(Additional Copper County on Page 2.) ICE DRILLING MACHINE. One to Be Used on Portage Lake in Taking Soundings.

SCHOOL FOR WEST HOUGHTON. Rapid Increase in Population Demands That One Be Built There.

The Houghton board of education has considerable work on its hands in the way of deciding on plans for the necessary enlargement of several school buildings under its jurisdiction. The time is not far distant when a school will have to be built at West Houghton.

Working drawings for the addition are now under preparation. It will contain four rooms and will be of wood. The entire front of the present building will be torn away and the new portion built on. The estimated cost is \$15,000.

One of the board members said yesterday that work on the new addition would be started early in the spring and that all preliminary proceedings such as advertising for bids and giving contracts would be done this winter.

Plans for the enlargement of the Houghton school have not as yet been decided upon. It is known, however, that the structure will be added to the larger one or two smaller ones will be built on. If the former, it will be used for a kindergarten department and a sub-primary. Four grades up to the fifth are now taught in Houghton.

The Houghton high school building is providing room for the extra pupils from Houghton and East Houghton but some of the grades are too crowded. It will be necessary for the board to hire four new teachers when the additions to the Houghton and East Houghton schools are built.

Charles Hebard & Sons of Pequaning contemplate building a large saw mill near Thomsville, Georgia, in the near future.

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HARBOR OF REFUGE

STRONG BACKING IS SECURED FOR THE PROJECT.

LAKE CARRIERS ENDORSE IT

J. M. LONGYEAR PUSHING THE PLAN AT WASHINGTON.

Is Granted a Hearing by the Rivers and Harbors Committee and Urges an Appropriation for the Preliminary Survey.

A Washington dispatch states that "J. M. Longyear, the Marquette mining magnate, has arrived in Washington to see about having a resurvey made of Marquette waters, with a view of having the port made a harbor of refuge."

Another Washington dispatch says: "William Livingstone, as president of the Lake Carriers' association, has sent a memorial to Washington asking that Marquette be created a harbor of refuge."

A special dispatch from the national capital to the Detroit Free Press has this to relate concerning the project:

"J. M. Longyear, of Marquette, had a hearing before the house rivers and harbors committee today to urge an appropriation for a survey in order to determine the cost of building a break-water in the bay near the harbor so as to establish a harbor of refuge. Senator McMillan also received a telegram from President Livingstone, of the Lake Carriers' association, stating that a harbor of refuge is greatly needed at Marquette."

WANTED FOR COUNTY ROAD.

Negotiations for the purchase from the Detroit Construction company of the right-of-way and bridges along the line of the old Huron Bay & Iron Range railroad are to be entered into by the county. The board of supervisors is willing to pay not to exceed \$15,000 for the lands and bridges, and has appropriated that amount, which there is reason to believe the company will accept. The right-of-way is wanted for a county road.
