Prosecutor Owens stated that the result of the investiga-tion at Buffalo is being awaited.

The court postponed the decision in the matter of bail, which Miss Goldman demanded the privilege of furnishing, until later in the day. While waiting, Judge Chetlain, in the superior court, held the other anarchists until Friday when, he said, he would hear the argunents in application for writs of haeas corpus.

As the charge against Miss Goldman "conspiracy to murder President Me-Kinley"—is the one lodged against the local anarchists, who are named as coconspirators with Miss Goldman, Justice Prindiville thought it wise to await the decision of the higher court. He said it would not be necessary for counsel



WORLD'S BIGGEST ELEVATOR.

It Will Be Built at New York at a Sum of \$2,500 Appropriated to Extermi-

Chicago, Sept. 11.-The largest grain elevator in the world-capacity 4,000,-000 bushels-is to be built at Weehawken, N. J., by the Chicago firm of George M. Moulton & Co., architects and engineers, for the New-York Central and Hudson River railroad on its West

Not only will the elevator when completed exceed in size all others in existence by 1,000,000 bushels capacity but at the same time mark a new era in the handling of grain at the seaboard in rtansit for Europe. The new elevator means the adoption

of Chicago methods at tidewater, where whole trainloads of wheat, corn, and other grains can be swiftly unloaded by machinery, the grain properly weighed, and at once reloaded into an ocean steamer. The present plan of loading grain from lighters is slow and expen-

The new elevator is part of an extensive system of improvements amounting to many millions of dollars and including one and one-quarter miles of new dockage for vessels. The foundation of the new elevator is to be finished by the first of the coming year, and one-half of the elevator, with 2,000,000 bushels capacity, is to be completed by Oct. 1. The entire cost of the elevator will be \$1,800,000 and of freight sheds adjoining \$200,000. In addition Moulton & Co. have the contract for remodeling a big elevator at Weehawken, N. J., at a cost of \$250,000, so that vessels may be loaded from it.

First One Issued, Aug. 15, 1889, Has Rev. Isaac Wilcox of the Methodist Church Assigned to That Pastorate.

It is to the credit of the present adinistration that the first bond outstanding against the city was paid durng its regime. One for \$5,000 issued on count of the city hall Aug. 15, 1889, and bearing interest at 4½ per cent, was paid a short time ago. The city hall ond was the first ever issued against the city and it is gratifying to note that the amount necessary to take it up

The money used in payment of the bond was drawn from the water fund. The amount was a little more than could really be spared at this time, but the city officials deemed it wise to pay the bond in full and get rid of it. Speaking of the bond question yester-

day, Mayor Connors said that it has been his desire to take up the bond that fell due last month. He is gratified that the money was available when needed for that purpose. He said that the street improvement work had about ome to a close and only such work as is absolutely necessary will be done between now and the opening of winter. The mayor is very well satisfied with. the work that has been done on the streets, alleys and walks during the ummer months just past. He says the street committee exercised care and excellent judgment in the expenditure of the funds at its disposal. Such work as ould not stand over for another year vas done and now the mayor believes there will be no complaints, because street making and repairing has been liscontinued for the balance of the sea-

The water works plant is self-sustainng. In fact the receipts of the year vill admit of a few hundred dollars being transferred to the street fund for carrying on of repair work next year. It is intended that the street work shall be taken up at an early date in the spring and it is likely next summer's record will equal that of this summer.

The outstanding bonds against the city at this time amount to \$44,000, ismed as follows: Trunk sewer account Jan. 1, 1893, \$20,000; payments fall due in amounts of \$5,000 each, the first Jan. 1, 1908, and the balance on Jan. 1 of ach of the three succeeding years. On July 1, 1893, a bond of \$4,000 was issued, the money to be used for genera purposes. This falls due July 1, 1903 The first series of water bonds, amoun ing to-\$10,000, were issued July 1, 1893. and the second, of the same amount, were issued Sept. 1, 1898. The former fall due July 1, 1903, and the latter Sept.

In 1903 bonds amounting to \$14,000 will mature. It is a question whether or not all can be paid when due, though there is a possibility of the entire lot being taken up.

All the bonds outstanding are held by Negaunee people, who will doubtless be satisfied to extend them if that should be found necessary. Most of the bonds tra furnished very satisfactory music. are bearing 5 per cent interest, though


