Washington, Feb. 7.-The house tolay passed the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, the secon? of the regular supply bills. As passed it carries \$25,171,969, which is \$503,721 in excess of the current law. Only two amendments of importance were adopted. One provides for the commission to redistrict the legislative districts of Oklahoma, and the other authorizes the president in his discretion to convert into the civil service the temporary clerical force employed on account of the war with Spain. There are about 1,250 of these clerks still in the service. By the terms of the amendment the president must place all or none of them un-

der the civil service. The Philippine tariff bill was taken up in the senate early today. The session was notably quiet. APRIL IN THE LEAD WITH NINE DIFFERENT BLAZES.

Good Work of the Department Shown in Fact That of \$144,000 of Property Endangered, the Damage Was but \$12,000.

According to the annual report com piled by Secretary Kern of the water board, there were forty-three fires in this city last year, though in addition the department responded to four or five false alarms. At only about half of the fires, however, was loss sustained, and the aggregate of that makes a very gratifying record, and one that pays silwork of Chief Maney and the members of Morse Hose company.

The total loss during the twelve months was but \$11,987.25, covered by an insurance of \$32,300, while the value of the property endangered was \$143,

The statement shows that there were more fires during April than in any other month in the year. The depart ment was called upon to quench blazes at nine different places during those thirty days, while in September no alarms were responded to and in May and December but one each. The record scored during the other months was January, 5; February, 4: March, 5 June, 5; July, 3; August, 5; October, 2; and November 5.
