"YOUNG TEDDY" ILL... SON OF PRESIDENT SUFFERING WITH PNEUMONIA. CONDITION CONSIDERED SERIOUS. MRS. ROOSEVELT LEAVES WASHINGTON FOR GROTON, MASS. Dr. Warren, the School Physician, Hopes to Check Progress of Disease—Habit of Going About Without Hat May Have Caused Illness.

Washington, Feb. 7.—Mrs. Roosevelt left this afternoon for Groton, Mass., where Theodore, Jr., is lying seriously ill with pneumonia. She will reach Groton Saturday morning. President Roosevelt Saturday is likely to go to Groton tomorrow and will do so except in the event of very reassuring news being received tonight. Several reassuring messages were received at the White House during the late afternoon and early evening from Groton, the tenor of which was that the condition of the president's son was satisfactory to the attending physicians.

Much Illness at the School. There has been much illness at the school of late. There are several other cases of pneumonia besides young Roosevelt, and this afternoon the school closed for two weeks on account of prevailing sickness. The boys have been in the habit of running about bareheaded all winter. This is thought to account for some of the serious colds.

Philadelphia, Feb. 7.—The committee on the creed revision of the Presbyterian church devoted both sessions today to a consideration of a brief statement or a doctrine, devoid of all technicalities, for popular use. An earnest and exhaustive discussion was had over the points that should be included in the statement. At the conclusion of the afternoon session a member of the committee said the committee had agreed upon the form of the article which relates to revelation. The substance remains the same, and the changes made consist chiefly in the manner of expression.

Chicago, Feb. 7.—Prince Henry has expressed a desire to honor the memory of President Lincoln during his stay in Chicago by formally placing a wreath on the monument of the martyred president in Lincoln Park. The expression of this wish was conveyed today to Dr. Weaver, the German consul here, and was reported by him to the committee having in charge the arrangements for the prince's reception. Plans will be made to have the event take place amid imposing ceremonies.

FACTS REGARDING ISLANDS. Statement is Made to the Senate on Danish West Indies. Washington, Feb. 7.—The recent favorable report by the senate committee on foreign relations of the treaty of the cession of the Danish West Indies was accompanied by a written statement by the committee to the senate. The report contains a diagram showing the location of the three islands and their positions relative to Porto Rico, and gives numerous interesting facts relative to the islands.

THOUSANDS IN FORGERIES. Bogus Paper Sold by Defunct Platte Valley Bank Reaches \$50,000. David City, Neb., Feb. 7.—The forged paper sold by the defunct Platte Valley bank has already reached \$50,000 and may largely exceed this. Customers of Cashier Amos Gould from LaPorte and Michigan City, Ind., are here and claim that in every instance the notes and mortgages held by them are forgeries. Real estate mortgages have been forged, including the certificate of filing and recording, giving the book and page, while this week several chattel mortgages have been received by banks and attorneys here for collection that are also forgeries.

TELEGRAPH WIRES TAPPED. Pool Rooms in Cincinnati Are Hit for Over \$20,000. Cincinnati, Feb. 7.—When the Covington and Newport pool rooms were hit last evening for over \$20,000 there were many surmises as to how it was done, but it is claimed today that the wires were tapped north of Dayton, O., at other pool rooms were hit south of here and none north of Dayton.

KAISER AFTER FAITH HEALERS. Germany's Ruler to Institute a Campaign Against Christian Scientists. Berlin, Feb. 7.—Emperor William has intended to stem the spread of the faith-healing cure in Germany. His majesty has had long conferences with the chiefs of police for the purpose of devising measures to counteract the campaign here of christian scientists who have followers in the higher circles of Berlin society. It is claimed the practice of christian science "therapeutics" should be made illegal in Germany.

HELD TO BE INSANE. Woman Charged With Murder Is Found Not Guilty. Springfield, Ill., Feb. 7.—The jury in the case of Mrs. May Dennis, charged with the murder of her husband, Edgar H. Dennis, whom she shot and killed June 14, 1901, at their home in Quincy, today returned a verdict in the Adams county court of not guilty, holding that Mrs. Dennis is insane. She will be sent to the insane hospital at Jacksonville.

ORAL REPLY MADE. GERMANY'S ANSWER TO SPAIN SUBMITTED BY MINISTER. AWAITED ACTION OF OTHER POWERS. DECLINED TO TAKE THE INITIATIVE IN THE MATTER. Foreign Office Claims Government Did Not Impute Enslavement Any Evil Intentions Against the United States.

Berlin, Feb. 7.—The foreign office was informed today that the Associated Press had issued for publication texts of the replies of all the European courts except Germany to the request of Spain for concerted action by the powers sent out March 25, 1898, from Madrid. The Associated Press asked for the text of the German answer to this request. The foreign office said that the answer of the German government was made orally by the German ambassador at Madrid.

PLANS FOR PRESS DINNER. Fourteen Hundred to Attend Banquet in Honor of Prince Henry. New York, Feb. 7.—The plans for the dinner in honor of Prince Henry, to be tendered the American press by the New York Staats Zeitung Feb. 26, are nearing completion. More than 1,400 invitations have been sent representatives of daily papers throughout the country. The following toasts have been arranged: "Welcome to Our Distinguished Guest," Herman Ridder, response by Prince Henry.

TRIAL BY TELEPHONE. Kentucky Judge Disposes of a Case Over the Wire. Mount Vernon, Ky., Feb. 7.—While Judge Durham, who is a magistrate in the Wildlife district, was in court today he was called up over a telephone by Constable Jones, who said he had in charge Dan Dickerson, charged with breach of the peace. Dickerson asked for an immediate trial and it was agreed to conduct the trial by telephone. Half an hour's use of the wires by Judge Durham and County Attorney Bethuram at this end, and the constable and defendant at the other, concluded the trial. The defendant promptly paid the fine assessed.

KILLED BY TRAIN. Marshalltown, Ia., Feb. 7.—Frank Knapp, a merchant and postmaster at Bertram, was run over and killed by a Northwestern train today. Knapp's body was almost cut in two.

HOUSE PASSES SUPPLY BILL. Only Two Amendments of Any Importance Are Adopted. Washington, Feb. 7.—The house today passed the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, the second of the regular supply bills. As passed it carries \$25,719,000, which is \$503,722 in excess of the current law. Only two amendments of importance were adopted. One provides for the commission to redistrict the legislative districts of Oklahoma, and the other authorizes the president in his discretion to convert into the civil service the temporary clerical force employed on account of the war with Spain. There are about 1,250 of these clerks in the service. By the terms of the amendment the president must place all or none of them under the civil service.

PHILIPPINE TARIFF BILL TAKEN UP IN THE SENATE EARLY TODAY. The Philippine tariff bill was taken up in the senate early today. The session was notably quiet. Senator Turner of Washington delivered a carefully prepared speech on the general Philippine question and had not concluded when the bill was laid aside for the day. He discussed particularly the legal and constitutional questions involved in the government and control of the archipelago by the United States.

PRISONERS IN ILLINOIS PRISONS AWAIT ANXIOUSLY DECISION OF SUPREME COURT. Springfield, Ill., Feb. 7.—A petition to test the constitutionality of Section 15 of the act creating the state reformatory at Pontiac, under which a number of boys were transferred from the reformatory to the penitentiary at Joliet, was filed in the supreme court today. The petitioner is Ralph Dorsey, who seeks to regain his liberty by habeas corpus proceedings.

DUEL REPORTED FATAL. Prince Galatin May Have Been Killed by His Brother-in-Law. London, Saturday, Feb. 8.—It is reported here from Paris that Prince Galatin was recently wounded in a pistol duel with his brother-in-law, Count Tschernadoff at Basle.

SAMPSON IS WORSE. Alarming Reports as to the Condition of the Admiral. Washington, Feb. 7.—Alarming reports were afloat here today to the effect that Admiral Sampson has taken a serious turn for the worse within the last twenty-four hours. Inquiries at the Sampson residence and of naval physicians developed that there is no decided change in the admiral's condition but that a steady retrogression is in progress, common in his disease.
