The Detroit Journal has this to say in comment on the findings of the court of inquiry in the Schley case: It is not too much to say that if the court had been composed of twenty members and that nineteen had been against Schley, nevertheless the weight of Dewey's opinion would have been held to out-balance that of the nineteen. There is comfort for both sides in the controversy, therefore, in the divided report. Those who hold with the majority can console themselves with its nice balancing of pro and con; those who think with Dewey can feel that with him on their side it matters not who is against the popular hero of Santiago.

For the sake of having an end to the controversy, it is to be regretted that the court did not come to an unanimous opinion, one way or the other. The fact of a division of the court simply throws the dispute into congress, where indeed a resolution has already been introduced inquiring into the report of encouragement of Maclay, by the department and Admiral Sampson. It is evident that the controversy has only begun.

RESTRICTION OF IMMIGRATION. The league for the restriction of immigration is again endeavoring to procure legislation by congress which will shut out undesirable immigrants by employment of the educational test. The principle is the same as that of the Lodge bill of 1896-7. This bill passed the lower house of congress three times and the senate twice, but was vetoed by President Cleveland, chiefly on account of an amendment to the bill dealing with Canadians, which had been added against the wishes of those in charge of the measure.

NO SIGNS OF WEAKNESS. The current number of the Iron Trade Review says of the iron market: Search for weak spots in the market is not well rewarded. Producers are constantly surprised at the sustained momentum under which the trade is passing through December, when ordinarily signs of slackening multiply. In some quarters, particularly in certain forms of finished steel, the past week has been well up to the best of the year. In pig iron, while as much cannot be said, there is continued contracting and the higher prices of the past few weeks are being generally paid on deliveries running to the middle of 1902. There has been an impression abroad in the trade for months that with the very considerable additions to the country's blast furnace capacity under way in the past year, the tendency of the pig iron market would be down, rather than up. But these new furnaces have been almost wholly an addition to the capacity for steel making pig. And not only have furnaces heretofore producing Bessemer iron not been turned into the foundry iron trade, as was predicted in some quarters, but instances are known in which in the near future the movement will be in the other direction. The production of foundry iron has not been equal to the demand and there is no immediate indication that the equilibrium will be restored, putting aside any probability of the excess being thrown onto the other side. The consumption of finished steel has taxed the converting and melting capacity of the country to its utmost, and among the plans of the United States Steel corporation that will have early attention is that of providing additional open-hearth steel. At least one addition is to be made also to its blast furnace outfit. Making all allowances for new plant—and there is a relatively small amount of converting or open-hearth capacity likely to be added in 1902 from so-called independent sources—the problem of an outlet for their steel is not likely to trouble our manufacturers in 1902 at least. Existing finishing plants and those building, which buy steel in the open market, may have to depend upon imports to a greater extent in the early months of the new year than is now commonly believed.

At the Victoria Mine. At the Victoria Superintendent Hooper is carrying on development work in a manner that cannot help from resulting in the property being opened in the best possible shape. He is not trying to see how quick the mine can be developed but wisely believes that it is better to continue the work in a steady and persistent manner, making each day show an increase over the preceding day's work. All operations are carefully planned and executed in a systematic way. In this manner the mine

is steadily being opened on a very economical basis. The shaft is now sinking for the fourth level, the greatest depth attained by any mine in the county. Drifting is being vigorously pushed in the fourth, sixth, eighth, tenth and twelfth levels. The stations have all been cut in the intermediate, or odd numbered levels, and the drifts started. The openings throughout are looking very favorable; there is stamp rock in all of them and considerable barrel work and small masses are being taken out of some of them. In the tenth level west, an exceptionally rich piece of ground was found.

Water shipments of ore from the Lake Superior region passed Dec. 1 the 200,000,000 ton mark that has long been a prediction for this year. The November shipments were 1,865,333 gross tons, making the total to Dec. 1, 20,000,926 tons, as against 18,570,310 tons by water in the entire season of 1900. The figures above do not include the 2,000,000 tons from the Michipicoten range, of which about 100,000 tons came to Lake Erie ports. It is easy to see that 20,500,000 tons will be considerably exceeded when the all-rail shipments are added, since it is estimated the water shipments for December will be close to 250,000 tons. Water shipments from the Michipicoten range are foreign ore, they are a part of the reckoning, particularly the portion that enters into the mixtures of Central Western furnaces.

COPPER COUNTRY NEWS (Additional). THOUSANDS OF VICTIMS. Many Who Bought on Margins Have Lost All They Put In. The closing months of the century have witnessed one of the greatest gambles in the annals of stock market speculation. The enormous shrinkage caused by the manipulation of pools and syndicates is not confined to that class of men who make a living out of the market, nor to those who are able to buy stocks outright and hold them through good and evil report. Unhappily, there are thousands of victims who bought on "margins" and lost all they put in, while the blow dealt by powerful operators have undermined the whole market and caused a slump in railroad, industrial and mining stocks which almost passes comprehension.

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DAMAGE IS GREAT

RESULTS OF RECENT STORM ARE APPALLING.

RAILROADS IN EAST WASHED OUT

THOUSANDS OUT OF EMPLOYMENT OWING TO FLOODS.

Families Are Homeless and Many Lives Are Lost—Western States Swept by Blizzards—Storm General Over Europe.

London, Dec. 16.—The fall of snow in Scotland is heavier than at any time in fifty years.

The storm appears to be pretty general all over Europe.

A number of wrecks are reported from the Mediterranean.

Portland, Dec. 16.—The state of Maine is suffering tonight from one of the worst storms in its history.

Omaha, Dec. 16.—Another severe storm struck Nebraska this evening and in some parts of the state is the worst experienced since the blizzard of 1888.

Towanda, Pa., Dec. 16.—The complete story of the damage wrought in Bradford county by the unprecedented flood Saturday night and Sunday is coming in slowly.

Cheyenne, Dec. 16.—Reports from the ranges in southern Wyoming tell of the demoralization of the sheep business.

Shamokin, Pa., Dec. 16.—Fourteen thousand men and boys have been rendered idle because of yesterday's flood in this district.

Harrisburg, Dec. 16.—Many industrial establishments south of Harrisburg were forced to close down on account of the freshet.

Lyons, N. Y., Dec. 16.—William H. Walker, whose residence is unknown, but who was once employed as a painter on the Pan-American buildings at Buffalo, was found frozen to death today near here.

Guthrie, O. T., Dec. 16.—A Santa Fe northbound passenger train, during a blizzard tonight, ran into a bander, killing Thomas Kless and fatally injuring Section Foreman Adolph Farrer.

Scranton, Pa., Dec. 16.—Communication with the outside world was being gradually opened up this afternoon and trains started for Philadelphia and New York.

Columbia, Pa., Dec. 16.—The Susquehanna river is falling. Much damage has been done and many men are out of employment on account of the high water.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 16.—A storm of unusual severity is sweeping over southeastern Nebraska tonight and bids fair to become a blizzard before morning.

Trenton, N. J., Dec. 16.—There will be more than \$100,000 damage at Scudder's Falls and South Trenton by the sudden rising of the Delaware river.

Belvidere, N. J., Dec. 16.—The Delaware has reached the highest point in forty years, flowing a rise since Sunday of twenty-one feet.

Ithaca, N. Y., Dec. 16.—The estimated damage tonight of the flood may reach \$400,000.

Buena Vista, Colo., Dec. 16.—Since the first snow last Wednesday the Upper Arkansas valley experienced the coldest weather known here.

May Pass the Dividend. Hayden, Stone & Co. wired the Laidley Commission company: "The feeling is generally increasing that Amalgamated will pass its dividend, and prices of 50 to 55 are predicted for it.

New York Stocks Weak. Walker Bros. said of the Wall street stocks: "The market today opened rather weak and with a good deal of stock for sale.

At London yesterday copper opened with spot at 53 1/2, 25, 6d and futures at 53 1/2, 25, 6d. It closed weak off 128, 6d on spot and off 10s on futures.

HERE IS A GO!

IshpeMING Can Have a State Militia Company if it Wishes.

A recent issue of The Evening Gazette published at Iron Mountain contained the following mention of military affairs in that city, the paper stating among other things, that IshpeMING can have Company L, if she wants it: "Iron Mountain is to lose its militia company. On Nov. 11, the Gazette stated that unless the members showed more interest, Company L would be mustered out of the service, and that is just what is going to happen out. The department has issued a notice calling for an election of officers, but no election will take place, as far as Company L is concerned, and its members are now waiting to be mustered out. This is due to the fact that the members show no interest whatever in the organization. A company of state troops has been maintained here for the past six years, and the city was proud of its militia. During the past year or so the members have taken very little interest in it, and since the last encampment they have shown none whatever. It is said here today that Captain Stangis, who is now at Republic, has resigned. "Company L will no doubt, be given IshpeMING. There has been an independent company there for some years, which has been waiting to get into the national guards, and now that the company here is to be mustered out, the IshpeMING company stands a good chance of getting in."

There are two private military companies in IshpeMING but so far as The Mining Journal can learn the boys here have no desire to become affiliated with the national guard. IshpeMING Light Guard numbers nearly fifty men, and there are about thirty enrolled in the Lake Superior guards. The proposition to make an effort to have a company of the state militia established here has been discussed many times by the members of the IshpeMING Light Guard, but a majority of the boys do not favor it. Captain Bert Steed, who has had a touch of real soldier life, would like to have a branch of the state troops here. He was one of the volunteers from this county who took part in the fighting in Cuba. There are two other companies of boys who also enlisted, these being Charley Young and Gust Shults. The latter did not get as far as the fighting lines, but Young had a chance to smell gunpowder in Cuba. Both of these would be among the first to sign the roll in case a state company should be organized. There are several other members of the company who would join, though they are not going to make an effort to have Company L transferred from Iron Mountain to IshpeMING.

The members of the private companies who oppose joining the state militia do not do so for fear of being ordered to go to the front. They understand that in case of labor troubles arising in this section the local companies will be the first to be called upon. They object to this work, as most of them are working men and they would dislike to go on duty in the event of the Government's working classes and their employers. They remember what a predicament the soldiers of the upper peninsula were in here six years ago, when the strike was on. The local men would not care to have an experience similar to that.

LAND DEAL PUZZLES

OVER A HUNDRED THOUSAND ACRES IN ALGER COUNTY CHANGE HANDS.

Berry Bros. of Detroit have purchased from the Lac La Belle company, over 100,000 acres of hardwood timber land located in Alger county and lying between the line of the D., S. S. & A. railroad and Lake Superior.

The purchase was made, it is said, for the purpose of supplying the coke ovens run in connection with the firm's iron furnaces at Manistique. The business known as the Manistique Iron company, uses about 6,000 cords of wood per month. The timber tract purchased, estimated at 101,000 acres, will last the iron company for twenty years.

The price to be paid for the tract is said to be \$212,000.

Means Loss to Munising. Referring to the sale, the Munising News says: "It is the general opinion here that the sale of this land to Berry Bros., who have large interests at Manistique, means that this timber will be taken to that town to be worked up. That will mean quite a loss to Munising, as it was hoped and expected that this village would one day get the benefit that will accrue to any town where so much timber as these lands contain, is handled. W. E. Straight of Munising recently went over this tract of land and according to his estimate found three-fourths of it is excellent for farming purposes and the whole is worth perhaps twice the sum it was sold for. Some people profess to see in the sale of land to parties who will take the timber to Manistique, a plot to hurt Munising."

Thinks Mather People Interested. This is how it strikes the Munising Republican:

"It has been known for some time that negotiations were pending for the sale of the Lac La Belle lands, comprising 101,000 acres, in this county. Of the tract, 75,000 acres are valuable hardwood timber lands, while the balance is cedar and hemlock. Timber also commanding a high price at present. There is much speculation as to what this big deal may mean to Munising. Berry Bros. are the owners of the iron furnace and chemical plant at Manistique, and it is possible that the timber may be taken that way for manufacture. However, a Munising gentleman who is in a position to know what he is talking about says that the major part of the timber will come to Munising.

"There are many here who firmly believe that the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company is in some way connected with this deal. The lands went at a ridiculously low price, and it is thought that the officers of this company, who are very much alive, would not consent to let this tract of valuable lands slip through their fingers.

"There is a persistent rumor to the effect that Munising is to have one of the largest iron plants in the world in the not far distant future and if this is true it certainly would be the policy of the Cleveland Cliffs company to round up every acre of timber possible."

LOSES A \$5,000 SUIT.

Marquette Episcopal Diocese Defeated in Court Proceedings at Detroit.

In the case of the diocese of Marquette vs. the estate of Harvey C. Parke, in which the Episcopal diocese sued for a subscription claimed to have been made by Mr. Parke, Judge Robert of Detroit took the case away from the jury, deciding in favor of the defendant.

The subscription was made on the condition that \$50,000 be raised and it was not shown that this had been done. The late Harvey C. Parke was an enthusiastic member of the Protestant Episcopal church and subscribed liberally to its support. In 1892 a prominent member of the diocese of Marquette started a subscription paper for the purpose of swelling the fund of that diocese, and Mr. Parke gave \$2,500. Later he subscribed \$2,500 more on the condition, it is claimed, that \$30,000 should be raised before a certain time. The condition was not fulfilled and the commissioners on claims of his estate refused to pay the \$2,500. Albert E. Miller, treasurer of the diocese of Marquette, took an appeal from the decision of the commissioners, claiming that the gift was absolute and not conditional. The result of the case, which was decided last Friday, was as above outlined.

SCORED A BIG H.I.

"Casino Girl" Greeted by Packed House at Calumet Last Night.

Agent Delf, who looks after the interests of the South Shore and allied lines at Calumet, telephoned The Mining Journal about midnight last night that "The Casino Girl" had scored the biggest hit of the season at the copper country metropolis. The company was greeted by a packed house, many of those in attendance having come from Portage Lake on a special train, and to all the performance met every expectation.

Mr. Delf stated that the costuming was on an elaborate scale, while the stage settings were the best ever seen in Calumet. The work of the performers all through was first-class and so much so that he could not mention any one of them for special commendation, the members of the cast showing an artistic ability that surprised. It was added that the chorus was unusually fine, and that on the whole the extravaganza was a treat seldom accorded upper peninsula theatre-goers.

NEW SIDING PUT IN.

A siding is being put in by the Marquette & Southeastern where the railroad crosses the street car tracks out near the power house. STILL IN SOLITARY.

Murderer Wiseman Not Yet at Work in the Prison Shop.

Henry Wiseman, recently convicted at Pontiac of the murder of Mrs. Huss in the woods at Royal Oak and brought to the branch state prison a week ago by Sheriff Brewster of Oakland county, is still in solitary confinement. Under the regulations, he will be kept secluded in his cell until ordered set to work by the prison board, in whose hands that matter rests. The next meeting of the board will be held in a short time, when it is likely Wiseman will be put to work in the shop. He takes his life sentence very coolly and, like many others, expects to be pardoned before death ends his earthly career.

Sheriff Brewster had a long talk with the murderer while on the way to Marquette, and he learned some things about the man's career not before known. Wiseman told the sheriff that after he killed Mrs. Huss he feared he would be detected and he resolved to commit some act which would land him in state prison, where suspicions of the authorities might not reach. He therefore stole a cow and was sent to Jackson. When once behind the prison bars he concluded that he was safe and that by the time he had served his sentence he would walk forth a free man.
