THREATENS TO WAGE WAR IF ATTEMPT IS MADE TO APPROACH CARACAS.

President Castro Says He Would Impeach the Boer and Would Exterminate the Troops of the German Army.

Favorable Action Recommended. Senator Lodge today presented to the senate in executive session the report of the committee on foreign relations, recommending favorable action upon the Hay-Pauncefote Isthmian canal treaty, and gave notice that tomorrow he would ask the senate to go into executive session for the considering of the treaty, repeating the request each day until the senate should act upon it.

Several Bills Introduced. Other bills introduced were: Senator Hoar—Thornton's bill defining conspiracy of trade; Senator Gamble—To establish mining experiment stations in the aid of development of the mineral resources of the United States; Senator Warren—Granting 160 acres of land each for the use of plants of industrial institutions located on the public domain; Senator Penrose—Authorizing the use of \$100,000 of the unclaimed funds of the Freedmen's bureau for the establishment of a home for aged and infirm colored people; Senator Money—Appropriating \$15,000 annually for the support of an institution for the industrial education of women; Senator Perkins—To prohibit Chinese immigration; Senator Teller—Authorizing the construction of a railroad across the territory of Alaska, by a trans-Alaskan railroad company, and granting each alternate section of public land along the line of the proposed road; Senator Mason—Providing for a code of land laws for the territory of Hawaii, classifying the salaries of postoffice clerks, and fixing an eight-hour day for postoffice employees.

TO OPEN RESERVATION. Spokane, Wash., Dec. 9.—Agitation has been started in northern Idaho in favor of opening the Coeur d'Alene Indian reservation to white settlers. The reservation, which partly surrounds Lake Coeur d'Alene, contains more than a half million acres, including much fertile land and valuable forests of white and yellow pine. It is also said to contain rich mineral deposits, but the value cannot be determined while the land is held as a reserve.

COPPER COUNTRY NEWS (Additional.) WILL USE ARCADIAN. Trumountain to Commence Stamping: Rock Within a Few Days.

The Trumountain will in a few days commence stamping rock with one or two lots in the Arcadian mill. The amount of rock now on hand and that being hoisted at the mine will be sufficient to keep the heads going in good shape and good results are expected.

A New York despatch says that it has been learned definitely "from most reliable sources" that the Amalgamated Copper company at last has made some concession to consumers in its price of copper.

Representatives of the Montana Ore Purchasing company denied that they had sold any copper for less than 16 1/2 cents. Asked if copper had been sold for the Amalgamated at a lower price, the speaker replied: "I don't know."

Osceola's Future. The Laidley Commission Co. is in receipt of the appended letter regarding the Osceola from Hayden & Stone: "In the Osceola's old mill there are three heads, which will stamp in capacity of 250 to 300 tons every twenty-four hours; in the mill completed about two years ago there are three heads, each having a capacity of 500 to 550 tons, and in the new mill, which is on the verge of completion, there will be four heads, three of which will stamp in capacity of 500 tons, and the fourth will be a lam, or 1901, and the fourth will be completed and ready for use as necessary requires.

established no doubt work on four or five shafts will be commenced, sufficient to make the property a large producer. There are several mining men in the Lake Superior district who firmly believe that valuable lodes, other than the Kearsarge and Osceola, exist east of the Calumet conglomerate, and developments at the Mayflower and Old Colony will be of special interest to them.

Copper Gossip. Directors of the Amalgamated Copper company are expected to meet Friday, Dec. 13, to take action on the dividend. A new steel drum is being installed at No. 6 hoist of the Quincy. It will replace the old cast iron drum which has been in service for the last eight years.

Exploratory work at the Belt is progressing satisfactorily. Good copper ground is being encountered and mass copper and excellent stamp rock is being accumulated on the surface. Mining men say that the ground already opened up is sufficient to warrant the beginning of regular and extensive development work.

A large force of men are repairing the damage to the timber in the Red Jacket shaft of the Calumet & Hecla mine caused by the recent accidental falling of two of the big cages. Another cable is being placed in the center compartment. The large water ballers will be removed and cages installed in their stead so that no very long delay in the hoisting of rock will result.

The work of installing the new combination punch and cut in the blacksmith shop at the Quincy is under way. The tool is a ponderous piece of machinery weighing ten tons. It stands ten feet high and is twenty feet in length. One end of the apparatus is capable of cutting heavy iron plates, while at the opposite end holes can be punched for rivets or bolts in the iron or steel.

**A GREAT RECEPTION**

IT WAS TENDERED MICHIGAN'S FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS.  
**BLUE PREDOMINATED EVERYWHERE**  
THOUSANDS GREET THE FOOTBALLISTS ON ARRIVAL HOME.

Members of the Team Told How the Battle Was Won at the High School Auditorium.

In years past Ishpeeming has tendered receptions to her sons because of their achievements in one way or another, but no demonstration previously given in any way compares with that accorded the Ishpeeming high school football team on its arrival home yesterday afternoon. Last year when the school eleven returned from the lower peninsula covered with glory there were hundreds out to greet them, but yesterday the throng numbered several thousand. Such a crowd of enthusiasts can better be imagined than described.

Early in the afternoon a number of the business people of the city began to decorate their store fronts with blue bunting—the school color. When the train arrived at 4 o'clock blue was to be seen everywhere. Men, women and children came out displaying the colors and horses and cutters were similarly decorated.

For some minutes before the hour of the train's arrival it was next to impossible to get within a block of the depot, as the street was a perfect mass of humanity.

The City band was out and the procession of cutters that followed behind the team was over three blocks in length. A chariot was provided for the players and they were carried to it on the shoulders of friends. A gayly decorated cutter was turned over to Superintendent Mayne and Mrs. Sober, the principal, who accompanied the team. The procession was led by them and was followed by the band. Then came the team, and the teachers and high school girls in cutters, which were donated for the occasion by the liveries of the city, followed. Mayor Johnston and family, as well as several other citizens, were also in the procession. J. L. Bradford made quite a hit and received many cheers as the procession moved. He was driving a nobby team and on the sleigh was a large blue football. On a sign beneath the ball was printed "Too big for Kalamazoo."

The schools of the city were dismissed about three o'clock and nearly every child attending them was on hand. Some had horns and those who were not so provided yelled with all their might. A large number of post-graduates and high school boys were in line, giving the school yells from the time the procession started until it reached the high school.

All the mine whistles and most of the bells of the city were sounded, so that for over half an hour the racket was almost deafening.

Jam at the School.

Those who congregated at the school thinking they would get in and procure a desirable seat before the big crowd arrived got left. The janitor kept the doors closed until the head of the procession had reached the building. When the doors were thrown open there was a perfect jam for nearly half an hour and so large was the crowd that hundreds were unable to get in. As the members of the team came upstairs they were raised upon the shoulders of their companions at the school and carried to the platform. Superintendent Mayne was also carried in on the shoulders of the boys. Little Joe, the mascot, was handled in a similar manner, carrying his little blue flag, with the words "I am Joe" printed on it in large, white letters. No one in the assemblage received greater attention than the little fellow who is a great favorite with pupils as well as teachers.

Mr. Mayne opened the meeting after the City band had played a selection. After a few remarks he introduced Captain Peterson, who outlined the game as it was played. His account of the battle was very similar to that which appeared in yesterday's Mining Journal. He said that a couple of times during the game it looked as though Kalamazoo might win, but the Ishpeeming players were determined to fight hard until the end.

Bill—I don't know much to say about the game, as Captain Peterson has told you about it. Kalamazoo's weight counted against us, but whenever we got the ball we made gains. The Kalamazoo team sent their pictures to the Detroit papers, saying that Ishpeeming would not be a good mouthful for them. He said he had entertained many football teams, but he had never had a foot-

gentlemanly lot of boys in his house than those of the Ishpeeming team. I have traveled with many teams but I have never been with boys that compare with these."

The band struck up a few bars of "A Hot Time," after which Mayor Johnston was called upon. He made just a few remarks, assuring all that the people of the city were with the team and all were delighted over the great victory.

From the school the members of the team repaired to the home of Superintendent Mayne, where Mrs. Mayne entertained them with dinner.
