STORM VISITS COPPERDOM. Blinding Blizzard Reigns and Six Inches of Snow Falls.

The copper country was visited Sunday and yesterday by one of the heaviest now storms, for so early in the season, n several years. All day Sunday a blinding blizzard reigned. It was then that the parties who heard the distress signal realized that the worst had happened.

A party of a dozen or more men was organized and within a few minutes the tug was being steamed for a journey on the lake. The Petrel was also taken out, but it was not in the best repair and all attempts to go out in the craft were abandoned. But Five Clear Days Recorded by Ob server Patrick During October.

The monthly meteorological summar

sued by Weather Observer H. P., Patick shows that during October there ere only five clear days. Eleven day ere cloudy and fifteen partly cloudy. The highest temperature recorded for he month was 81 degrees, on the 21st and the lowest was 29, on the 17th. The reatest daily range of temperature was hirty-seven degrees, on the 18th, and he least was four degrees, on the 8th The mean temperature for the month as 49, compared with an average of 46.5 for the past thirty-one years ince 1871 there have only been six Octohers during which the mean temper ture has been higher than the month

ust passed This year, October was slightly under he average as concerns precipitation 3.12 inches of rain coming down, corared with a thirty-year average of 3.22 There were fifteen days on which there was .01 of an inch or more of precipita

In the month just passed, the prevailng direction of the wind was from the northwest, and all told 9,338 miles of vind passed over the city. The maxinum velocity was forty-two miles ar hour, from the southwest, on the 30th. The mean atmospheric pressure is re-ported as having been 30.02. The highest pressure was 30.41, on the 28th, and the lowest was 29.58, on the 13th.

A light frost was experienced on the 3d, a heavy frost on the 6th and frost that killed on the 4th. No thunderstorms were officially re orded during the month.
