Almighty and Everlasting God, Author of Liberty and Preserver of Peace: We humbly beseech Thee to sanctify to us, Thy people, the affliction which we now endure...

"A prince and a great man is fallen this day in Israel." It Samuel III-28. It has been usual and fashionable, among unscrupulous people, to consider rash and impulsive action characteristic of the men of this western world.

Again, Sunday, the war in South Africa, by Lord Kitchener's proclamation, was officially ended. This has happened before and may happen again, although it is now announced that the war has been ended "positively the last time."

There is general satisfaction with Secretary Cortelyou's reappointment by President Roosevelt. The secretary has admirably sustained his reputation for ability and tact during what has unquestionably been the most trying time of his career.

In any actually elected president I think the American people have not been once deceived. In a vice presidency, raised by unforeseen events to the presidency, perhaps we have been mistaken more than once.

President McKinley's later history is familiar to all of us. You all know his record as representative, as executive of his state, as president of the United States in war and peace.

And yet, in spite of this record, and in the last thirty-six years, three presidents, all eminent men, and men of the people, have fallen by the assassin's pistol; while in the whole of Europe with its many crowned or coroneted heads, where medieval despotism still lingers, and popular oppression is believed to exist...

Undogmatic in many ways as Lincoln was, he was an embodiment of national faith and trust in a merciful and righteous Lord. And without prejudice to the real claims of orthodoxy, I would rather stand at the last beside him who showed that "greater love"

It was the will of God that this great man should live in a world of danger, and be exposed to the trials and difficulties which always beset the good, through the presence and possibility of evil.

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# IS MEMORIAL DAY

THURSDAY TO BE A DAY OF MOURNING IN MARQUETTE.

MEETING AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

PUBLIC TRIBUTE TO BE PAID TO MCKINLEY'S MEMORY.

Acting Mayor Requests That Business Be Suspended During the Afternoon and Citizens Generally Participate in the Services.

Thursday will be a day of mourning in Marquette. On that day all that is mortal of the third American president to die at the hand of an assassin will be laid at rest at Canton, and in common with other cities of the land, Marquette will pay tribute to the memory of the nation's martyred chief magistrate.

M. E. Asire, acting mayor by virtue of his office as president of the council, has, in the absence of Mayor Mangum from the city, issued a proclamation requesting that all places of business and schools be closed in the afternoon, and that all citizens, irrespective of class or creed, join in memorial services.

Meeting at the Opera House. A meeting has been arranged to take place at the opera house. It will be addressed by pulpit orators and other speakers, and the theme of all will be the lamentable tragedy enacted at Buffalo and its results.

The acting mayor's proclamation is as follows:

Proclamation: In compliance with the proclamation issued by President Theodore Roosevelt, the undersigned, acting for the mayor, hereby requests that our schools, public offices and places of business be closed Thursday afternoon, Sept. 19, and that at 2 o'clock, p. m. there be a general assembly of members of all churches, creeds and classes in the opera house for the purpose of paying our tribute of love and devotion to the late President William McKinley, whose untimely death has caused universal grief. (Signed, M. E. Asire, President of the Council.)

Services in the Schools. F. D. Davis, county commissioner of schools, has issued the following order to superintendents and teachers:

"In order that the important lesson of patriotism and devotion to duty may be impressed upon the minds of the children upon whom the responsibilities of government will rest in later years, it is eminently fitting at this time to have presented to them a knowledge of the noble life, exalted personal character, and distinguished public services of our third martyred president, Wil-

liam McKinley. I therefore request that each teacher in the public schools of Marquette county devote a part of Thursday afternoon, Sept. 19, to a memorable service, suitable to the occasion."

**NEXT SUNDAY'S EXCURSION.**  
It Offers a Chance to Visit the Soo at Very Small Expense.

The excursion to the Soo next Sunday, under auspices of Morse Hose company, promises to be largely attended. The firemen have secured a rate of \$3 for the round trip from Ishpeming, Negaunee, Marquette and Munising Junction. The tickets will be valid for passage on the regular train leaving here at 5 o'clock in the morning, and returning for the train leaving the Soo at 6 o'clock in the evening. The time of departure from the Soo is an hour later than the regular time of leaving, the South Shore officials having kindly consented to give the excursionists a longer stay in the Lock City than would otherwise have been the case. The firemen are arranging with a first class hotel to serve supper at 5 o'clock so the patrons of the excursion may have ample time to secure refreshments before boarding the train for home.

**EAST BRANCH SURVEY.**  
That of the Munising Road Was Recently Completed.

H. F. Northrup, chief engineer on the survey for the east branch of the Munising railway, and his crew have completed their work, says the Republican. They were engaged on the survey less than three months and in that time they located the line for twenty-five miles of railway, sixteen of which was for main line of the east branch and ten miles of spurs which will extend into the timber lands at various points.

The clearing of the right-of-way and grading of the roadbed will be commenced immediately. McDonell Bros. & Co., the contractors, already have constructed a camp at Evelyn, the siding east of Wetmore, near the point where the east branch will pass over the South Shore railway. They will use this for a headquarters camp and will operate in both directions from there. They will have their contract on the Marquette & Southeastern completed in a few days and will move their crew to the east branch line. Earth will be flying in earnest before the 25th and the contractors agree to have fifteen miles of the line completed this fall.

Thursday morning a crew of seventy-five men came down from Marquette to begin clearing the right-of-way. They are employed by a man who has a contract for clearing five miles.

## "COPPERS" SHOW STRENGTH.

A Boom Predicted as Soon as the Money Situation Clears.

There was much speculation as to how the Boston market would open yesterday, and as to its course during the day, since no session of the exchange had been held since the death of the president. As a result the brokers' offices were filled with dealers in coppers when the quotations began to come over the wires. It was soon realized that the market was in strong hands, and that any serious decline in prices would not be allowed to occur, at least during the day. Later, when the "copper" letters were received, they were found full of promise of still better things to come, and the atmosphere of the brokers' offices brightened up perceptibly.

Heyden, Stone & Co. wired the Laidley Commission company as follows: "Coppers were exceedingly strong this morning, due mostly to covering by shorts. Just what is going on in Amalgamated is hard to say, but the buying at low figures is of the best. As soon as the money situation clears, we look for a boom in coppers. They are a purchase on all weak spots."

Paine, Webber & Co. wired as follows from Boston:

"The whole list showed great strength all day and closed at the highest. There is a big short interest in the market, and the big interests will probably force it to cover. On any further advances, we would take advantage and sell for a turn. We believe that ultimately much higher prices will be seen, as there is a general strong feeling of confidence in the new president in his desire to carry through unchanged President McKinley's policies."

A. R. Jones & Co. said of wheat: "Strong cables were the chief influence in grains today, and gave wheat a good start. The showing of the visible offer set the clearances. Notwithstanding that the market lost half of its advance today, there is good evidence of a stronger feeling in grains. We cannot see why wheat should not be bought around these figures."

"Corn opened higher, on cold weather in the Northwest. There is not much offered. The short side is a 'ticklish' one now. We would buy corn on the weak spots to hold."

### A DENIAL.

## FINE U. P. FARM.

S. N. Dutcher Has One of 350 Acres Near Newberry.

The people who think they must go West to grow up with the country, are often glad to return to this state to escape grasshoppers and other pests which devastate the lands out there too frequently. In the county of Luce, S. N. Dutcher of Newberry has a 350-acre farm, and although its owner has a banking business in Newberry to attend to, he manages his farm and makes it pay. In conversation with the editor of the Munising Republican, he said:

"I certainly realize a handsome profit from my farm. Last year I threshed over 6,000 bushels of oats grown on the farm, harvested many tons of hay, and during the past spring I sold over \$2,000 worth of beef. I shall also have 6,000 bushels of oats this year. At the present time they are worth fifty cents per bushel. My method of farming is to keep an account of every crop so that I know to a cent what it costs me. The most my oats cost me was 15¢ cents per bushel in the bin."

Speaking of fertilizers, Mr. Dutcher says: "I have tried different kinds of commercial fertilizers, as well as plowing under clover, and I find that the clover is not only very much cheaper, but is incomparably better than the commercial fertilizers. My method of using the clover is to sow the seed with oats in the spring. I get my crop of oats the same year and when it is time for root crops the following year the clover is almost fully grown and is plowed under. Thus the expense of fertilizing amounts to only the cost of the clover seed, which is \$1 per acre. This method of fertilizing may not result so successfully on other soils as it does on mine, but for the light sandy loam I think the clover is the thing."

Mackinac county also has several farmers who are engaged quite extensively in tilling the soil, among them being J. A. Hough, who has 500 acres under cultivation, and sells most of his products in car lots. He deals in hay, oats and potatoes quite extensively, while other garden stuff is grown on his farm at Ozark. He makes it a business for profit, and not to simply gain a living, and his excellent business qualities come in to good advantage. Keeping track of the markets, he knows when to sell, and supplying the wholesale trade he avoids the small transactions. Besides his farm at Ozark, he conducts a general store, where he keeps a very well assorted stock of goods. He is also the postmaster at that place. His lands are very fertile and he keeps them up so that they will not deteriorate. Farm produce raised in this section always finds a ready market, for there is no soil that produces more wholesome vegetables than that of the upper peninsula. Although corn is not considered a good crop in his locality generally, Mr. Hough has a field of fifteen acres of Pride of the North dent, which will be ready to cut in about a week, which he says cannot be surpassed by any he has seen this year as far south as Bay City.
