GALE DOES NOT ABATE.
Reports of Wrecks and Casualties Come in from Britain.
London, Nov. 13.—The gale which has been sweeping over Great Britain and Ireland for the past two days continues unabated. Reports of wrecks and casualties continue to flow in. The death list will aggregate over a hundred. Early today a French bark struck off Hendon and nineteen of the crew were drowned. The revenue cutter Active was wrecked in the Firth of Forth. Twenty-two of the crew were drowned and three saved.

FOR CONTROL OF N. P.
TWO IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENTS ARE AGREED TO.
CONFIRM BELIEF OF SETTLEMENT
LIGHT THROWN ON RAILROAD SITUATION IN NORTHWEST.
Final Ratification of Agreement to Bring into Existence Example of the "Community of Interest" Idea as Applied to Railroads.
New York, Nov. 13.—Two important developments in the railroad situation in the Northwest, both tending to confirm the existing belief in a final basis of settlement in the contest for the control of the Northern Pacific, have been definitely agreed to, and the final ratification of the agreement will bring into existence the greatest and most effective example of the "community of interest" idea as applied to the railroads of the country.

Safest Route Known.
One of the missionaries acquainted with the region, states that the route Miss Stone took was the safest of any in that region. The statement further affirms that there is no ground whatever for criticizing Miss Stone for a want of precaution in making the journey.

FREIGHT CARS SCARCE.
Not Since 1886 Has Shortage Been So Great as at Present.
Chicago, Nov. 13.—The Record-Herald tomorrow will say:
Between 15,000 and 20,000 freight cars are needed for immediate use by railroads centering at Chicago. Not since 1886 has the freight car shortage been so great as at present. Not a day passes that railroads do not refuse large amounts of tonnage because of the inability to obtain cars. Orders have been issued by every line prohibiting cars going off their own lines, and every effort is being made to have cars unloaded at their destinations with the least possible delay.

Big Order Is Placed.
Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—The Pennsylvania Railroad company, it is said, today authorized the construction of 4,000 additional freight cars. A total of 10,000 cars is to be delivered to the company during the next year. Owing to the great demand for freight cars the Pennsylvania company will enlarge the car building plant of the Cambria Steel company, which it controls. By Jan. 1 the car plant at Johnstown will be able to turn out twenty cars a day.

DISASTROUS CAVE-IN.
Plant of Aurora Mining Co., Joplin, Mo., Swallowed Up.
Joplin, Mo., Nov. 13.—In a cave-in at Orogono, near here today, the entire plant of the Aurora Mining company, one of the greatest producers of the district, was swallowed up. No lives were lost. The plant comprised a 100-ton mill, office building and engine house, all of which were engulfed, together with six gravel cars and an immense tailing pile. On entering the ground a short time before the cave-in occurred workers heard the timbers cracking and signalled to be drawn up. The last man had reached the surface only a few minutes when the timbers collapsed, the earth yielded and with a crash the whole plant sank into the abyss.

INSURGENTS ARE SURPRISED.
Capt. Hartman's Cavalry Attacks Filipinos and Kills Sixteen.
Manila, Nov. 13.—Captain Hartman's troop, first cavalry, early this morning surprised 400 insurgents at Baan, Batangas province, in southwestern Luzon. Half of the insurgents were armed with rifles. They were prepared for an attack and were in rifle pits. The cavalry attacked the insurgents on the flank, killing sixteen, wounding five and capturing nine rifles. The insurgents broke and ran, the cavalry pursuing.

MOVEMENT IN NEW FOUNDLAND FOR RECIPROcity WITH UNITED STATES.
St. John's, N. F., Nov. 13.—Keen interest is displayed here in the movement for reciprocity with the United States. It is expected any arrangement effected with Canada will include New Foundland, especially owing to the previous compact of the Bond-Blaine convention which covers the fishery reciprocity. The British government desires to have all aspects of the question considered jointly.

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SHROUDED IN MYSTERY.
Efforts to Find Clew to Murderer of Indiana Woman Unavailing.
Evansville, Ind., Nov. 12.—All efforts to find a clew to the murderer of the two women whose dead bodies were found yesterday have proved unavailing. Several suspects are under surveillance but developments have not been sufficient to warrant the police to make arrests. While it is evident that both victims were killed about the same hour Tuesday night, it is still believed the women were slain by the same person.

CHILD BORN TO QUEEN.
Berlin, Nov. 13.—The Vossische Zeitung says it learns that Queen Wilhelmina was prematurely delivered of a child Nov. 10. The queen's condition is satisfactory.

MAY BE DEAD.
Feared That Miss Stone Has Been Murdered by Brigands.
Berlin, Nov. 13.—The Cologne Gazette today contains a dispatch from Sofia saying that it is feared Miss Stone has been murdered, owing to a delay in the payment of ransom.

LABOR IS INSULTED
KENTUCKY STATE FEDERATION INCENSED OVER SPEECH.
DELIVERED BY COL. BRECKINRIDGE
MAY RESULT IN DISRUPTION OF ORGANIZATION.
Delegates Take Exception to Statement That Day of Strikes Is Over and Battles Should Be Fought With Reason, Not Force.
Lexington, Ky., Nov. 13.—There was much excitement in the state federation labor convention over the address of welcome last night by Colonel W. C. P. Breckinridge, who stated that he favored a combination of labor and also a combination of capital, but did not believe that a national federation of labor would be possible because of complicating interests. He said he was a friend to labor organizations and heartily favored them, but thought their battles should be fought with reason, not force; that the day of strikes was over, citing and criticizing the steel strike.

WIFE IDENTIFIED REMAINS.
Little Rock, Nov. 13.—At the coroner's inquiry to establish the identity of the body brought here from Jeffersonville and supposed to be that of Rathbun, Charles M. Cowen, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Rathbun testified to bringing the remains here and that Mrs. Rathbun had identified them as her husband, as he had previously, and that the first intimation of deception was when a neighbor woman said the body was not Rathbun's. Several other witnesses declared positively it was not Rathbun's body. The inquiry was not concluded today.

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Omaha, Nov. 13.—An Oelwein special says a serious riot occurred there late last night between the Great Western shop employes and the non-union men who took their places during the strike. The non-union men were preparing to leave the city when a mob of shopmen gathered and began clubbing and beating them. Several were seriously injured and two were beaten into unconsciousness. The police were powerless and there were no deputies at hand. So great became the damage to the non-union men that the company was compelled to stop its trains at the shops that he men might board there.

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Proposed to Build Road from Dawson to the Klondike.
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"The proposed railway from Dawson to the Klondike mines will be built next summer. The line will probably extend up Bonanza creek, with branches up several gold producing creeks, the main line continuing from the Bonanza up the Eldorado and across the divide to Indian river. The object of the promoters will be to extend the line at an early day as far as Stewart river and ultimately to the mouth of the Pelly, opposite Fort Elk creek. It will in all probability form a part of the all-Canadian route to Dawson."

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FEAR OF SMALL-POX.
Senator O'Neil Closes Logging Camps on Bad River Reservation.
Ashland, Wis., Nov. 13.—At the instigation of government officials Senator O'Neil of Washburn today closed all logging camps on the Bad River reservation, throwing out of employment nearly 1,000 men. It is presumed the fear of a small-pox outbreak is the cause for closing the camps.

FORTUNE FOR PARISH.
Priest Dies Possessed of Nearly \$100,000 in Real Estate.
Toledo, Nov. 13.—Reverend Father Wiecek, of St. Hedegmick's Polish Catholic church in this city, whose funeral occurred this morning, bequeathed to his parish his entire fortune, amounting to nearly \$100,000, composed largely of Toledo real estate. The deceased came from a noble family of Poland.

Many influential Republicans have sought to dissuade the governor from taking the step, it is said, on the ground that it would be hurtful to the party, but he is alleged to have set his heart on getting the legislature together in extra session for the purposes mentioned.

Says the Lansing Journal of the position taken by Auditor General Powers on the bill passed by the last legislature increasing the compensation of the members of the state board of auditors: Auditor General Powers talks plainly when he says that the new law increases the salaries of members of the board of state auditors was intended by the legislature to thwart the will of the people, which within the past fifteen years has been three times recorded against the proposition to increase the salaries named in the constitution for these officers.

The governor of Indiana is of the opinion that Kentucky courts cannot be trusted to give ex-Governor Taylor of that state, under indictment for complicity in the plot for the murder of Goebel, fair play, and refuses to honor requisition papers for the fugitive. The governor of one state has no right to assume that the courts of another are so subject to corrupting influences that they cannot be depended on to do justice, and the position taken by the Indiana executive is not logically tenable.

The jury in the Salisbury bribery trial at Grand Rapids attended the service at a Methodist church in that city Sunday evening and listened to a sermon that was manifestly intended to influence the verdict it will render in that case. The preacher did not mention the case, to be sure, but he preached at it so unmistakably that his purpose could not be misunderstood.

Minnesota's state railroad commission has ordered the railroads which serve the Vermilion and Mesabi iron ranges in that state to file with it, in compliance with the state law governing in the matter, their transportation schedules on iron ore. The ruling by the commission has the support of a majority of its members, only one dissenting opinion having been filed. It was made on the application of the independent mining companies operating on those ranges.

The trial was continued for the present term of court, although the date is not yet determined.

It will strike out from Mitchell and will then traverse the Harris field, and will then traverse a portion of the land for many years past under control of Collins and Lobb.
