. I speak Russian, Italian, man, French and English. I came om the middle class in Russia, but my art has always been with the poor nd down-trodden. 



This is a very satisfactory figure, and as the mine is opened and equipped for production upon a large and thoroughly economical scale, the profits now being earned are sufficient to pay a fine rate of interest on the present selling price of the stock.

The Isle Royale company was organized in 1897 with a cash surplus of one million dollars, in addition to the ownership in fee of the lands on which its mines were opened. In 1899 the Miners' Copper company, owning extensive tracts south of the Isle Royale, was also absorbed, and as the cash surplus of the Miners' company also amounted to a million dollars, the Isle Royale has had an even two million dollars in eash available for its development, in addition to the value of its lands. At the time of the starting of the first stamp in May, 1901, about one and a half mil lions had been expended. The compan had a considerable deposit in the Globe the failure of that institution, in De cember, 1899, but 80 per cent of the deposit has already been paid by the receiver of the bank, and the balance will be forthcoming soon, so that the Isl Royale company will lose nothing, and, as there were plenty of other funds available at all times, will have suffered no inconvenience through the failure.

No copper property ever opened or re-opened in the Lake district has begun actual production under such advantageous circumstances. No other mine has ever started its stamps with so much stoping ground opened, or with such a uplete equipment for mining, crushing and stamping. At the time the first stamp was started, in May, the mine had nearly five miles of drifts opened in addition to the old openings, which were not taken into consideration, and leaving the old Portage and Huron mines out of the matter entirely. amount of stoping ground opened in the Isle Royale at the time its mill started was not less than two million tons. This is much higher than the estimate made by the management, but Captain Parnall's figures are too conservativefault preferable to overstatements. This means that the mine had sufficient stoping ground opened when its first stam started, to supply all three heads with rock to their maximum capacity for four years, without opening another drift or sinking another foot or shaft. Of course the development of the mine will not stop with the beginning of production-in fact there is more untouched stoping ground opened in the mine now in July, than was the case just before the mill started, as it is the policy of the mine to add to its reserves rather than to deplete them.

The operation of the Isle Royale mill has set at rest all remaining doubts as to the value of the mine. No serious fears regarding the future of the prop erty have ever been entertained by thos competent to judge of the mine's value since the organization of the Isle Roy ale company, four years ago. Three things are required to make a mine in this district, the requisites being copper, money and skill. The possession of copper by the Isle Royale has never been a matter for dispute, the large production secured in the past, under unfavorable circumstances, being sufficient evidence of mineral resources. The new company furnished the largest amount of mo ever devoted to the opening and equip ment of a Lake Superior mine, and the ability of the management is not open to question.

The flattering results secured at the Isle Royale in its first two months of operation foreshadow greater developments than have yet taken place. With a big mill, now treating as much rock as the Quincy was stamping only a dec ade or so ago, the Isle Royale has merely touched one corner of its extensive mineral lands. In addition to the Isle Royale lode, on which the mine is opened, there is the parallel Portage amygdaloid, lying but 200 feet distant from the present workings, and other lodes known to carry considerable copper. The Portage mine will probably be reopened next, as it lies close to the Isle Royale tract, and the Huron, which has made nearly 18,000 tons of copper in the past, will eventually be reopened. beyond which there is an immense stretch of undeveloped territory lying between the Huron and Baltic mines. The Isle Royale will continue to grow. and the present milling facilities will be increased. The officials of the company have said nothing as yet about adding to their mill, but the management is not of the sort that believes in standing still, and a big addition to the present mill, or a new mill located near by, will come within a few years.




