(Additional Copper County on Page 2.) WILL CLOSE UP STREET. Quincy Mining Company Proposes to Claim West Hancock Land.

The Quincy Mining company and the individuals who have houses constructed on lots facing the south end of Elevation street in the Osceola addition, West Hancock, will soon be involved over an interesting point of law should the mining company decide to follow out a certain course it is said to have planned in reference to the portion of the street in question.

Many years ago, probably forty, the Quincy people laid out the ground for the cemetery in West Hancock people the territory east of it into lots, the latter now being known as the Osceola addition. A stretch of land 540 feet long, a continuation south of Elevation street, and sixty-four feet wide, the width of the usual street, between the cemetery and the lots, was left apparently for a roadway but it was never proclaimed as such.

The Mining Journal was informed yesterday that should the mining company follow out its plan the people directly effected by it will make an effort to get out injunctions against the company restraining it from closing the street and plating it into lots.

It will be a pretty legal question to settle and the main thing to be decided will be whether the street is really a street.

**FATHER OF MRS. G. M. WILLIAMS.**  
 William S. Biddle the Head of One of Detroit's Oldest Families.  
 In the home which he erected on Grosse Ile more than forty years ago William S. Biddle, Sr., head of one of Detroit's old families passed away suddenly last Thursday evening.  
 Mr. Biddle had been in ill health for about two years. After a trip abroad two years ago he was stricken with paralysis, from which he never recovered. Last winter he was critically ill at the Hotel Ste. Claire for several weeks, but his rugged constitution pulled him through. Since then, however, he had not regained his strength. During the last few days he had been stronger than in some time and his oldest daughter, Miss Susan Biddle, had gone to visit her sister, the wife of Bishop G. Mott Williams of Marquette.  
 Thursday afternoon Mr. Biddle went for a carriage ride around the island and was in excellent spirits. He played dominoes with Mrs. Sterling for several hours. About 6 o'clock his attendant walked with him to another room of the Biddle residence and he seemed in excellent spirits. The attendant stepped into another room and on his return a minute or two later found Mr. Biddle dead, his hands having come to him as he sat peacefully on a lounge. His daughters, Mrs. Benjamin Douglass and Mrs. A. E. Copeland, were at the residence at the time.  
 William S. Biddle was a true type of the American country gentleman. A member of the old Biddle family of Philadelphia, one of the most distinguished in the country, possessed of means sufficient to allow him to gratify his desires, he chose to live his life in the country and for more than forty years he had lived most of the time on the handsome Biddle estate on the island.  
 He was a son of Major John Biddle and Eliza F. Biddle. Born in Detroit in 1830, and educated there, and in the famous old Hunter school, on Grosse Ile, his schoolmates were men who in after life became famous in various walks of life. Every ten years these men have held reunions on Grosse Ile. His education was completed at Harvard, and he then practiced law for a short time in New York city, but came to Detroit in the early fifties. **MILLER STILL MISSING.**

Britz scored the best record and young Miller came in third. Before the contest ended Miller told the other participants in the shooting match that he was going home. Before leaving he went to the coop and took away the largest turkey in the lot. According to the arrangement Britz was entitled to the first choice of the birds. The next time they met Britz rated Miller sharply for having played such a dishonorable trick.

Although Miller is less than sixteen years of age he is a man in appearance. He tips the scale at 160 pounds.

**SUCCESSFUL NEWSPAPER MAN.**

Well Known Ishpeming Man Attracts Attention in His Chosen Profession.

The Commercial News of South Dakota in its last issue printed a fine half-tone cut of John A. Ryan, who spent his boyhood in this city, and who also did some newspaper work here, as a member of the Daily Press staff. With the picture was the following mention of Mr. Ryan's career:

"Now for a newspaper man—a traveling newspaper man. No one, not even Mr. John A. Ryan's competitors, would expect The News to dream of apologizing for presenting to its readers the very excellent cut representing a correct type of American manhood and a representative traveling man. To those who have not had the pleasure of Mr. Ryan's acquaintance this city and its people will serve as an introduction. In 1882 he began his first active newspaper work as a reporter on the Duluth Evening Herald, later went to the Milwaukee Journal as sporting editor, and has continued, interruptedly by the metropolitan press in one capacity or another since that time. During the past ten years Mr. Ryan has been connected with the newspapers of the Twin Cities, as traveling solicitor, the greater portion of this time in the interests of the Minneapolis Journal, which paper he now represents in South Dakota. His ability as a solicitor has earned for him a reputation sought after by many but acquired in the Northwest. As a writer he possesses a most entertaining style and during his former trips through the mountains wrote many letters to his paper that attracted considerable attention. Since coming to South Dakota Mr. Ryan's headquarters have been in Sioux Falls, where he has made many friends, both for himself and the excellent newspaper which he represents. During the past two years he has succeeded in placing the Journal in such a position within his territory that today the circulation of that paper exceeds the combined circulation of all other Twin City dailies.

"Honest endeavor, hard work, and a genial disposition have proven strong factors in his behalf. Mr. Ryan is an enthusiastic member of the U. C. T. and other fraternal organizations, including the Press club of Minneapolis."

DULL AND FIRM.

But Little Change in Stock Speculation at Boston Yesterday.

Little was going on in the Boston stock market yesterday, the dullness still being much in evidence. As usual, however, the prices as a rule held firm, and in some cases where shorts did a little covering, advances were scored. The market lived up a bit in the afternoon, in sympathy with Wall street and on better reports concerning the money situation, and the close was fairly strong.

What the Brokers Said.

Paine, Webber & Co. said: "The decline in Amalgamated brought so few selling orders into the other coppers that the shorts have made some efforts to cover this afternoon. There are almost no offerings of the good medium-priced coppers, and it would not take much buying to make considerably higher quotations. We think the coppers are acting well, everything considered, and we shall not be surprised to see them take a good upward turn almost any time now." Hayden, Stone & Co. wired the Laidley Commission company: "It is a very dull market. Amalgamated is off fractionally. Wolverine declined 1/4 points on small transactions and Isle Royale went up on scattering buying. Montreal & Boston copper stock was listed today, but there have been no transactions as yet; it is quoted at 2 1/2 to 4. Erie Phone had a sharp rise from 22 to 25, and there were quite large transactions. This stock ought to be cheap, but buyers are holding off, awaiting announcement of the plan of reorganization. The Shawmut bank, the largest institution probably controlled by the J. P. Morgan interests, has bought control of the Bank of Commonwealth at \$225." At London, copper again ruled firm, up 5 shillings, at £66, 17s, 6d for spot and £65, 12s, 6d for futures. Sales were 300 tons of spot and 450 of futures.
