 The above officers were elected at the annual meeting of the department held Saturday evening. There was no opposition to any of the officers and all were elected by unanimous vote. No other business of special importance came up for consideration. At the
 In the annual report of the secretary, issued a year ago this month, the value of the property in use by the department was placed at \$19,897.85. During the past year some new equipment was added and the total valuation of the property has more than reached the \$20,000 mark. The apparatus is kept in the best of repair and the firemen never have any reason to complain on that account.
 A large majority of the active members of the department are young men who are always prompt to get out when an alarm is sounded. During the past ten years, since the time of the department's reorganization, interest in the department has never lagged. The time has yet to come when officers who will not attend strictly to the duties devolving on them will be placed at the head of the organization.
 Every chief of the department has had since the time John P. Outhwaite was at its head has retired with a good record. John Lacey, the present chief, is considered one of the best hustlers the department has ever had. He is not only an efficient officer but he is also one of the best workers in the organization at a fire. He is fearless and is usually the first to enter the more dangerous places in a burning building. It has been often said by the chief's associates in the department that he knows no fear. He is usually the first man out, no matter what time the alarm comes in or what kind of weather it may be.
 During the past year Chief Lacey has done a great deal for the department. At the tournament last August Lacey was one of the most popular men present. He was up and doing all the while and no chief in attendance did more to make his men comfortable and happy.

A Successful Organization.
 It is needless for The Mining Journal to state there is no stronger or more favorably known volunteer fire department in Michigan than the local one. A system of water mains was laid through the principal streets two years later, supplied from Lake Angelina, and the accoutrements of the company consisted of a small portable steam engine and pump, one horse truck and about 500 feet of hose. The First Apparatus.
 The "Fire King," the cut of which is here shown, will doubtless look familiar to many of the older residents of the city. It was one of the first pieces of apparatus in the way of a fire extinguisher brought to Ishpeeming. It was purchased by the Lake Superior Iron company thirty-two years ago and was loaned to the city fire department on all occasions of need. It is a chemical built by the Chicago Chemical Fire Engine company, and like its companion, the portable steam engine and pump mentioned previously, has seen its days of usefulness go by.
 The use of the "Fire King" was abandoned many years ago and since that time the municipal authorities have been most liberal in supplying the de-

ANOTHER "DRY" BURNED.
 That at the Cleveland-Cliffs Mine Destroyed Sunday Morning.
 Yesterday morning, between the hours of two and three o'clock, the large dry house at the Cleveland-Cliffs mine was completely destroyed by fire with all its contents, entailing a loss of about \$3,000, which is, however, fully covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown, the last of the mine employees having left the building a little after 6 o'clock Saturday evening.
 The fire was first noticed by Police Officer Pat Collins, who was standing at the corner of Pearl and Main streets. He ran to the scene of the fire and turned in the alarm from the box near the company's office.
 In a short time the whole city was illumined by the flames, which were already rapidly consuming the "dry."
 Chief Lacey was the first one on the scene and he was soon followed by John Mennie.
 John Lehman, who holds a position at the mine under Master Mechanic McKee, got the pumps at the company's engine house started while Lacey and Mennie got out the hose. They soon had a stream turned on the burning building.
 The fire department quickly responded to the alarm, and in a few minutes the firemen were on the ground and had two streams of water turned on, but the flames had too good a start and the efforts of the fire boys were in vain.
 The dry house was a large one-story structure and was used as changing quarters for the miners. All their clothing was in the building at the time and was all destroyed.
 Temporarily, the company's large boiler house will be used for changing quarters and in the meantime the erection of another dry house will be begun. It will be completed as soon as possible.
 The prompt response of the firemen—they were at the fire within a few minutes after the first alarm was sounded—speaks highly for the efficiency of the department and shows that the boys can be depended on in any emergency.
