BIDS ARE ASKED FOR

SCHOOL BOARD PLANS TO BUILD AT RIDGE AND PINE.

TO COMPLETE PROPOSED GROUP.

HIGH SCHOOL AND MANUAL TRAINING STRUCTURES NOW.

Figures Are to Be Submitted by the Last of This Month and it All Depends on Them Whether the Contract Will Be Let.

The first of the new year—possibly before—may witness the inauguration of the work of completing the group of three school buildings planned to occur by the property on Pine street, between Ridge and Arch, formerly taken up by the high school and grounds. At least, the school board has called for bids from contractors.

The structures to be erected are the high school and manual training buildings, and it is the hope that they be ready for service at the opening of the next fall term, in September, 1902. The high school wing will face Ridge street, and the manual training building on Pine, thus completing the admirable scheme planned by the architects, Charlton, Gilbert & Demar, the wing now finished and in commission—the Froebel or grade school—fronting on Arch street, with the boiler house to the rear of the center of the site.

All Depends on the Cost.

However, although bids have been called for, it is not settled that the contract will be awarded. The proposals asked are really wanted so that the board can obtain an idea as to the cost of the buildings, and if the figures presented are considered too high no definite action will be taken. However, if on opening the bids on Nov. 30 the lowest is found to come within reasonable limits, the building operations may be started in a short time thereafter.

The board, thanks to the bonds it has been authorized to issue, will have sufficient funds on hand for the erection and in all likelihood the equipment of the two new structures, but naturally desires to use the money to the best of advantage, hence the determination to accept a reasonable bid or none.

Marquette will have school facilities adequate for many years to come, with the completion of the group of buildings, and the training of young minds to shoot can much better be pursued than ever before. It will be a relief to the high school pupils to attend school in a building specially designed for the purpose, the work at the city

hall now being attended with considerable inconvenience.

Manual Training.

With the completion of the manual training building and the putting of this department into commission, an innovation along educational lines will be launched in Marquette from which much good is sure to accrue. Instruction in this branch—in “the training of the hand to think”—has been a great success, not only in increasing the attendance at schools but in other ways, wherever introduced throughout the country. The value of manual training has long been recognized by the local school trustees. However, inadequate facilities and lack of funds have heretofore prevented a departure along this line, but when this branch is established it is the intention to make the department among the best in the state.

Although the school board probably could see its way clear to equip the manual training department in the best of style, a couple of generous donations will be available for this purpose. This will leave the trustees with a snug “nest egg” that will not come amiss for several additional instructors will of necessity have to be engaged to oversee the work in the new department. For the boys, foundry and carpenter work, pattern making and drawing, and woodworking will be the branches available while for the girls, domestic science will be the course provided, this latter including cooking, sewing and other features of the every-day life of the housewife.

There is practically no question that the manual training department will be the greatest available while for the girls, as well as with the young people, and it is likely that many scholars will elect to take up the work. The manual training school not only has practical value in the instruction it imparts, but it also serves the purpose of drawing to the school room young people who otherwise would stay away and also to keep in school those now inclined to drop out.

MARQUETTE FIRM FINISHES JOB.

The Duluth Evening Herald says: “Powell & Mitchell, of Marquette, Mich., the contractors who have been building the extension to the east breakwaters at Two Harbors, expect to complete the job tomorrow. This extension is 310 feet long and will complete the Two Harbors project adopted several years ago by the government. The north shore projects will then all be completed, that at Grand Marais having been completed earlier in the summer.”

FISHING BOATS TIED UP.

Season Prescribed by Law Comes to a Close Until Dec. 15th.

The end of the month just past marked the close of the commercial fishing season, and the fleet will now go into winter quarters. According to the law, the time between the first day of November and the 15th of December is designated as the closed season, but owing to the snow and ice encountered at the latter named date the fishermen here generally make no effort to ply their vocations until spring. The law prohibits the setting of nets during the closed season, after the last day of October, but three days are allowed within which the nets may be lifted and the various craft have been engaged in that task for the last couple of days. The catch this year has been one of the largest on record, and the local men have made money. Next year the catch promises to be still greater, as the scope of operations from this port will be considerably broadened. TO DIVERT THE TRAFFIC.

Council Committee Favors Widening of Lake Street South of Gas Works.

Preliminary to its report to the council at this evening's meeting, the street committee, together with representation from the committee on finance, has held an important conference with reference to the proposed widening of Lake street made necessary because of the building of the new railroad. The opinion that developed was that the thoroughfare be widened from a point south of the gas works and that there be some provision made whereby the traffic would be diverted at the gas plant and swung up town in a different direction from that now followed, north on Lake street. It is understood that this solution of the problem found unanimous favor, in great part because of the network of rails to the north of the gas plant and owing to the switching on that locality, and that the council will be urged to endorse it.

REPUBLIC IN THE LEAD.

More Hunting Licenses Issued to People There Than to Residents Elsewhere.

Up to the close of office hours Saturday, County Clerk Ross had issued approximately 425 licenses to deer hunters. Considering that the hunting season does not open for some days yet, the record is a close second, Michigan having run ahead of last year's record at this time. A surprising feature is that more applications for permits have been received from Republic than from any other community in the county, although Ishpeming, with its much larger population, is a close second. Michigan has not been heard from at all, but a big batch of applications is expected down from that section today or tomorrow.

According to the law regulating the matter, the issuing of licenses is vested solely in the county clerk, the fees for the same being 75 cents for residents of the state and \$25 for outsiders. However, for the accommodation of hunters living in up-the-road towns, deputies have been authorized to receive applications for licenses, the permits themselves being made out here. For this service, the deputies usually charge 25 cents in addition to the regular fee, but this is not begrudged by the hunters, who by the practice adopted by the county clerk are saved the time and expense of a trip to this city to get their licenses. In many cases, were this policy not in vogue, it would cost, counting the loss of a day's wages and railroad fare and other expenses, \$5 or more to secure the permits necessary to hunt and kill deer. The accommodation is appreciated.
