After enumerating the conditions which militate against activity in speculation at this time—among which are the unsettled railroad problems and the uncertainty regarding them—the depression in Germany and lack of vigor in trade in England, together with the foreign demand for gold—Henry Clews of Wall street gives this enumeration of influences counting in favor of strength which are working to produce a bull market:

The principal lines of trade are enjoying a most successful season. The development of the cotton and wool trade is particularly bright. This is true of the entire country except in the drought district, where corn and cotton were badly injured.

Congress opens in about a month, and the prospects are that we shall have little disturbing legislation. The nation is busy and contented and the party in power will be disposed to let well enough alone.

The future of the market seems somewhat confused. It is bright in spots and clouded in others, and seems likely to continue irregular, with no pronounced changes in either direction.

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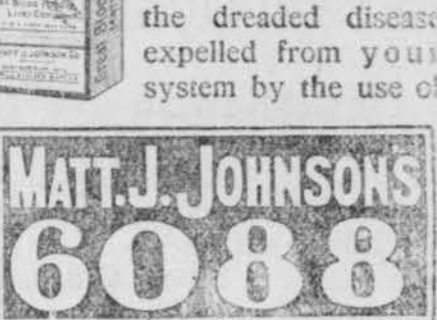
